COUNCILMINUTES**Regular Meeting**

May 27, 2008

Call to Order / Invocation / Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Dennis Kendall called the May 27, 2008 regular meeting of the Marysville City Council to order at 7:00 p.m. at Marysville City Hall. The invocation was given by Pastor Steve Schertzinger from New Hope Community Church. Mayor Kendall led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call

Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson gave the roll call. The following staff and councilmembers were in attendance.

- Also Present:** Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson, Finance Director Sandy Langdon, Police Chief Rick Smith, Community Development Director Gloria Hirashima, City Engineer John Cowling, Parks and Recreation Director Jim Ballew, Commander Ralph Krusey, Community Information Officer Doug Buell, Public Works Operations Manager Terry Hawley, City Clerk Tracy Jeffries, and Recording Secretary Laurie Hugdahl

It was noted that Councilmember Nehring was out of town on business.

Motion made by Councilmember Seibert, seconded by Councilmember Wright, to excuse Councilmember Nehring from the meeting. **Motion** passed unanimously (6-0).

Committee Reports

Councilmember Carmen Rasmussen reported on the Marysville Parks and Recreation Board meeting on May 14. The following topics were discussed at the meeting:

- Marysville Dog Owners Group (M-DOG) gave a presentation on their non-profit organization. They will be using Poochpalooza event on July 12 as a fundraiser for their organization.
- Staff presented a design of an off-leash dog park for Strawberry Fields. Councilmember Rasmussen distributed a copy of the design for the Council to see. Staff has recommended that it be a temporary facility so that it can be removed and relocated if necessary. The Parks and Recreation Board unanimously voted to recommend to the City Council to accept that site as an off-leash dog park.
- The graffiti presentation that has been given to the middle schools was given to the board. She noted that there has actually been a dramatic drop in graffiti incidents in the City. She commended Councilmember Vaughan, Jim Ballew and the police department for the excellent work they have done and the apparent success they have had as a result of their presentations.
- Totem Middle School has indicated an interest in housing an after school athletic program like the one at Marysville Middle School. Staff gave a presentation about what would be required for this to happen. It would require a budget amendment for this year and a commitment for 2009. This appears to be a valuable program and will be researched further.
- There was a delay in hanging baskets due to weather conditions.
- 5/17 was Community Pride Day. Haggen's has offered to donate their excess plants to the City.
- Movies and Music in the Park brochures have been prepared.
- Volunteers are needed for the all-comers track meet in July.

Councilmember Jeff Seibert reported on the May 14 Snohomish County Solid Waste Advisory Committee meeting. The following topics were covered at the meeting:

- Updates from staff and SWAC members.
- Scale software fit test was completed and will be installed in June or July.
- Canola drying system at Cathcart will be started soon. They will be doing a per ton charge to cover costs.
- The tonnage of solid waste is down about 7%.
- There was a discussion of the cost of service study. This will be going to the County Council for June's budget proposal. There was a motion by the SWAC Committee to recommend that the County Council support and approve it.
- 5-year goals for the committee.
- Discussion of what services other cities and towns provide.
- Discussion and report on annual cleanup efforts.

Audience Participation

Pauline Miller, Willow Run, 4900 80th Street NE, Marysville, WA, expressed concern about the lack of sidewalks on 80th St, especially for the elderly and those in wheelchairs. She requested sidewalks or some sort of protection for pedestrians.

Community Development Director Hirashima gave an update on this situation. She noted that staff had gone out to Willow Run to meet with residents there last week. City Engineer John Cowling said he and John Tatum met with the group residents to hear their concerns. One of the issues they brought up was storm drainage. He noted that this is already in the process of being addressed by the City. There will be an overlay on 80th this year and the City will see what can be done during that process with regard to adding a shoulder on that street.

Councilmember Seibert recalled from previous discussions that there was an issue with the right-of-way on this road. He noted that Jeff Massie is working for a grant for sidewalks on State Avenue and recommended incorporating 80th Street into that request for grant money.

Councilmember Soriano asked about the limits for work done on the small works roster. City Engineer John Cowling replied that a city of our size can go up to \$50,000 worth of work if it is multi-skilled project or \$30,000 if it is a single-skilled project. Councilmember Soriano asked if that would disqualify some of the bids that were over the \$50,000 mark. City Attorney Grant Weed explained that if the engineer's estimate was over \$50,000 they would not begin with the small works roster process. In this case, the engineer's estimate was below that. He explained that there were certain scenarios where it would be allowable to award a bid in excess of the engineer's estimate.

Motion made by Councilmember Rasmussen, seconded by Councilmember Soriano, to approve the bid for the Jennings Park Lot Overlay project to Northwest Asphalt Inc. in

the amount of \$41,919 including Washington State Sales Tax and approve a management reserve of \$4,000 for a total allocation of \$45,919. **Motion** passed unanimously (6-0).

Motion made by Councilmember Seibert, seconded by Councilmember Vaughan, to authorize the Mayor to sign the Independent Contractor and Lease Agreement with Matt and Sabra Edgerton of Marysville for the Caretaker position at Strawberry Fields Park. **Motion** passed unanimously (6-0).

18. An Ordinance of the City of Marysville, Washington Amending Portions of Chapter 9.20 Fireworks of the Marysville Municipal Code Relating to RCW Updates, Penalties; and Providing for Severability.

Doug Buell reviewed the flyer that they are anticipating distributing to the public. He also displayed the posters that they hang at fireworks stands. He explained that they could also do a press release and put information on the news channel and the website.

City Attorney Grant Weed discussed the revisions that have been made to this ordinance. Misdemeanor and gross misdemeanor penalties have been increased to the maximum of state statutes. A new subsection of the code allows the police department to cite a civil infraction of up to \$500. Chief Smith stressed that their biggest concern is the safety of the residents. This addresses everything that needs to be addressed and gives his officers the tools they need.

Councilmember Rasmussen thanked Doug Buell for making the flyer and noted that “gross demeanor” should be corrected to “gross misdemeanor”.

Motion made by Councilmember Seibert, seconded by Councilmember Phillips, to adopt Ordinance 2737. **Motion** passed unanimously (6-0).

Mayor's Business

Mayor Kendall requested three voting delegates for the AWC conference. Councilmembers Soriano, Phillips, and Rasmussen volunteered.

He had great time at the mall conference in Las Vegas.

The new school on 27th is being dedicated on Saturday morning at 11:00 a.m.

Staff Business

Doug Buell had no comments.

John Cowling gave updates on construction projects. 51st Avenue is under construction. There are no poles at 528 and 47th because of issues with obtaining steel.

Chief Smith thanked Grant Weed and his office for helping with the fireworks ordinance and thanks to Doug Buell for his work on the flyer.

He reported on the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC) conference he attended last week. At the conference he heard lots of people talking about positive things that are going on in Marysville.

Jim Ballew:

- He announced that the LDS church will working on the phased renovation of Asbury Field.
- The first bus trip to the Mariners game is tonight.
- Get Moving is next weekend at the high school.
- Hanging baskets will be ready this week.
- This is the last week of soccer program. Nearly 900 kids were involved this year. He commended the work of Dave Hall.
- There has been a 50% reduction in graffiti recently. He was invited back to the middle school next week for their field day to reiterate what he had discussed.
- More copies of the Movies and Music guide are available if any local businesses want them.

Gloria Hirashima:

- The Qwuloolt meetings are continuing. Cheryl Dungan attends the monthly meetings. They are currently reviewing the modeling. Senator Cantwell is sending one of her staff members up to the site to review the project.
- WSDOT is continuing to move forward with SR 529 route projects. The City is working with them on the wetland impacts created by the bridge project on Ebey slough. The City's Shoreline Master Program puts emphasis on mitigating

wetland impacts within the slough area so staff is meeting with them to see if there is a potential to improve the shoreline of our site.

- Code Enforcement/Nuisance Code draft should be ready by July.
- Transportation Plan Update is underway. The Planning Commission has had one meeting on this and will have another on June 10. The city is seeking input regarding non-motorized improvements.
- Whiskey Ridge design guidelines will be going through the Planning Commission next month. Staff is continuing to work very closely with WSDOT on SR 92 improvements.

Sandy Langdon reported that there will be a second domain name beginning on Monday. (Marysville.wa.gov will be the new domain name)

Mary Swenson:

- She remarked that there are a lot of people using the bike lane on Grove Street. She commended the Council for getting that moving.
- She liked the Movies and Music brochures. The small size makes it especially handy.
- She discussed the large amount of development that is now occurring in Marysville.
- She noted that the conference center in Tulalip will be bigger than Lynnwood or Everett. This will make it appealing to groups that can not even consider the other two venues.
- She welcomed John Cowling to the meeting. She applauded the work he has been doing.

Grant Weed discussed the nuisance code. The revised code should address the issues that have become concerns. He stated that no executive session would be needed.

Call on Councilmembers

Jeff Vaughan:

- He asked the Mayor if he had received any information about the post office issue. Mayor Kendall had not. CAO Swenson indicated she would follow up with this.
- Councilmember Vaughan brought up the issues of “bikini” espresso stands that have become popular in other cities. Grant Weed explained that there are limits to how clothing and attire can be regulated. Vaughan suggested looking at issues related to L&I safety.

Donna Wright:

- She confirmed that there will be a public safety committee meeting tomorrow. She noted that it was not on the calendar.
- She attended the memorial service at the Naval Station Everett and thought it was very nice.
- She was impressed with the open house at 156th also.

John Soriano commented that the open house for the 156th Street overpass was well attended. There seems to be a lot of enthusiasm.

Lee Phillips thanked Jim Ballew for the brochures. He asked about the retreat dates. Mary Swenson indicated dates would be coming soon.

Carmen Rasmussen:

- She suggested having everyone submit their schedule conflicts to one central place to assist in finding a retreat date that will work.
- She attended the end of year assembly for the School of the Entrepreneur. She was impressed with what the students are accomplishing.
- With the high price of gas now, she is very pleased that she has the opportunity to stay in town to eat, shop, etc.

Jeff Seibert:

- He asked if the power poles on 80th are in the right of way. John Cowling indicated that is what they are looking at.
- Councilmember Seibert noted that there used to be a bus stop on 80th. He suggested looking at bringing that back. Mayor Kendall indicated he would look into that.
- He thanked Chief Smith for the response to the email regarding graffiti.
- The open house for the overcrossing was very good. He noted that WSDOT is going to bid for the final phase of 172nd street in the next month and are anticipating completion by the fall of 2010. The design there makes the best use of right-of-way.
- He asked about the date for the public works meeting. John Cowling indicated he would look into that and get back to Council.
- He recognized Donna Wright for her part in the improvements on Grove Street.
- He thanked Doug Buell for the flyer.
- He asked if they should RSVP for the Policemen's Award Dinner. Police Chief Smith indicated that they should email Mary Swenson.

Committee Reports

Councilmember John Soriano reported that the LEOFF 1 Board reviewed and approved two claims on Wednesday, May 28.

Councilmember Soriano reported that the Public Safety Committee Meeting addressed the following topics:

- Commander Lamoureux reviewed a Policing Plan for the Strawberry Festival which complies with the NIMS Guidelines. Snohomish County, Lynnwood, Lake Stevens and Snohomish law enforcement personnel will be assisting Marysville with the enforcement.
- Hiring Update: 1 new hire is starting today; another new hire is starting on June 16; one lateral will be starting soon. There are still two vacancies. 10 people are going through hiring process and of those, 6 are lateral candidates.
- Recruiting and training update
- Ongoing investigations updates
- Take-home car policy is being reviewed

- Number of calls received during Strawberry Festival last year was 644 calls for service during 4 days which is 2.5 times the normal volume.

Mayor Kendall added that he will be swearing in two new police officers at next Monday night's Council meeting and more will be sworn in soon.

Public Works Director Kevin Nielsen explained that this is just a time extension with no cost involved.

8. Purchase Order No. F 5371 in the Amount of \$76,314.50 to Purchase a New Dump Truck Cab and Chassis from Cascadia International, LLC.

Mayor Kendall reviewed this item.

9. Purchase Order No. F 5372 in the Amount of \$38,647.70 to Purchase and Install a Dump Body from Northend Truck Equipment, Inc.

Kevin Nielsen remarked that this came in under budget.

10. Assignment of Waterline Easement Agreement by Marysville Land, LLC.

Community Development Director Hirashima explained that this is for a waterline that has already been constructed. The City is simply accepting the easement.

12. Interlocal Grant Agreement with the State of Washington, Office of the Secretary of State, Archives and Records Management Division Imaging Services.

This is a grant from the State for \$18,000 to continue the archiving process.

City Attorney Grant Weed commented that his office has reviewed the Agreement and there are two minor changes they are asking the state to make.

11. Planning Commission's Recommendation of the Smokey Point Master Plan.

Chief Administrative Officer Swenson commented that this is the Master Plan area for the Smokey Point area, which is also referred to as the gap area. She commended the staff and the Planning Commission for the work they have done with the community in that area.

Community Development Director Gloria Hirashima explained that the Planning Commission is recommending the approval of this Master Plan. There was a public hearing on May 6 where testimony was taken, but not many people testified. She felt the reason for this is that they worked closely with the property owners through the entire process. Major differences of opinions had to do with the road alignments. The road alignment options are contained within the Master Plan.

She pointed out two changes that will be made to the Master Plan:

1. Perimeter Landscape – 25% reduction allowed in certain circumstances
2. Right of Way Standard – allowing a reduction where parking is not needed.

Councilmember Seibert asked who would ultimately decide which arterial option would be used. Kevin Nielsen reviewed the options. He noted that staff's preferred alignment was on the west side of 51st and all of the options show this. The City will have the ultimate say as to which alternative they choose.

Public Works Director Kevin Nielsen noted that there is a huge wetland area in 43rd Avenue area. Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson commented that there is a lot of interest in LIDs in this area. They are in communication with landowners in this area.

Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson commented that there was a great article in the paper today.

Public Works Director Kevin Nielsen commended Community Development Director Gloria Hirashima for the work she did on this, especially with building consensus among all parties. Mayor Kendall added that the staff and the Planning Commission were also instrumental in this.

Carmen Rasmussen:

- Get Movin' is this Saturday from 2 to 4 p.m.
- She discussed a school zone sign on 88th that has poor visibility when turning from 67th onto 88th. Chief Smith indicated he would relay this information to Traffic Safety Committee.
- She commended the new chief for the outstanding reputation of the Marysville Police Department as evidenced by the large number of lateral transfers. Mary Swenson also commended the Council for their part in making Marysville an attractive place to work.

Donna Wright discussed the Snohomish Health District's expected \$4.4 million shortage by next year. One of the solutions that the Washington State Association of Local Public Health Officials (WSALPHO) is recommending is that the cities and county band together to make the best use of resources. More information on this will be coming.

Jon Nehring:

- He thanked Kevin Nielsen, Gloria Hirashima and all of staff for their work on the Master Plan.
- He brought up the need for more ball fields in the community. He discussed a massive sports complex in the Tri-cities and how the City could benefit from investing in more

facilities for baseball, soccer and softball tournaments. He feels there would be tremendous community support for this.

Lee Phillips had no comments.

John Soriano complimented the street sign at the intersection of Grove and 71st. He noted that the new solar generators are much more compact and work very well. Kevin Nielsen agreed and reviewed other locations of these in the city.

Jeff Seibert:

- He stated that he lived in Tri-Cities for a number of years. He commented that there also used to be an airport there.
- He also complimented the police department for their success in hiring and the staff and Planning Commission for the Smokey Point Master Plan.
- He requested seeing what can be done about getting graffiti cleaned off utility boxes on State Avenue between 84th and 88th.

Adjournment

Seeing no further business, Mayor Kendall adjourned the meeting at 7:46 p.m.

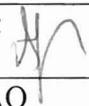

The attached supplemental agreement extends the completion date of the consultant agreement to December 31, 2008.

On May 14, 2007, the City Council authorized the Mayor to approve the Local Agency Standard Consultant Agreement with HDR Engineering, Inc. for the subject project. This agreement is not the standard Marysville Professional Services Agreement; rather it is from the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) Local Agency Guidelines in anticipation of the utilization of federal funds on this project.

In conformance with Federal Highway Administration and WSDOT procedures, HDR's work scope is the "first step" of an Interchange Justification Report to evaluate local arterial improvements and non-interstate highway improvements to address traffic capacity and safety problems. It is expected that the interchanges with I-5 at 4th Street and/or SR 529 will ultimately be shown as key to this project.

A primary component of HDR's work involves traffic demand modeling to estimate 2035 design year volumes in order to perform operational analysis. Subsequent to HDR's notice to proceed, The Transpo Group was commissioned to perform broader sub-regional traffic modeling and analysis work for the Transportation Element Update of the Marysville Comprehensive Plan. In meetings to coordinate the work of the two projects, it was decided by City Staff that The Transpo Group should prepare the traffic demand model for the purposes of both the Transportation Element Update *and* for HDR's City Center Access project for the sake of consistency and efficiency. This meant most of HDR's work effort was postponed, thus delaying their original completion date of April 30, 2008.

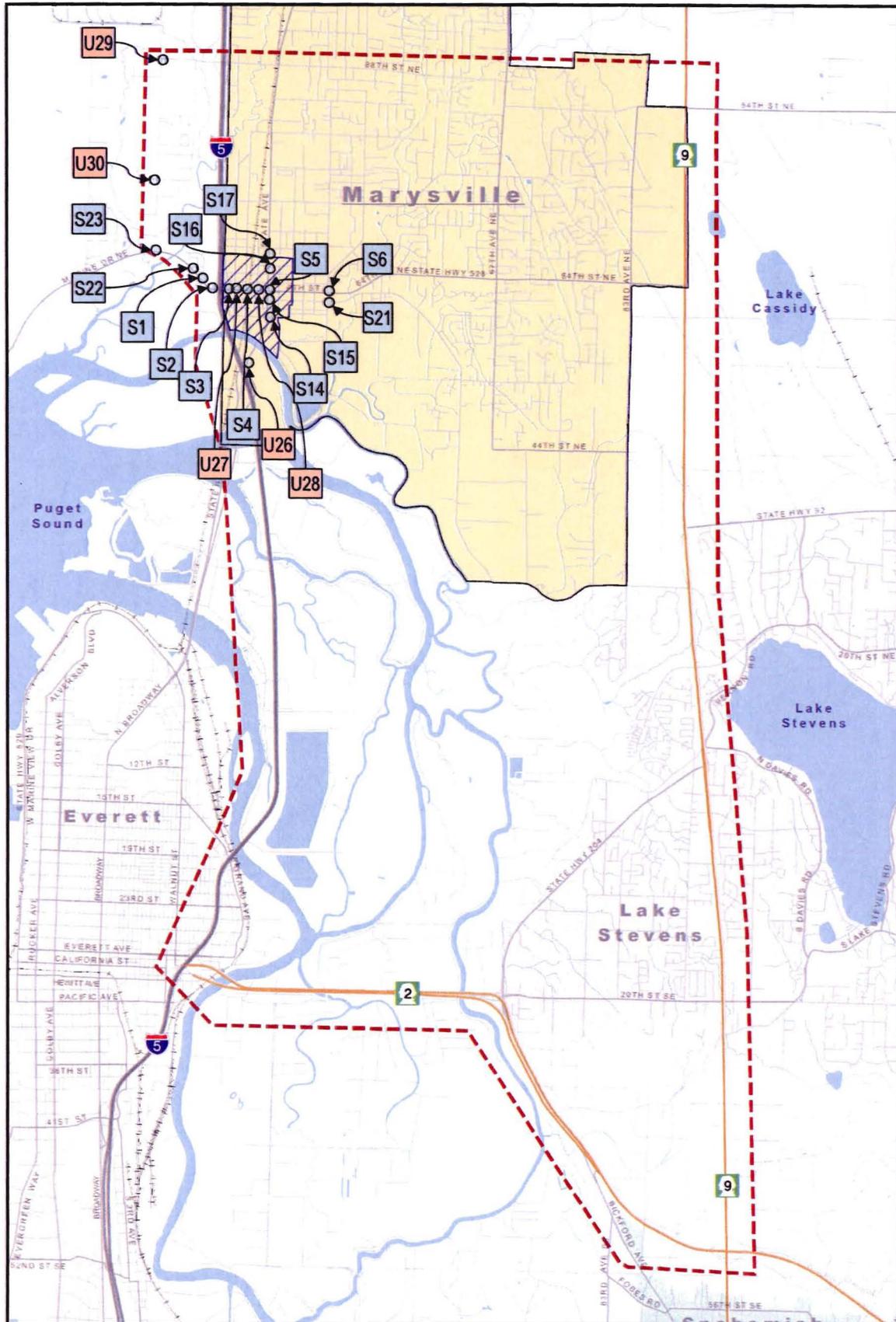

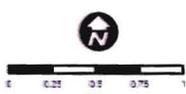

THIS easement agreement made this 24th day of September, 2007, is made by and between Snohomish County, a political subdivision of the State of Washington, hereinafter referred to as "Grantor," and Marysville Land, LLC, a Washington limited liability company, hereinafter referred to as "Grantee."

WHEREAS, Grantor is the owner of certain lands and premises situate in the County of Snohomish, State of Washington, described on Exhibit A which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, hereinafter referred to as the "Property;" and

WHEREAS, Grantee is desirous of acquiring a permanent, non-exclusive easement over, under, on, and across the Property for the purpose of constructing, installing, operating, and maintaining an underground water line; and

WHEREAS, Grantor desires to grant the same over, under, on, and across the Property;

NOW, THEREFORE, Grantor, for valuable consideration, the adequacy and receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby convey and agree as follows:

1. WATER LINE EASEMENT. Grantor hereby conveys to the Grantee, its successor and assigns, a permanent, non-exclusive easement over, under, on, and across the Property and more particularly described on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, hereinafter the "Easement," for the purpose of constructing, installing, operating, and maintaining an underground water line, subject to the conditions set forth in this agreement.

2. TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT. Grantor hereby conveys to Grantee, its successor and assigns, a temporary construction easement equal to fifteen (15) feet on either side of the Easement to facilitate construction and installation of the water line, hereinafter "Temporary Construction Easement," subject to the conditions set forth in this agreement.

The Temporary Construction Easement shall terminate upon either the completion of installation of the water line and related site restoration or December 30, 2007, whichever occurs earlier.

3. GRANTOR'S USE. Grantor reserves the right to use the surface of the above-described easements in the manner now existing, but shall not erect any buildings, structures, patios, or other construction of any nature on the Easement.

4. REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE. Grantee shall replace any fences, lawn, shrubbery, asphalt, or land contours that are disturbed in connection with the exercise of the Grantee's rights hereunder, in as good condition as the same were immediately before the Grantee entered the property.

5. CONSTRUCTION LIENS. Grantee warrants that any debts for labor, materials, expenses, or otherwise in connection with the installation, construction, maintenance, improvement, repair, or reconstruction of the water line work will be paid when due. In the event any lien is asserted against the Property, Grantee hereby agrees to take all steps to have such lien immediately removed, which may include the posting of a bond, and Grantee further agrees to hold harmless and indemnify Grantor from and against any such liens so asserted.

6. TERMINATION. In the event the Grantee abandons the WATER LINE for a period of five (5) years or for a shorter period if Grantee so informs Grantor of such intent, Grantee's rights under this Agreement shall terminate and the Easement shall be extinguished without further action. Upon Grantor's demand, the Grantee shall permanently remove the pipe and restore Grantor's property affected by the Easement as nearly as reasonably possible to its existing condition prior to installation of the Grantee's water line.

Termination of this Agreement shall not release Grantee from any liability or obligation with respect to any matter occurring prior to such termination, nor shall such termination release Grantee from obligations, including but not limited to removal of the water line from the Grantor's property and restoration of the Easement.

7. INDEMNIFICATION. Grantee, its successors and assigns, shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Grantor, its elected officials, officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all claims for damages, whether by Grantee's employees or other persons, that in any manner directly or indirectly arise out of Grantee's use under the easements granted in this Agreement, and Grantor shall not be held liable for any claims or damage to Grantee's water line within the Easement; provided that this indemnification obligation undertaken by Grantee, its successor and assigns, shall be inapplicable to the extent such claims for damages arise solely from the willful misconduct or negligent act or omission of Grantor.

The City of Marysville has been selected as one of the award recipients of the 2007-2009 Washington State Archives Local Records Grant Program in the amount of \$16,000.

In 2006 the City received a Grant from the State for \$18,000. The Grant allowed the City to image essential records, provide a microfilmed copy of City records at the State Archives facility, have essential records available digitally, allowing for improved access.

The purpose of this Grant will provide for additional imaging of City essential records with a copy retained at the State Archives facility and for the purchase of archival boxes.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Staff recommends the City Council authorize the Mayor to sign the attached Grant Agreement and Interlocal Agreement.

**INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT
For
DOCUMENT PREPARATION AND IMAGING SERVICES**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the CITY OF MARYSVILLE (“CUSTOMER”) and the STATE of WASHINGTON, OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE, ARCHIVES & RECORDS MANAGEMENT DIVISION (“ARCHIVES”).

This Interlocal Agreement establishes the understanding for providing document preparation, scanning, and microfilming services. Specific work to be performed shall be described in a separately approved Statement of Work (hereinafter “SOW”). Any additional SOWs shall be approved in writing.

I. SCOPE OF SERVICES

1. ARCHIVES shall provide document preparation, scanning, and microfilming services to the CUSTOMER upon receipt of a detailed SOW describing the services requested and the documents to be prepared and scanned or microfilmed. The SOW shall thereby be made an integral part of this Agreement. Within ninety (90) days after delivery to the CUSTOMER of the finished product, pursuant to the SOW, ARCHIVES shall return the documents to the CUSTOMER. Upon a written request from the CUSTOMER ARCHIVES will transfer the documents to an ARCHIVES regional branch facility.
2. ARCHIVES shall meet or exceed the quality control, processing, document preparation, and imaging specifications and standards for the creation of archival public record documents established by Washington State law. It is the responsibility of the CUSTOMER to verify the quality and accuracy of the service performed and to notify ARCHIVES of any discrepancies within thirty (30) calendar days after receiving the finished work product for each Statement of Work. Promptly after receiving such notice of any discrepancies from the CUSTOMER, ARCHIVES will replace deficient work product with product that meets specifications and standards at no charge to the CUSTOMER. Any defects or errors communicated by the CUSTOMER to ARCHIVES after thirty (30) calendar days from the invoice date will incur additional costs.
3. Although each Statement of Work will include an estimated completion date as agreed upon by the parties, **ARCHIVES shall not be liable for delays in providing services to the CUSTOMER under this Agreement.**
4. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a guarantee by the CUSTOMER to provide a minimum amount of work or a promise to supply work to ARCHIVES.
5. All records must be delivered in boxes capable of holding their contents with the lid closed. This includes rolled or flat drawings. Boxes that are damaged, without lids, or weighing over 40lbs **will not be accepted.** Boxes may be weighed before transporting. ARCHIVES have archival quality boxes with attached lids for purchase. Imaging Services have staff available to box CUSTOMER documents on site for an hourly fee equal to the current ARCHIVES miscellaneous labor rate.
6. Washington State Microfilming Standards require certain information to be present on all microfilm. ARCHIVES will add pages to ensure compliance with the standards. CUSTOMER will be charged at a per page rate and project preparation rate.
7. CUSTOMER instructions that result in a suspension of work in progress will be charged the current ARCHIVES miscellaneous labor rate per each hour of downtime for shut down and

restart. Once the project work begins, all questions submitted to the CUSTOMER must be answered expeditiously and no later than one (1) business day to avoid work stoppage.

II. TERMS AND TERMINATION

1. This Agreement shall take effect upon the signing of the last required signature. CUSTOMER agrees to comply with the RCW 39.34.040, if required. This Agreement shall remain in effect until May 31, 2009.
2. The CUSTOMER may extend this Agreement for up to two (2) additional two-year terms by providing a written notice to ARCHIVES any time before the termination date.
3. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon a thirty (30) calendar day written notice to the other party. In the event of termination of this Agreement, the terminating party shall be liable only for the performance rendered prior to the effective date of termination. The CUSTOMER shall pay ARCHIVES within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of billing for services rendered.

III. COMPENSATION

1. The CUSTOMER will pay ARCHIVES for the services provided under this Agreement at the rates in effect at the time a request for work is received from the CUSTOMER and ARCHIVES creates a Statement of Work, which is approved by the CUSTOMER. ARCHIVES shall maintain the right to increase or decrease the cost of rendering service(s) under this Agreement throughout its lifetime upon a thirty (30) calendar day advance notice to the CUSTOMER, and the CUSTOMER has fifteen (15) calendar days to agree or terminate the Agreement.
2. ARCHIVES will send an itemized bill to the CUSTOMER each month that includes work done in the prior month's imaging services detailing charges by Statement of Work number and services provided. ARCHIVES shall submit invoices to the same address to which notice is sent.
3. The CUSTOMER shall make payment by checks, journal voucher, or credit card of amount due within thirty (30) calendar days after receiving a properly executed invoice. The CUSTOMER shall make checks payable to the Office of the Secretary of State and send payment so the Office of the Secretary of State, Financial and Support Services, P.O. Box 40224, Olympia, WA 98504-0224. **Payment must reference the Agreement number.**
4. Total services under this Agreement shall **not exceed \$16,000.00**. This amount can be increased by amendment to this Agreement.

IV. NOTICE

1. Any notice to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and may be sent either by registered or certified mail, facsimile transmission, email, or personal delivery.

4. Notice shall become effective upon delivery in person, three business days after posting by prepaid registered or certified mail, receipt by the sender of a successful facsimile transmission report, or receipt by the sender of an email read receipt, whichever occurs first.

V. RECORDS

The parties to this Agreement shall each maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, which sufficiently and properly reflects all direct and indirect costs expended by either party in the performance of the service(s) described herein. These records shall be subject to inspection, review, or audit by personnel of both parties, or other personnel duly authorized by either party, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal officials authorized by law. All books, records, documents, and other material relevant to this Agreement will be retained for six (6) years after expiration and the Office of the State Auditor, federal auditors, and any persons duly authorized by the parties shall have full access and the right to examine any these materials during this period.

VI. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. This Agreement shall not be assignable by either party without written consent of the other party.
2. The ownership of the documents or other items received from the CUSTOMER shall at all times remain the property of the CUSTOMER. The imaging or other products are the property of the ARCHIVES until payment has been made for the services rendered.
3. The service or product provided by this Agreement shall be either available for pickup or shipped from the ARCHIVES' facility at 6340 Capitol Boulevard, Tumwater, WA 98501.
4. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, when a bona fide dispute arises between ARCHIVES and the CUSTOMER, and it cannot be resolved by direct negotiation, either party may request a dispute hearing with the Secretary of State or the delegate authorized in writing to act on behalf of the Secretary of State.
 - A. The request for a dispute hearing must:
 - be in writing;
 - state the disputed issues(s);
 - state the relative positions of the parties;
 - state the party's name, address, and contract number; and

- The respondent shall send a written answer to the requester’s statement to both the Secretary of State or delegate and the requester within fifteen (15) business days.
- B. The Secretary of State or delegate shall review the written statements and reply in writing to both parties within ten (10) business days. The Secretary of State or delegate may extend this period if necessary by notifying the parties.
- C. The parties agree that this dispute process shall precede any action in a judicial or quasi-judicial tribunal.

Nothing in the Agreement shall be construed to limit the parties’ choice of a mutually acceptable Alternate Dispute Resolution (ADR) method in addition to the dispute resolution procedure outline above.

5. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the law of the State of Washington. The venue of any legal action brought hereunder shall be in the Superior Court for Thurston County.
6. Each party to this agreement shall be responsible for its own acts and/or omissions and those of its officers, employees and agents. No party to this agreement shall be responsible for the act and/or omissions of entities or individuals not a party to this agreement.
7. This Agreement may be modified only in writing by the parties executed with the same formalities required to execute this Agreement.
8. If any clause, phrase, sentence, or paragraph of this Agreement is declared invalid or void, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
9. If any conflicts exist between the text of this Agreement and any Statement of Work, the Agreement shall prevail.

VII. AFFIRMATION OF AGREEMENT

The parties signing below hereby affirm that they have the authority to bind the respective parties to the terms of this Agreement. No other understanding, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement, shall be deemed to exist or to bind any of the parties. This Agreement, together with all of its attachments and subsequent Statement of Work constitutes the entire Agreement.

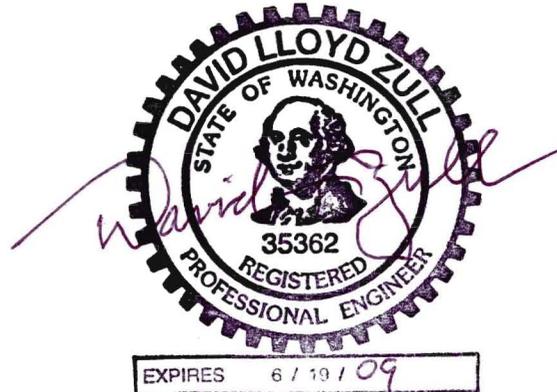

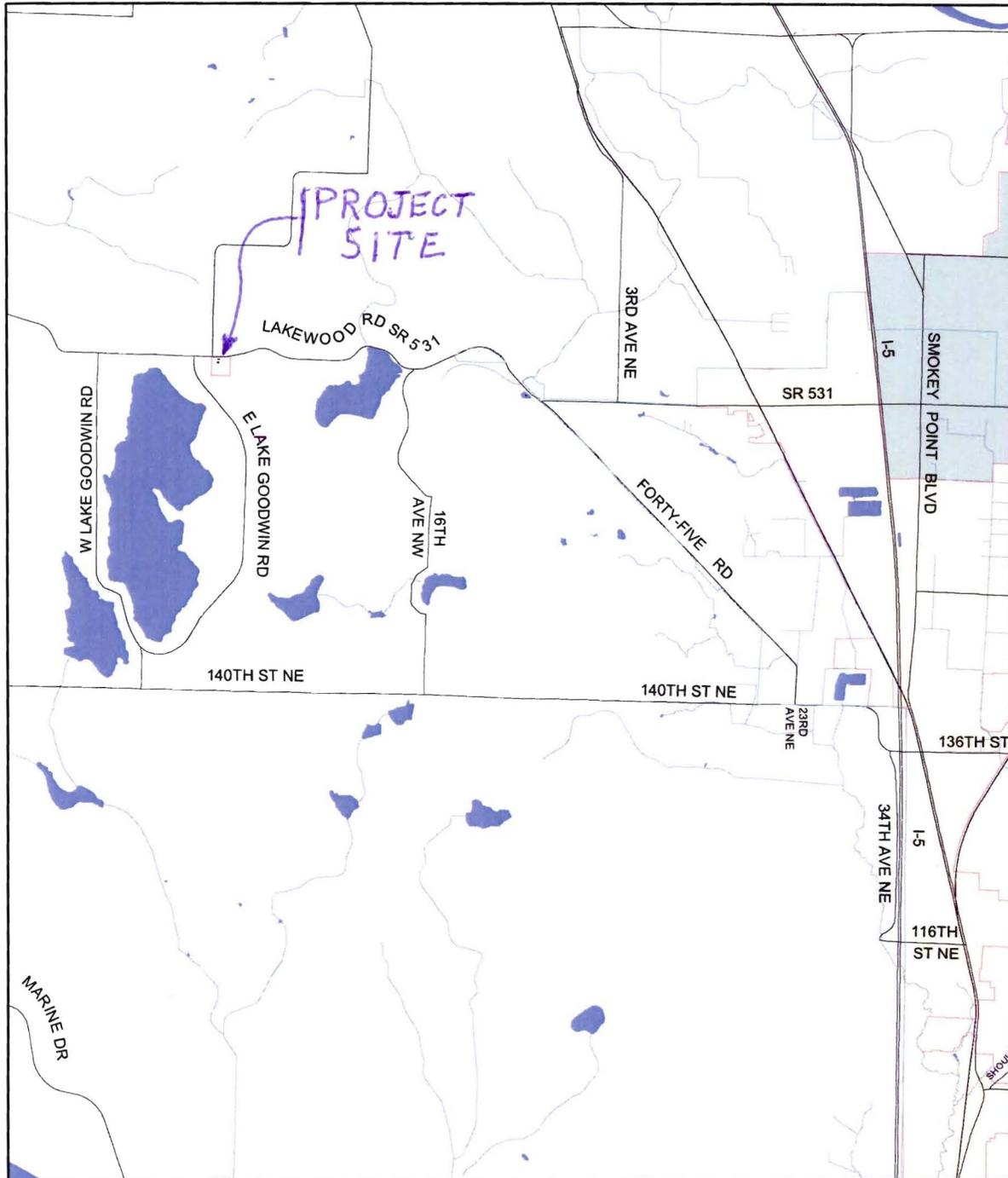

I. Correspondence and Responses

Correspondence: The Community Development Department received the following letters in response to the March 2008 draft and recommends action as follows:

March 17, 2008 letter from Gordon Derr (attached handout)-

1. Comment 1 requests City commitment to expedited timeline to obtain funding and to build the transportation infrastructure elements.

Response: The City is currently completing preliminary design of the 156th Street overcrossing project. The City anticipates that the overcrossing will be jointly funded by property owners and the City. The City has received a preliminary petition for creation of a Road Improvement District for the overcrossing and is reviewing boundary formation of the RID. The City does not have funds for design or construction of roadways east or west of the overcrossing, but instead anticipates that these sections will be privately funded. The City is committed to working with the property owners to pursue design of transportation improvements, whether through an RID process or through development site frontage improvements.

2. Comment 2 requests City commitment to building a regional transit station with the Smokey Point Master Plan ("SPMP") area.

Response: The Master Plan ("MP") includes a transit component and recommendations for future transit improvements. The plan includes recommendations to coordinate with Community Transit to locate a regional transit station capable of supporting local and regional needs as the area develops. (Page 19 of the Draft Plan).

3. Comment 3 requests that their cross sections be incorporated into the guidelines.

Response: The cross sections have been reviewed with both the property owners and Planning Commission. This staff report identifies potential revisions in the response to Gordon Derr's subsequent 4/18/08 letter that attaches their specific cross section requests.

4. Comment 4 is acknowledgment of the City's commitment to working with the agencies and property owners on area critical area and drainage management and mitigation.

Response: Comment acknowledged and appreciated.

5. Comment 5 is a comment on the design guidelines with reference to suggestions that will be submitted later.

Response: Additional comment is included within Gordon Derr's 4/18/08 letter which is addressed later in this report.

6. Comment 6 is a comment of concern regarding the land uses and allowances for mixed use development and acknowledgement that this issue may need to be addressed in future planning cycles.

Response: The intent of this plan is to facilitate development of light industrial uses, as designated by the City's 2005 Integrated Comprehensive Plan, EIS and Development regulations, and subsequent annexation of the master plan area. There are no changes in land use provided through the Master Plan. The City's comprehensive plan monitoring and update process does allow for ongoing review of the plan to ensure the City's goals are achieved and provides a mechanism for plan amendment if needed.

April 18, 2008 letter from Gordon Derr on behalf of Jim Tosti, Bill Binford, and Lindsey Echelbarger (The letter is attached and sections numbered to correspond to the following staff responses):

1. Comment regarding Page 2, Chapter 1, Section 1.1. page 1. The owners request a proposed text revision.

Response: Staff concurs with this proposed revision, which adds a sentence “This Smokey Point Master Plan is a master plan overlay and amends the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan.”

2. Comment regarding Chapter 2, pages 3 to 5. This comment requests plan amendment to authorize a full range of uses within the SPMP in order to respond to changing market forces.

Response: City staff does not support these changes. The master plan was funded and authorized by the City Council with the express intent of facilitating development of the designated light industrial employment uses identified by the 2005 Integrated Comprehensive Plan. The scope of work for the master plan was also intended to build around the existing land uses and to retain the area for employment uses. In addition, the master plan area was included within the UGA and designated as an area devoted to employment uses and job creation. Snohomish County Tomorrow, the regional planning body for Snohomish County, recently completed the 2007 land capacity analysis, which suggests that there is adequate residential capacity within Snohomish County as well as the Marysville UGA. The Snohomish County Council and the Marysville City Council both acknowledged and adopted the SCT report. Therefore, there is no documented need for residential allowances within the master plan area.

3. Comment regarding Chapter 3, Page 8, Section 3.3. This requests text revision regarding park and recreational uses.

Response: City staff does not support these revisions. The language again addresses land use including residential uses. See response to comment 2 above.

4. Comment regarding Chapter 3, Page 8, Section 3.4. This requests revision of text to address additional permitted uses.

Response: City staff does not support these revisions. If in future, the City elects to allow other uses within the SPMP, the plan should be amended to reflect this policy shift.

5. Comment on Chapter 4 figures. The comment request that Figures 3, 3a, and 4 and any text references to those figures state that they illustrate one option, and that the SPMP be changed to eliminate any recommendation on road network.

Response: City staff believes that it is important to include conceptual alternatives within the master plan to ensure that the road grid is ultimately created within the MPA. Staff supports inclusion of text that clarifies the purpose of the road concepts as follows:

“The included alternatives for provide for north-south and east-west road connectivity. The north-south alignments shown for 43rd Avenue NE and 51st Avenue NE provide for future continuity between 172nd Street NE (SR 531) and 152nd Street NE. The east-west alignments shown for 156th/152nd Street NE reflect continuity between Smokey Point Boulevard and 67th Avenue NE. The road concepts depicted herein may be revised as more advanced critical area review, engineering analyses become available. Other road alignments are acceptable, as long as the north-south, or east-west continuity goals are reached, and the affected property owners demonstrate funding support and mitigation (if critical area crossing and fill is required) for the alignment.”

In addition, staff has reviewed various road alignment drawings submitted to Planning Commission at their 4/22/08 meeting and recommends incorporation of alignment drawings that depict the roads south of 156th Street NE as shown in drawings D and E, and the roads north of 156th Street NE as shown in drawing G.

6. Comment regarding section 4.3, page 14-15. Comment 6 relates to addition of a bullet to address alignment options and criteria for 156th Street NE.

Response: Staff has proposed incorporation of text revisions and additional alignments as addressed in Comment 5 above. In addition, while the SPMP does not preclude a second crossing, staff is concerned about inclusion of language that would promote a second crossing.

7. Comment regarding Section 4.4, pages 17-19, Transit Facilities. Comment regarding section organization, need for bus shelters and regional facilities, and opposition to bus pull outs.

Response: Staff concurs that the information on page 17 should be numbered and titled “4.4.1 Existing Transit Conditions”. The subsequent section should be renumbered “4.4.2 Recommended Transit Improvements”. Page 19 does include text that supports inclusion of bus shelters and coordination with Community Transit to locate a regional transit station. The plan does not recommend bus pull-outs. The drawing on page 21 specifically identifies “In Lane” bus service. Extra right of way will be needed to accommodate bus shelters. This is noted in the text and drawing on page 21.

8. Suggested language for Section 4.5, page 19.

Response: Staff does not support inclusion of the proposed language. There are existing statutes and case law regarding development conditions and required improvements. Development conditions must be weighed through the course of development and SEPA review. Inclusion of additional language in the SPMP does not change that responsibility, but the proposed language could cloud it, as certain “regional” roads also can be directly impacted and provide direct benefit for access and frontage to the master plan properties.

9. Comment on Section 4.6, pages 22-24. This comment again addresses bus pull outs.

Response: See response on Comment 7 above.

10. Comment regarding design guidelines for 51st Avenue NE, 152nd Street, and 156th Street as shown on pages 22 of the SPMP.

Response: City staff does not support change to any of the principal arterial street standards. 51st Avenue NE, and the 152nd/156th Street corridors are planned Five-Lane Principal Arterial streets, with a planned right of way standard of 90 feet. The Gordon Derr letter also depicts a 90 foot right of way standard. In the case of 51st Avenue NE, the bike lane is shown on street, and is a continuation of a bike lane plan that extends beyond the master plan, south to downtown Marysville. This is part of the overall bike lane planning in both the City of Marysville, and Snohomish County. In the case of 152nd/156th Street, this corridor is a new arterial planned to enable future consideration of this roadway as a new interchange. The standard does depict a combined multi-use path for bikes and pedestrians.

11. Comment regarding design guidelines for 43rd Avenue NE as shown on page 23 of the SPMP.

Response: City staff supports the 43rd Avenue NE design standards as depicted, with a 50' ROW standard if the road is designed with abutting the Hayho Creek buffer area. The inclusion of a pedestrian path must be consistent with critical area requirements. Current city code allows a pedestrian path to be

placed in the outer 25% of the required buffer. A 60' ROW would be required if the roadway is moved to the east to enable development on both street frontages.

12. Comment regarding design guidelines for 160th Street NE and 59th Avenue NE as shown on page 23 of the SPMP.

Response: Both 160th Street NE and 59th Avenue NE are minor arterial streets. City staff supports the proposal to depict an additional section without on street parking in certain areas allowing a reduced ROW width of 60', but cautions that the standard must be identified for block lengths as it would be infeasible to jog the standard in and out depending on the adjacent building use. Credit for on street parking could be granted for the adjoining development.

13. Comment regarding design guidelines for "Two-Lane Local Commercial Streets" as shown on page 24 of the SPMP.

Response: City staff supports the proposal to depict an additional section without on street parking in certain areas allowing a reduced ROW width of 50', but cautions that the standard must be identified for block lengths as it would be infeasible to jog the standard in and out depending on the adjacent building use. Credit for on street parking could be granted for the adjoining development.

14. Comment regarding Chapter 5, Section 5.1, page 26, Wetlands and Critical areas. Additional text proposed.

Response: Staff does not support the proposed text additions. The text box already states that the City will pursue a regional public/private partnership for a regional mitigation approach on the wetlands, ditches and potential creek relocations. It also states that new development may also approach mitigation on an individual parcel basis. These are the two available options for critical area mitigation. Additional language is unnecessary. There may in future be provisions for fee in lieu of mitigation, however, the mitigation requirements have not been established at this time by state, federal or local agencies and therefore it is premature to establish mitigation mechanisms.

15. Comment regarding Chapter 5, Section 5.2, page 26, Streams and Buffers. Additional text proposed.

Response: Staff supports inclusion of the following language, similar to that proposed "Any development impacting Hayho Creek and its buffer will be required to participate in the Critical Areas Mitigation under alternatives described above."

16. Comment regarding Chapter 5, Section 5.7, page 34, Mitigation Strategy. Additional text proposed.

Response: Staff supports revision of the last sentence of the first paragraph to read: "Hydrologic analysis for either alternative will be necessary to determine how a proposed channel design would function as fish habitat and to understand the potential for any negative impacts within the area."

17. Comment regarding Chapter 7, Section 7.8, page 51. This addresses LID techniques.

Response: Staff supports the proposed revision. The revision would replace the last paragraph with "Recommended and viable LID techniques explored in the attached Otak Technical Memorandum #1 and #3 may be utilized as appropriate for the site."

18. Comment regarding Chapter 7, Section 7.9, page 53-54. This addresses a cross reference between the Hayho Creek drainage plan concept and the Edgecomb Creek drainage plan concept.

Response: Staff does not understand this comment. The decision on construction of pond #2 affects the Hayho Creek basin and development within this basin. It is unclear how pond #2 within the Hayho Creek basin affects decisions for facilities on Edgecomb Creek. Therefore, not understanding the basis for the revision, staff does not recommend the revision.

19. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.1, page 58. This requests inclusion of overlays and incentives due to concern that economic forces might become the sole driver of design planning.

Response: Staff is not proposing the use of incentives as the design guidelines are required in all new construction. The design guidelines are not optional or encouraged therefore it will not be a sole decision of the market whether to incorporate design planning into a site plan or building. The City will review development site plans and buildings for consistency with the SPMP design guidelines. If this is not clear from reading the SPMP, it may be appropriate to adopt this section by reference into the City's municipal code to ensure there is no confusion regarding the intent of Chapter 9. The City Attorney may have specific recommendations regarding the adopting ordinance with respect to the Design Guidelines. His office was asked to review the SPMP, with particular regard for the design guidelines section.

20. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.2.1, page 58. This request involves questions regarding design review.

Response: Staff agrees that the adopting ordinance should more clearly identify review process for the design guidelines. The SPMP design guidelines should be referenced within Chapter 19.14 which are the City's design requirements, within the Marysville Municipal Code. This section identifies applicability and process. In the case of industrial site plans, staff recommends that both the municipal code and Design Guidelines explain that site design standards and review will be applied to the industrial site plan approval or binding site plan. If buildings are also proposed at time of site plan submittal, then the site and buildings will be reviewed concurrently. If buildings are not proposed at that time, then individual building/architectural review (if a subdivision), will occur prior to building permit application. Staff anticipates that design review will commonly occur in two or more phases – site review and then individual lot/building reviews. This is common with large commercial site plans.

21. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.5, page 60. Comment relates to Design Guidelines - Service areas.

Response: Staff concurs with the language proposed: ““Screening” includes distance from street, location of on-site parking and other site landscaping.”

22. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.6, page 62. Comment relates to Design Guidelines - Access point.

Response: #3 of this section reads as follows: “Access points between major development pads should be combined to minimized curb cuts and recognizing the need to adequate emergency access to each building. . .” The sentence should be corrected to read “ Access points between major development pad should be combined to minimize curb cuts, while recognizing the need to provide adequate emergency access to each building . . .”

23. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.8, page 65. Additional language requested.

Response: Staff supports additional language, as modified: “The extent and type of pedestrian facilities appropriate for a given development will depend on the nature of the development, the number of users and its proximity to other recreational features. Design review should consider area recreational features and development scale in determining location and extent of pedestrian amenities on the site.”

24. Comment regarding Chapter 9, Section 9.17, page 69. Additional language requested.

Response: Staff does not support the revised language, as it replaces a mandatory design provision, with the word “encouraged”, which significantly weakens the intent of the guideline.

25. Comment regarding Chapter 9.17, page 73. Additional language requested.

Response: Staff supports additional language, as modified: “2. Stormwater facilities should be integrated into the site concept to provide visual amenity. Facilities may include surface ponds, underground vaults or LID techniques, as appropriate. 3. Stormwater infiltration facilities (paved pedestrian pathways) and other Low Impact Development concepts are encouraged and may be integrated within the landscaping concept for parking lots and site perimeters as appropriate to the landscaping concept.”

26. Section 9.17, page 73, design guidelines – monument signs. Additional language requested.

Response: Staff does not support the proposed language.

27. Comment regarding Chapter 11, Chapter 11.1.2, page 84 – Implementation. Additional language proposed.

Response: Staff does not support inclusion of the proposed language. There are existing statutes and case law regarding development conditions and required improvements. Development conditions must be weighed for proportionality through the course of development and SEPA review. Inclusion of additional language in the SPMP does not change that responsibility, but the proposed language could cloud it, as certain “regional” roads also can be directly impacted and provide direct benefit for access and frontage to the master plan properties. In addition, some of the proposed text conflicts with existing City code and routine development requirements for frontage improvements and infrastructure requirements that are the direct obligation of the development, or that may be ultimately be directly related to impacts caused by a future development.

28. Comment regarding Chapter 11, Chapter 11.2, page 85 – Implementation. Additional language proposed.

Response: Staff supports inclusion of item 13 referenced. Item 14 – LIFT is not available to additional cities within Snohomish County under existing state law. The LIFT statute limits an RDA to one per county with the exception of those jurisdictions that straddle more than one county. Within Snohomish County, both Bothell and Everett are utilizing LIFT already. The addition would read as follows: “13. Chapter 39.89 RCW allows cities to designate an increment area, finance public improvements expected to encourage private development within the increment area and repay this financing with the additional regular property taxes generated by such private development.”

29. Comment regarding other technical corrections.

Response: Staff concurs with these recommended corrections, as follows:

Page 3 – list of bullets at bottom of page. Bullet 3 should read “Provide protection or mitigation of natural features.”

Page 4 – section numbering is off and must be corrected.

Page 38 and 40 – Figures 8 and 9 – Correction to legend on both diagrams to address depicted infrastructure.

Page 53-54 – Reference proposed regional detention facilities as “Pond” consistently through section 7.9.

April 21, 2008 letter from English Hill Investments LLC (attached handout)-

1. Comment 1 requests reallocation of the assumed uses.

Response: In order to run the plan analysis, an assumed mix of uses was prepared. The intent of the assumed uses was to model a theoretical yield for the purposes of traffic and hydrologic modeling for preparation of the plan. The “modeled” yield does not constrict the ultimate uses allowed, as property is allowed to develop within the range of uses allowed in the Light Industrial zone. Since 100% of the land within the master plan is zoned Light Industrial, all properties are allowed to develop within the range allowed in this zone.

2. Comment 2 requests that additional alternatives be allowed for road networks.

Response: See response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter- Comment 5 and staff response.

3. Comment 3 requests adjustment of the road alignments.

Response: The Figure 4 Optional Collectors are specified as “Optional”. To the degree that there is property owner agreement to construct an adjusted alignment, the SPMP does not preclude it. Therefore, there is no need to move it within the document as the alignments are not required roads.

The 160th Street alignment, west of Hayho Creek is proposed on the north side of the private master plan boundary.

4. Comment regarding Section 4.6, Design guidelines for 51st Avenue NE, 152nd Street, and 156th Street as shown on pages 22 of the SPMP.

Response: See response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter. City staff does not support change to any of the principal arterial street standards. 51st Avenue NE, and the 152nd/156th Street corridors are planned Five-Lane Principal Arterial streets, with a planned. In the case of 51st Avenue NE, the bike lane is shown on street, and is a continuation of a bike lane plan that extends beyond the master plan, south to downtown Marysville. This is part of the overall bike lane planning in both the City of Marysville, and Snohomish County. In the case of 152nd/156th Street, this corridor is a new arterial planned to enable future consideration of this roadway as a new interchange. The standard does depict a combined multi-use path for bikes and pedestrians. City staff reviewed the lane widths and felt they were adequate for a principal and minor arterial standard. Also, see response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter- Comment 10, 11, 12, 13 and Staff Response.

5. Comment 5 recommends adding a section on “Economic Incentives”.

Response: Staff does not recommend adding this section.

April 19, 2008 comment from Butch Kvamme (attached handout)-

1. Comment suggests revision of the road alternatives and standards.

Response: See response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter- Comment 5, 10, 11, 12, 13 and Staff Response.

April 24, 2008 letter from Eisenhower & Carlson (attached handout)-

1. Comment relates to Tosti's proposed revisions to the road alternatives. Specifically, the Brutus owners are opposed to inclusion of Alternatives C, D, E or G within the SPMP.

Response: See response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter- Comment 5 and Staff Response. Staff reviewed the various road alignment drawings submitted to Planning Commission at their 4/22/08 meeting and recommends incorporation of alignment drawings that depict the roads south of 156th Street NE as shown in drawings D and E, and the roads north of 156th Street NE as shown in drawing G. With respect to the Brutus properties, we do not believe that the southern roadways shown on D and E will impact their property as it leaves the road alignment east of 51st Avenue on 152nd Street NE.

April 29, 2008 comment from Jim Tosti (attached handout)-

1. Comment suggests revision of the road alternatives and standards.

Response: See response to Gordon Derr 4/18/08 letter- Comment 5, 10, 11, 12, 13 and Staff Response.

Other Staff comments regarding recommended revisions:

1. Text identifying the referenced pictures should be added to pages 51-53, in place of the language "Insert Text Here".
2. Text identifying the referenced pictures should be added on page 61, 62, 69, 71.

II. FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

1. The City of Marysville 2005 Comprehensive Plan designates the properties referenced in this proposal as "Light Industrial – Master Plan required". The City annexed the area in February 2007 and has since pursued development of a master plan for development of the area consistent with the comprehensive plan guidance.
2. The City hired Pertect Inc and subconsultants Otak and Shaw Environmental to prepare the draft master plan document.
3. Community Development and Public Works staff and the consultants held five meetings with property owners to review various drafts of the Smokey Point Master Plan.
4. A joint workshop between the Marysville City Council and Marysville Planning Commission was held on March 17, 2008 to review the draft plan.
5. Planning Commission held workshops on the draft plan on March 25, April 8 and April 22, 2008.
6. A public open house was held on April 15, 2008 to present the plan and answer questions from the general public.
7. Addendum No. 14 was issued to the Final EIS of the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan relating to adoption of the Smokey Point Master Plan as an amendment to the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan.
8. A public hearing is scheduled for the Planning Commission on May 6, 2008.

II. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based on the foregoing information and analysis, the environmental analysis, City staff recommends adoption of the plan, with revisions noted above.

Honorable City Council and Planning Commission Members:

On behalf of Glenmont Windward Marysville LLC ("Glenmont"), we offer our preliminary comments on the Smokey Point Draft Master Plan. Glenmont is the owner of approximately 362 acres within the 687 acres of the master planning area. Glenmont, along with three other property owners with whom we have been working closely on this master plan, represent the vast majority of the entire master planning area. This concentration of ownership offers a unique opportunity for coordinated and effective planning and development.

Glenmont shares Marysville's goal of adopting a master plan with vision for planning, financing and implementing public infrastructure and private development in a manner that is integrated with the larger Marysville and Snohomish County communities. Glenmont supports the City's vision for the Smokey Point Master Planning area to be a significant economic engine and is committed to proceeding expeditiously to bring this area into productive use.

Glenmont has worked with the Marysville administration and staff throughout 2007 with the goal of being able to come to the Planning Commission and City Council arm-in-arm endorsing a master plan.

The Draft Smokey Point Master Plan was made available to the property owners in December. We provided staff with extensive comments on the 2007 Draft, including a redlined version with additional chapters on funding and implementation. The property owners have spent considerable time and money to make this an accurate, useable plan and we know that Marysville also committed a great deal of time and consultant expense to meet with the owners.

Last Wednesday, Marysville staff provided the owners with a new draft master plan. Because of the quick turn-around required to review this new draft, our client and our consultant team has not had an adequate opportunity for review. However, on initial review, we believe the March 2008 Draft document is greatly improved over the previous draft. We want to compliment the staff on their efforts to respond to our redlined draft and comments.

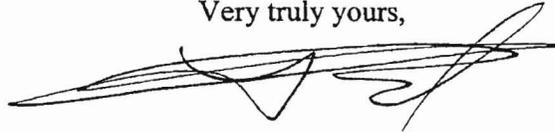
We understand that there will be ample additional opportunities to provide specific comments and to continue to work directly with staff to address our concerns and recommendations. At this time, we offer the following general comments:

1. **Transportation Funding and Timeline for Implementation:** Construction of the 156th-I-5 Overpass and 156th/152nd Street east from I-5 to 51st Street is absolutely vital for development of this area. We ask the City to commit to an expedited timeline for obtaining funding, assisted by the owners, to build these transportation infrastructure elements. Our client is committed to immediately start the design process with the City and other owners from Smokey Point Blvd. to 51st Street so that construction of this segment can begin in 2009.
2. **Transit:** transit service is critical for the successful development of the Smokey Point Master Plan area. We ask that the City commit to building a regional transit station within the Smokey Point Master Plan area.
3. **Right-of-way and Street Design:** In our redlined draft, we offered design guidelines for the principal arterials, minor arterials and local commercial streets. Our proposed revisions were not incorporated into the new draft in any manner, even though at one of our meetings, staff committed to using our cross sections. In contrast to the staff's March 2008 draft plan, our proposed guidelines, developed with our traffic consultant, David Markley of Transportation Solutions, Inc., provided more appropriate cross-sections and offered flexibility in meeting the variety of transportation needs of the area through vehicles, bicycles, transit and pedestrians. Our recommended cross-sections reduced the wide impervious street surfaces being recommended by staff, in order to reduce drainage impacts and avoid the significant infrastructure costs that would be imposed by the staff's recommended designs. We will continue to work with Public Works staff on these issues and involve our traffic consultant in further discussions.
4. **Stream relocation, critical areas mitigation, and drainage management:** These issues will continue to be the most time-consuming issues during the next year and throughout development. We appreciate the City's commitment to added flexibility in implementation on either a regional basis or development-by-development basis. We will continue to work with staff and other agencies to gain a better understanding of funding and implementation alternatives. We appreciate the City's commitment to low impact drainage techniques and will work with staff on remaining areas of needed language clarification in the Draft master plan.
5. **Design Guidelines:** These guidelines will be extremely important to achieving well-functioning, aesthetically pleasing development on an area-wide basis. There are details in screening and architectural detail that remain to be worked out and we will give staff specific suggestions.
6. **Uses:** We understand the City's vision for this area being a critical economic engine and that the scope of this Master Plan did not include an examination of land use alternatives to achieve this goal. We are greatly concerned that this Plan overemphasizes industrial

land use where the expected low absorption rate and limited employees per acre will not achieve the city's economic goals. The Smokey Point Master Plan area supports commercial use but we recognize that the success of commercial development depends on having an adequate customer base. Marysville must also address the critical choices we face regarding ever increasing energy and gasoline costs, lengthened commute times and the current climate change agenda recently enacted by the Washington State Legislature. All of these factors lead us to conclude that the City must consider allowing mixed use development in the Smokey Point Master Plan area. We recognize that this issue may not be addressed now. However, we believe that it must be part of the city's next planning cycle.

We want to thank the City of Marysville and the staff of the Planning and Public Works Departments for working cooperatively with the property owners on the Draft Smokey Point Master Plan. We look forward to our continued work together.

Re: Smokey Point Draft Master Plan -- Requested Changes

Planning Commission Members:

This letter is written on behalf of the following 3 owners of property within the 687-acre Smokey Point Master Planning Area (MPA): Glenmont Windward Marysville LLC, English Hill Investments-Venture Pacific Land Corp., and the Echelbarger Company. This concentration of ownership offers a unique opportunity for coordinated and effective planning and development. These owners support the City's vision for the Smokey Point MPA as a significant economic engine and are committed to proceeding expeditiously to bring this area into productive use.

We appreciate the time and effort the Marysville administration, staff and consultant have devoted to working with the property owners during the past year. City staff provided the owners with an initial draft of the Draft Smokey Point Master Plan (SPMP) in December and meet with the owners about that draft in a series of meeting. We want to acknowledge the changes made in response to the comments of the owners in the second draft -- the March 2008 Draft Smokey Point Master Plan (SPMP).

The purpose of this letter is two fold:

1. We request a meeting among all six members of the Planning Commission and the owners during which we can sit at the table with the Commissioners and directly discuss the design flexibility appropriate for the Smokey Point Master Plan. We participated in the discussion at the April 15, 2008 Open House attended by two Commission members and wish to have a fuller discussion with all six members prior to your formulation of a recommendation to the City Council.

2. We set forth the additional changes the owners believe need to be made prior to recommending the SPMP to the City Council in order to achieve the City and owners' vision for the Smokey Point MPA. While we believe the March 2008 Draft Smokey Point Master Plan (SPMP) is a very solid step toward the final plan, we urge the Planning Commission to adopt these recommended changes.

Chapter 1

Section 1.1, page 1

To clarify the relationship among documents affecting the Smokey Point MPA, add: "This Smokey Point Master Plan is a master plan overlay and amends the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan."

Chapter 2

Pages 3 to 5.

Full development of the Smokey Point MPA will require several years. During this period, Marysville and the developers must have the flexibility to adapt to changing market forces. As we have seen demonstrated with Puget Sound businesses over the last decade, the businesses of the future will be radically different than what we know today. Marysville's success depends on maintaining the flexibility to be a market leader in these emerging industries and meet their expectations for infrastructure, neighboring uses and amenities. As the Washington State market evolves to fill the needs and demands of new industries, Marysville must be able to respond quickly.

Therefore, rather than having the Comprehensive Plan limit uses in the Smokey Point MPA, the SPMP should expressly amend the Comprehensive Plan to authorize a full range of uses within the SPMP, set out policies, guidelines and implementation options. Then, consistent with the adopted SPMP, the City Council may establish specific permitted uses in the underlying land use code. Currently the zoning code establishes the Smokey Point MPA as light industrial. To allow maximum flexibility in responding to the market and to avoid the delay in amending the SPMP and City's Comprehensive Plan, the following changes should be made:

- Throughout the SPMP, change all current references to "commercial" and "light industrial" and "MMC Chapter 19.08" to general references of "underlying zone classifications" and "types of permitted uses" and "Title 19 of the Marysville Municipal Code."
- Add to Section 2.3: "The SPMP is intended to allow a full range of uses within the Smokey Point MPA necessary to meet market demand. To accomplish this, either the uses allowed within the LI zone may be expanded or the underlying zone classifications of the Smokey Point MPA or portions thereof may be rezoned."

Chapter 3

Page 8, Section 3.3.

To clarify the purpose of the parks and recreational facilities within the MPA, we request the current first sentence be replaced with the following:

"The Smokey Point MPA will include a mix of uses including industrial uses which will generate some workers who will commute by bicycle, residential uses with residents who will travel or recreate within the MPA, and others who pass through to commute or recreate to regional destinations. There are two athletic complexes"

3

Page 8, Section 3.4.

To allow additional uses through changes in the zoning code without also having to amend this SPMP, we request the following be added to the end of this section: "Any additional permitted uses within this Smokey Point MPA will be in accordance with the underlying zoning."

4

Chapter 4

Figures 3, 3a, and 4 illustrate one road network solution for the region. There are many such solutions for the Smokey Point MPA and the City must work with the landowners and industrial uses to develop the best system. Therefore, We request:

5

- Existing Figures 3, 3a, and 4 and any text references to those figures state that they illustrate one option, and
- That the SPMP be changed to eliminate any recommendation on road network and that additional road network alternatives be added to the SPMP.

Section 4.3, Page 14-15 Development Guidelines (shaded box).

We request an additional bullet be added that addresses the right of way planned for 156th Street from Smokey Point Boulevard to 51st Ave NE. This bullet must refer to additional figures that set out options for the alignment, and set out criteria that will be used for the final determination of the alignment, and the classification, and design.

On the fifth bullet, to maintain the flexibility for consideration of a second railroad crossing, we request the following be added: "While a second railroad crossing would be expensive, it should be considered, since the land east of the railroad tracks has lower value and is better suited to curvilinear alignments. If this cannot be done, the diagonal connection of 152nd into 156th from the west shall be moved east, closer to original alignment of 152nd."

On the fifth bullet, to provide clearer guidance on when this guideline is triggered, we request the following be added to end of last sentence add: "if warranted at time of development."

We request an additional bullet or discussion within Section 4.3, that recognizes the necessity for incremental infrastructure to meet initial demand versus the ultimate demand.

Section 4.4, pages 17 – 19.

This section appears to be a statement of current conditions versus future requirements, but it is very confusing as written. It should be clarified as existing conditions.

We believe that both a regional bus facility and bus shelters must be included within the Smokey Point MPA and request that this section be changed to clarify that these features will be included (In fact the text and illustration on page 21 shows a shelter.)

We do not believe bus pull outs should be required and previously the City staff and consultant had stated that none would be included. Again this section must be clarified in this regard.

Section 4.5, page 19.

To the extent that the recreational and regional amenities do not directly benefit the users in the Smokey Point MPA, the uses need to be recognized and treated as regional improvements. We request the following be added to the end of this paragraph: "For regional area-wide improvement, it is critical that responsibility for the planning and construction be equitable and roughly proportional to the benefits derived by those developing in the area and broader City, County and regional needs."

Section 4.6, Pages 22- 24 (including shaded box).

This Section should clarify that there will be no bus pull outs as we had previously been told by City staff and consultants.

As we have discussed recently with City staff and consultants, the dimensions in the following cross sections should be substituted for the dimensions contained in the shaded boxes on pages 22-24. We believe that the City staff is agreeable to the following and request that the following changes be made. Note that these designs decrease the amount of impervious roadway surfaces with a positive impact on stormwater drainage.

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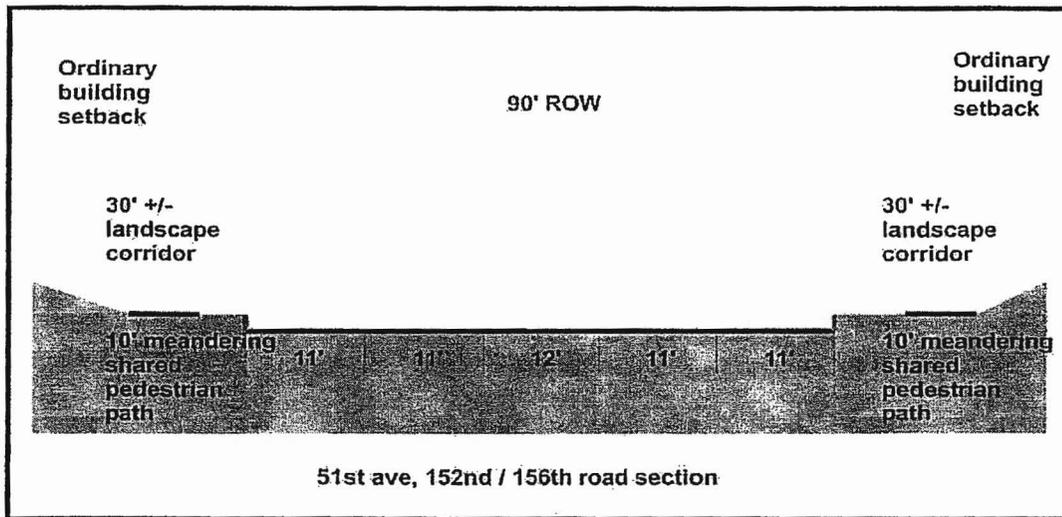

Design Guidelines for 51st Avenue NE, 152nd Street, and 156th Street

Road ROW to be 90', move bike lanes from the road section and combine with pedestrian pathway along either side of road. Combine open space outside of traffic lanes with ordinary building setbacks to create a 30'+- greenbelt for 10' wide meandering, combined pedestrian pathway. This can be made with a permeable all terrain surfaces eliminating up to 22' of impermeable surface from the design. Or an asphalt section can be used, greatly reducing the costs to construct.

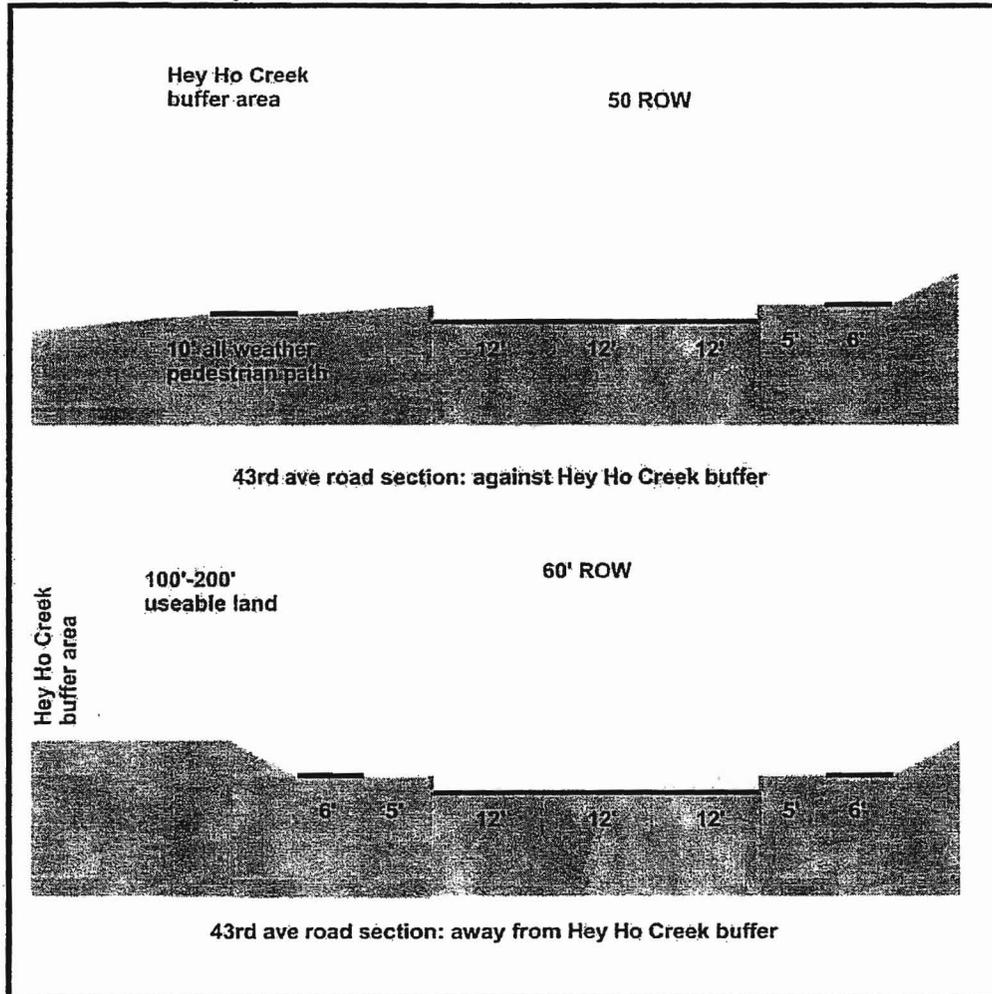
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Design Guidelines for 43rd Avenue NE.

The road section for 43rd Ave has been revised to take into account the use of the Hayho Creek buffer area as the corridor for the regional pedestrian pathway, eliminating the need for a significant pedestrian allowance on the roadway sections. Two sections are presented: one that allows for 43rd to be constructed right against the creek buffer, and a second that is approximately 200' east of the creek buffer and provides for commercial frontage along both sides of the roadway.

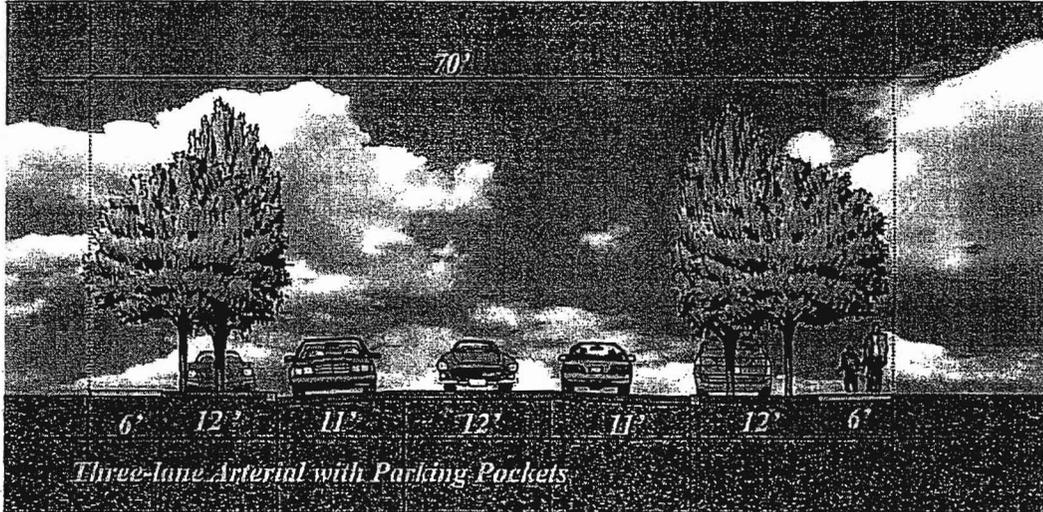
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Design Guidelines for 160th Street and 59th Avenue NE

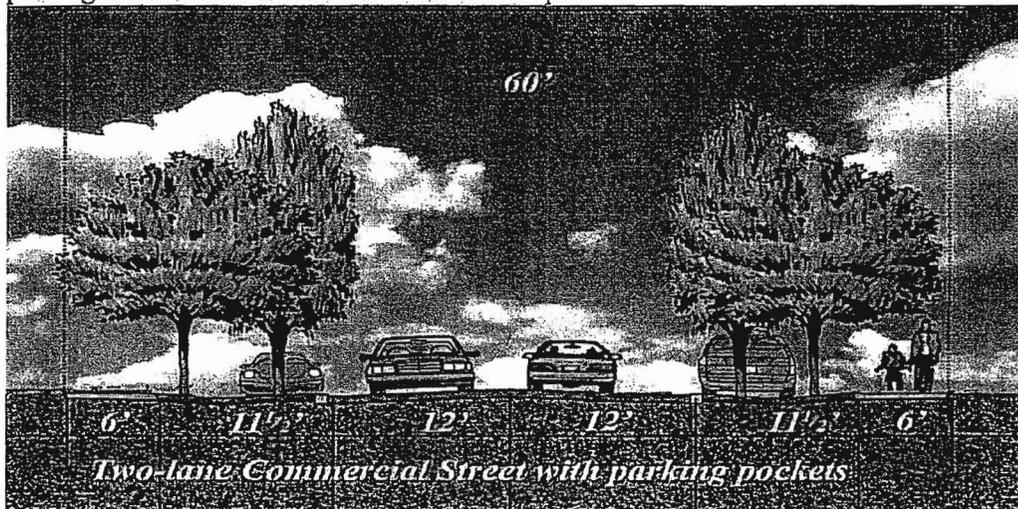
The road section for 160th Street and 59th Avenue NE would remain the same as presented in the draft master plan in commercial / retail areas, but a second section without on street parking would be available for true light industrial areas where on street parking is not a priority, reducing the ROW from 70' to 60'. However, the on street parking section could be used in LI areas, and a parking credit would be given to the developer reducing the number of on site parking stalls required.

The same option for 160th and 59th noted above would be available for the smaller two lane local commercial road section providing a ROW reduction of 10', from 60' to 50' for the LI section with no on street parking. Again, if the on street parking section were used in the LI area, a parking credit would be available to the developer.

Chapter 5

Section 5.1, Page 26, Development Guidelines - Wetlands and Critical Areas (shaded box). Due to the complexity of planning, land acquisition and permitting of mitigation on a regional basis, mitigation on an individual parcel basis must be presented as an equal alternative. We request that the Second and Third Bullets be changed to read as follows:

- "• Mitigation of wetlands, ditches, other critical areas, and potential creek relocations may be pursued under several alternative strategies: on a regional public/private partnership basis, on an individual parcel basis, or on a fee in lieu of mitigation basis, all of which must mitigate the impacts of development as determined by the City.
- The City may pursue a regional public/private partnership for a regional mitigation approach on wetland, ditches and potential creek relocations.
- The developer may pay a fee in lieu of mitigation if the state and federal agencies have agreed on regional mitigation.
- The developer may conduct mitigation on an individual parcel basis if neither the regional mitigation nor the in lieu fee mitigation is available at the time of the development is proposed."

Section 5.2, Page 26, Development Guidelines - Streams and Buffers (shaded box). Because streams are a subset of critical areas, this guideline on streams and buffers needs to cross-reference the previous development guidelines on critical areas. In addition, we request that the last sentence be changed to read as follows:

"Any development impacting Hayho Creek buffer will be required to participate in the Critical Areas Mitigation under alternatives described above."

Section 5.7, Page 34, Development Guidelines - Mitigation Strategy (shaded box). One additional issue for both east and west relocation alternatives is that hydrologic modeling will be needed to ensure that each alternative will adequately function as fish habitat and will not create significant negative impacts elsewhere in the area. We request that the last sentence in the first paragraph be changed as follows:

"Hydrologic analysis for either alternative will be necessary to determine how a proposed channel design would function as fish habitat and to understand the potential for any negative impacts within the area."

Chapter 7

Section 7.8, page 51 (including gray box):

This section makes reference to Technical Memoranda #1 and #3 but does not include them in the "Recommended and viable LID techniques" within the Development Guidelines (gray box). The Development Guidelines should be changed to eliminate all text under "Recommended and

viable LID techniques” and replace with the statement that “the LID techniques explored in Technical Memorandum #1 and #3 may be utilized as appropriate for the site.”

Section 7.9, Page 53 -54, (including shaded box).

Because the Preferred Conceptual Alternatives for Hayho Creek Basin includes construction of Site #2, there should be a cross reference in the Preferred Conceptual Alternative for Edgecomb Creek. The construction of Site #2 for Hayho Creek should be taken into consideration in the decision on facilities for Edgecomb Creek. We request the SPMP be edited accordingly.

Chapter 9

Section 9.1, page 58.

Overlays and incentives would encourage favorable design. We recommend these be added in to this section so that economic forces are not the sole driver of design planning.

19

Section 9.2.1 page 58.

This section should be clarified to explain how an industrial plat shall pass the design review stage if there is not a proposed site/architectural plan for each lot.

20

Section 9.5, Page 60, Design Guidelines - Service Areas (shaded box).

For appropriate flexibility within an industrial zone, the following sentence at the end of Paragraph 2: “Screening” includes distance from street, location of on-site parking and other site landscaping.

21

Section 9.6, Page 62 Design Guidelines – Access Point (shaded box).

Item 3 should be clarified to more clearly recognize that emergency vehicles may require additional curb cuts.

22

Section 9.8, page 65.

The extent and type of pedestrian facilities appropriate for a given development will depend on the nature of the development, the number of users and its proximity to other recreational features. Traditional warehouse and manufacturing uses will demand far fewer pedestrian amenities than retail or residential uses. We request the first paragraph of Section 9.8 be replaced with the following:

“The extent and type of pedestrian facilities appropriate for a given development will depend on the nature of the development, the number of users and its proximity to other recreational features. Providing space for pedestrian amenities in optimal locations and supplying non-fixed seating, landscaping and other features, will provide maximum flexibility among different, changing types of development.”

Section 9.11, Page 69, Design Guidelines Scale (shade box).

We request that Paragraphs 2 and 3 be changes to read as follows:

- "2. Integration of pedestrian scale concepts into the front façade of the building are encouraged as are elements such as arcades, canopies, balconies, or extending smaller structures out from the main façade.
- 3. Building designs are encourages with massing so the tall and bulkier portions are less visible from public streets and sidewalks."

Section 9.17, Page 73, Design Guidelines Stormwater facilities (shaded box).

We request that Paragraphs 2 and 3 be changes as follows:

- "2. Stormwater facilities should be integrated into the site concept to provide visual amenity, including above ground ponds where appropriate, or can be installed underground.
- 3. Stormwater infiltration facilities (paved pedestrian pathways) and other Low Impact Development concepts are encouraged and should be integrated within the landscaping concept for parking lots and site perimeters."

Section 10.6, Page 81, Design Guidelines - Monument Signs (shaded box).

Because retail uses will be developed which will have special marketing needs, we request that Paragraph 3 be changed to read as follows:

- "3. Pylon / Pole signs are prohibited, except for retail uses where any pylon / pole signage is encourage to be compatible with adjacent buildings' signage and architecture."

Chapter 11

Because the Smokey Point MPA will be developed over a long period of time, implementation and funding mechanisms must give as much flexibility as possible for owner and developers to work with the City of Marysville with the assurance that they will be reimbursed or credited for their contributions.

Section 11.1.2, page 84.

To clearly describe how the street network guidelines will be implemented over a long build-out period, we believe the following bullets must be added:

- It is critical that responsibility for the road network construction be equitable and roughly proportional to the benefits derived by those land owners developing in the area and broader City, County and regional needs.
- The value of non-monetary contributions of the land owners developing in the area - such as land for right-of-ways and construction of infrastructure - must be credited against any fees, taxes, or other charges. Credit and/or late comers compensation to developers for constructed infrastructure must be allowed.

27

Section 11.2, page 85.

Due to the complexity and length of time for development, funding options must be as broad as possible. The following should be added:

13. Chapter 39.89 RCW allows cities to designate an increment area, finance public improvements expected to encourage private development within the increment area and repay this financing with the additional regular property taxes generated by such private development.

28

14. Chapter 39.102 RCW - Local Infrastructure Financing Tool ("LIFT")- provides a form of tax increment financing for public infrastructure projects within revenue development areas (RDA's) created by a local government. The key feature of the LIFT program is a state sales and use tax credit available to local governments.

Other technical corrections:

Page 3: In recognition of the SPMP's options for the mitigation of critical areas, the 3rd bullet within the list of bullets on page 3, should be changed to read: "Provide protection or mitigation of natural features."

Page 4: Section numbering needs to be corrected.

Figure 8 and Figure 9, pages 38 and 40: The depicted infrastructure needs be included in the figure key in both figures.

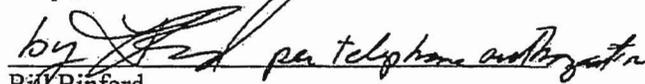
Page 53-54: The text of Section 7.9 and the shaded boxes on page 53 and 54 refer to the facilities both as "Ponds" and "Sites". To avoid confusion, we request that the references be made consistent throughout -either "Pond" or "Site", but not both.

Thank you for working with us to make the Smokey Point Master Plan a document which can support development of the area as a significant regional economic engine.

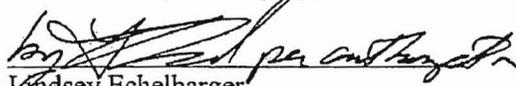

Members of the Planning Commission:

This letter is submitted on behalf of Marysville North I LLC which owns 75 acres within the 687-acre Smokey Point Master Planning Area (MPA) and English Hill Investments, its Manager which also owns nearby properties that are affected by this plan. This letter shall supplement and add targeted additional comments to that letter submitted April 18, 2008 on behalf of ourselves, Glenmont Windward Marysville LLC, Brutus and Associates and the Echelbarger Company. We most definitely support the City's vision for the Smokey Point MPA as a significant economic engine and are committed to helping the City of Marysville further its goal of economic development for this area.

We set forth below additional changes that we believe should be added to or incorporated into the Master Plan

Chapter 3

Page 10, Table 1

It is the consensus of the commercial brokerage agents and landowners that I have polled that the amount of office space, projected at 15,000,000 SF, appears to severely misrepresent the future of this area. Please see the attached letter from Colliers International dated April 19, 2008. While we would like to see more office opportunities as would the city, we submit this information based on our best professional opinion on the realistic future of this market area. The assumption used below will have significantly less impact on future infrastructure and services needed to support this area than the original assumptions show in the draft.

We suggest that a more accurate prediction of future growth in this plan area would be as follows:

- Business-Light Industrial and Mfg uses: 75% to 80% of the available acreage (the floor area for this use would be: 15%-20% office and 80% to 85% Industrial)
- Dedicated Office uses: 20% of the acreage (most of which is anticipated to be 2 story tilt-up, not 3 story steel frame due to cost and market limitations).

The Plan should more clearly define the acreage, both gross and net developable, since the net developable acreage drives the amount of industrial, office and other uses that can be developed. Implementation of the recommendations from the aforementioned letter from the larger group of landowners regarding flexible options on land use would, of course, change the ratios of uses on available acreage within the plan.

Chapter 4

Figures 3, 3a, and 4

- We request that the city insert another alternative into the plan that shows 156th ST NE going straight easterly to 51st Ave NE, then transitioning down to 152nd prior to crossing the RR tracks, and
- That the SPMP be changed to eliminate any recommendation on road network until a corridor alignment study is complete.

Section 4.3, Page 14-15 Development Guidelines (shaded box).

- We request that the east/west Optional Collectors shown at the top of in Figure 4 be re-located southward ¼ mile so that they are fully within the city limits and so that it is centered between two separately owned large contiguous parcels.
- We request that the westerly ¼ mile of the 160th St NE minor arterial alignment be moved 200 ft northward of the location shown in order to honor previously recorded road development agreements which are binding to several landowners and to the city. This landowner submitted a request to the Community Development Director dated November 14, 2007 requesting confirmation of street alignment in accordance with this bullet item and the recorded referenced development agreements.

Section 4.6, Pages 22- 24 (including shaded box)

Design Guidelines for 51st Avenue NE, 152nd Street, and 156th Street: Road ROW to be 90', move bike lanes from the road section and combine with pedestrian pathway along either side of road. Combine open space outside of traffic lanes with ordinary building setbacks to create a 30'+- greenbelt for 10' wide meandering, combined pedestrian pathway. The 30' +/- greenbelt shall be inclusive of the code requirement for projects to

furnish 20' of landscape buffer along arterials. This can be made with a permeable all terrain surfaces eliminating up to 22' of impermeable surface from the design. Or an asphalt section can be used, greatly reducing the costs to construct.

There is some concern that the lane width in areas anticipating heavy truck traffic should be 12' per lane with corresponding reduction in the sidewalk/landscape areas. We urge the city to review city codes in other successful industrial areas on this matter.

Due to the significant financial opportunity that this area presents to the city and the fact that other municipalities and entities are vying for economic development in competition with the City of Marysville, we recommend that the city add an Economic Incentives section to this plan wherein the city identifies alternatives where it can effectively promote this area for business development and incentivize companies to choose Marysville for their new facilities and operations.

We request that this testimony be entered into the public testimony for adoption of this plan. We thank you for your time reviewing these points and encourage you to consider them in your final recommendation of this plan.

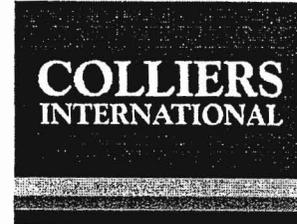

Dear Bill:

In response to your request for me to review the “Land Use Scenario” section of the Smokey Point Draft Master Plan, here are my thoughts:

- The assumption that 35% of the Light Industrial/Manufacturing Use will be office space seems high in comparison to other previously developed sub-markets in South Snohomish County. Seaway Center in South Everett and Harbour Pointe in Mukilteo average 10% - 25% office build-out in their industrial zoned markets. I wouldn't anticipate that the tenants demand for space in Marysville would require any higher office build-out than those markets.
- The 60% industrial vs. 40% office also seems heavy on office and light on industrial. The 4th quarter 2007 total vacancy rate for the Northend Office Market (Mountlake Terrace – Downtown Everett) is 20% vs. industrial at 6.43%. Lynnwood has the overall highest vacancy at 30.7%. Office demand tends to move north and South from downtown Seattle and Bellevue. I would anticipate that a large amount of office space in South Snohomish County will need to be absorbed before demand increases dramatically in Marysville.
- I would also anticipate that the type of construction of the office space would tend to be more 2 story concrete tilt-up than 3 story steel frame because of the difference in cost.

Having attended the hearing at Maryville City Hall on the 15th addressing the Draft Smokey Point Draft Master Plan, I have the following comments.

I support taking a hard look at the alternative Arterial suggestions presented by Jim Tosti. Moving 43rd Ave. NE to the east makes the land and road use much more functional..I also think the Tosti suggestion of moving the connection to 152nd to east of 51st is a much better plan than that suggested in the draft plan proposal.

I agree and concur with the widths and the classifications of the arterials presented in the draft master plan. Perhaps more dialog and thought should go into the layout of the vehicle, bike and people traffic. There is no magic or perfect formula for making these three homogenous.

My last suggestion is to encourage the landowners who have not already done so, to dedicate to the city of Marysville the road right of ways that travel through and serve their land and are needed to fulfill the approved final traffic plan. An example of such a dedication is the 90' wide by 1/2 mile long dedication of 156th St. NE, made by SPBLLC to the City of Marysville in 2007.

Dear Planning Commission Members:

This office represents the interests of Brutus Associates and Arlington Associates (“collectively Brutus”), which together own a total of approximately 151 acres within the Smokey Point Master Plan (“SPMP”) area.

Our clients have been very supportive of the overall process and have worked over the past two years with City staff, consultants and with the larger landowner group to create the draft SPMP document you currently have before you for consideration.

Our clients oppose moving the “S shaped” curve in 156th currently depicted in the Arterial Functional Classifications map on page 16 of the draft SPMP from west further east onto Brutus parcels. No provision in the City’s Capital Facilities Improvement Plan has been made to pay for such a roadway extension. While there is no agreement between the landowners to pay for construction of these interior roads, there has been some discussion regarding creation of a road improvement district (RID). At this time, there has not been sufficient information provided to Brutus to allow for an informed decision on whether Brutus is willing to participate in an RID. In the absence of funding for extending the roadway further over to 67th Ave. NE, and because we see little or no benefit to moving the “S shaped” curve further east than is currently contemplated by the City’s traffic consultants, we would respectfully request that the Planning Commission accept the draft in its present form regarding the location of the curvilinear alignments at the interchange of 156th and 152nd.

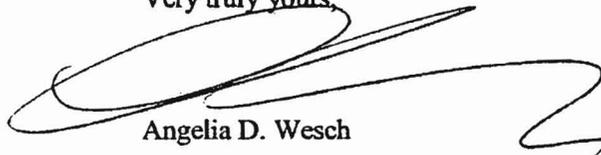

Planning Commission Members,

At the recent Planning Commission Open House on April 15th, I presented an alternative routing plan for the 156th/152nd road extension from Smokey Point eastward past the BNSF tracks. I submitted this plan to address the inadequacies of the road network plan in the March 2008 Draft Smokey Point Master Plan (labeled Figure 4). The text of the Draft SPMP refers to the road improvements shown on Figure 4 as "recommended." Since not one of the property owners was consulted prior to Figure 4 being included in the Draft SPMP, I took it upon myself and my traffic engineer to analyze the road network depicted in Figure 4 and quickly realized that it created more problems than it solved.

In fact, when my alternative was presented, Michael Stringham, the City's traffic consultant to the SPMP, said that my plan did solve several problems and that it would be quite feasible to add this plan to the SPMP and label both plans as "optional". His exact quote was "on the face of it, I have no problem with this plan". Gloria Hirashima, Community Development Director, also concurred and had no problem adding this alternative to the SPMP.

All road network options must stay on the table until a roads analysis study is conducted, which considers the local and regional benefits, costs and impacts of each alternative. Until that analysis is completed, the stakeholders will likely not achieve consensus. However, lack of consensus at this point, should not result in elimination of any alternative.

My request is as follows:

Please recommend to the City Council that the Final SPMP includes at least two or more alternate drawings as alternatives for the road network and label all plans as options. Please recommend that additional language be added to the text requiring an immediate roads analysis study that addresses the final routing of 156th/152nd and the north/south connector known as 143rd. Also, new language should be added that directs the City to immediately initiate an Road Improvement District (RID) study for the construction of the 156th/152nd east/west road.

I will be at the hearing on May 6th and would like to engage the Commission on this issue so that all issues about the road routing are adequately addressed in your recommendations.

Dear Marysville Planning Commission,

As you know, for the past two years, Marysville leaders and community members have worked to make our city a "Healthy Community." The Smokey Point Master Plan is an important opportunity to further that goal. By setting out clear guidelines and expectations before development occurs, the city can work with property owners to give them fair value while creating a broader community benefit from growth.

I used to work in Smokey Point. Now, as a Marysville resident, I pass through the area by bicycle or transit about once a month. My current work involves encouraging people to consider alternatives to driving alone. Ideally, this plan will make those alternatives more attractive through good planning and design. By encouraging transit, bicycle and high occupancy travel, the city might be able to update its traffic demand models and reconsider the need for 5-lane roads as called for in the plan.

Collector Streets

In order to achieve the stated goal of providing pedestrian accessibility, the optional collector streets should be required as roads or paths between developments and "neighborhoods." Smaller blocks and easy connections are essential for promoting pedestrian and bicycle travel.

While I realize that the plan covers a limited area, it needs to plan for better regional bicycle and pedestrian links. Bicycle and pedestrian connections to Smokey Point Boulevard should be sought via 168th Street and other existing and future east-west corridors.

59th Avenue

The Arlington Airport Trail, which begins near 172nd Street & 59th Avenue, must be considered in the plan (add to section 3.3). I believe that 59th Avenue should be planned for a shared use trail, bike lane or wide shared lane (rather than no bike facilities at all in current plan) because:

- 59th Avenue is a through street to the north, with connections (motorized and non-motorized) to Arlington industrial employment areas, parks and downtown.
- A multi-use path or bike lanes on 59th Avenue could connect to the airport trail
- 59th Avenue is considered for extension south to 152nd Street, which would provide a direct connection to Strawberry Fields park.

The extension of 59th Avenue should, in fact, be part of the planned street network. I am unsure why a grade-level crossing of the railroad is not possible, but even if an over or undercrossing is required, the city should plan for this scenario (and show it on maps) just as it is hoping for an interchange at I-5 and 156th Street.

3-Lane Arterials

The design of the 3-lane arterials (160th St and 59th Ave) with parking is a concern to me as a cyclist. With an 11-foot outside lane and parking adjacent, there is no room for cars and bicycles to safely share the road. Sidewalks are designed for slower travel and are not generally safe places for cyclists. A vehicle lane of 14-feet would provide shared space for cars and cyclists. I have seen parking designed at 8 feet – can the 12-foot parking pockets be reduced in width? Perhaps more of the landscaping on those streets can be placed in the median?

Whatever the solution, it should be unacceptable to spend resources on bicycle facilities in adjacent areas, such as 51st Ave and 156th Street, without providing a complete network to encourage full utilization of the investment. Bike lanes or a shared, wide lane should be included in the design for 160th and 59th Avenue

Transit

The plan makes mention of Community Transit's proposed transit center and park & ride nearby in Smokey Point. Were the traffic reduction and economic development benefits of such a facility studied as part of this plan? A transit center with local and regional connections within walking distance of the industrial area should be considered a major amenity, one which the city should actively support both politically and with supporting pedestrian connections. Despite the many benefits of providing a transit hub in the Smokey Point area, a transit center is not listed as one of the recommended transit improvements in 4.4.1.

The plan notes that there are no bus shelters in the study area. I did not see any suggestions to remedy that through mitigation requirements or public or private investment incentives. Bus shelters encourage both transit use and pedestrians in general by providing weather refuge and rest.

Community Transit Route 240 connects Stanwood and Arlington via Smokey Point with hourly service seven days a week. It currently serves the Smokey Point Boulevard north of 172nd Street. If a new Smokey Point Transit Center and park & ride is constructed, Route 240 would serve it. This route should be mentioned in the plan.

Bicycle Parking

The design guidelines spend considerable time discussing the pedestrian environment. Some effort should also be made to make the industrial area welcoming to travel by bicycle for employees and visitors. Bike racks, preferably covered, should be required to be placed in visible locations near front entrances (section 9.6). Employee bike parking facilities should also be encouraged.

Along the same lines, designated, priority parking for employee carpools should be required.

51st Avenue

I strongly support the plans for bike lanes on this road. It is currently the best north-south route for cyclists, and is used by both recreational and commuting cyclists. Industrial development will increase volumes on the road but not decrease the need to maintain this north-south bike route. Due to the volume and speed of traffic, an extra-wide bike lane (5-6 feet) is appropriate.

Thank you for sending the Washington State Department of Community, Trade and Economic Development (CTED) the proposed *Smokey Point Subarea Plan*. We received the draft plan on March 19, 2008. The documents were very detailed. We recognize the substantial investment of time, energy, and resources that these documents represent.

When we review subarea plans, we look for a few key pieces of information. We start by comparing the subarea plan to the comprehensive plan. We check to see how the subarea plan addresses concerns, issues or gaps addressed in the comprehensive plan. We review how the jurisdiction plans to meet the subarea's infrastructure needs. We like to see how the character of the area will be preserved. Finally, we review subarea plans with the notion that it will help developers and policy-makers know what they need to do. In this way, the subarea plan contributes toward the prompt and coordinated review of land use policies, development regulations and development projects.

For the most part, we found much of the above information in the *Smokey Point Subarea Plan*. We particularly like the way the subarea plan addressed the constraints listed in Marysville's Comprehensive Plan for the Smokey Point neighborhood. The subarea plan did an excellent job explaining how development can tackle the problems associated with the area's high groundwater table. It presents some good ideas and plans to preserve and enhance the environmentally sensitive areas in the Hayho Creek and Edgecomb Creek drainage basins. The design guidelines proposed by the subarea plan will assuredly result in an aesthetically pleasing environment. In the end, the subarea plan shows how the area will become the regional economic center envisioned in Marysville's Comprehensive Plan.

We have just a few suggestions that we hope you will consider. They are based on our review of other subarea plans from all over the state of Washington. They include ideas and suggestions



offered to us by other planners and planning commissioners regarding subarea plans. We offer these suggestions with thoughts that they may help your subarea plan better serve as a resource document for the prompt and coordinated review of potential land use policies, regulations and/or development projects.

With this thought in mind, please consider making the following revisions to the *Smokey Point Subarea Plan*.

- **Include a discussion about the current and desired levels of service of key roads in the chapter regarding transportation.**

We found no mention of the level of service for any of the arterials within the master plan area. The subarea plan lays out two options that will have different impacts on level of service standards. One option involves an I-5 interchange at 156th Street. The other option channels traffic to 172nd Street to access the existing interchange. The subarea plan states the later option will result in greater congestion. The later option may also cause Marysville to reconsider its existing level of service standards. By providing information about transportation level of services, the subarea plan will help developers and policy-makers select the best option.

- **Present Marysville's financial plan for transportation improvements.**

The chapter regarding transportation does not have a financial plan. The comprehensive plan states transportation connectivity is a constraint. We suggest Marysville use the *Smokey Point Subarea Plan* to explain how it will fix it. For instance, the subarea plan might compare Marysville's current and/or historical funding capacity to its projected transportation needs. This analysis lays the groundwork for policy-makers to weigh different funding options and the need for intergovernmental coordination. By using the subarea plan to present this information, Marysville moves closer to a viable solution to resolve this major constraint.

- **Elaborate on how Marysville plans to implement and fund the plan.**

We did not find an overall financial plan for the infrastructure improvements listed in the subarea plan. The comprehensive plan and the technical memorandums attached to the subarea plan list the projected costs of various improvements. We suggest the final chapter of the subarea plan summarize these costs in the form of a multiyear financial plan. It should discuss the feasibility of potential funding sources. For example, it might show the gap between the current level of funding sources and the funds needed to make the desired improvements. Knowing the magnitude of this gap gives policy-makers a better idea of the types of funding sources they might consider. For instance, the gap for road improvements may be too large to bridge with development fees. The plan mentions forming special purpose districts, such as a transportation benefit district. A more detailed financial plan provides a better understanding of how much funds such a district may need to generate. It may let them know what mix of funding options they might need to assemble.

Congratulations to you, your staff and Marysville's Planning Commission for the good work this subarea plan represents. The Smokey Point area presents some noteworthy challenges. At the

same time, its location is ideal for economic development. The *Smokey Point Subarea Plan* lays down a very good road map to address these challenges. It shows how the area can become a regional economic center. This plan will become an important, initial step toward enabling this area to achieve its potential. Once again, you deserve congratulations.

Snohomish County Public Works has reviewed the Addendum for the Comprehensive Plan. Our Surface Water Management has submitted the following comments:

1. It was difficult to determine from the documents what changes to the Marysville Comp Plan were being evaluated (i.e., what were new plans vs. plans already evaluated in earlier documents).
2. We support efforts to improve aquatic habitat in the area's streams.
3. It appears that many previous agricultural areas, and their accompanying ditches, will be redeveloped into industrial areas with an urban-type storm drainage system. However, there still appears to be some ag-type land east of the Master Planned area, and we would want to ensure that these areas can still drain as they do at this time, and that the drainage from any upstream ag or other types of land uses is not blocked or slowed due to changes in the storm drainage system.
4. Although there is no mention of Low Impact Development in this document, we would also encourage the use of LID techniques, such as reduced impervious surfaces for buildings, narrowed roads, and stormwater infiltration (as much as possible) to reduce downstream impacts, since the change from ag use to light industrial could significantly increase the quantity of stormwater downstream. In addition, our analysis has shown that, because of the unique characteristics of the Marysville area, standard detention requirements are likely to result in increased peak flows, unless infiltration is effectively employed.

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on this plan.

From the property owners' perspective, the most crucial part of this Smokey Point Master Plan (SPMP) are those provisions guiding the development of infrastructure that will both serve the uses within the SPMP Area and serve as a gateway to the region. Glenmont has two remaining significant concerns that keep me from being able to give unqualified support to this Plan:

#1 Road Alignment:

First, I ask that you recommend the Smokey Point Master Plan require a Smokey Point area-wide routing and impacts study to be conducted as soon as possible so that all proposed regional road networks can be fairly evaluated.

This study should consider the relative impacts and benefits of each alternative with regard to local traffic routings, regional traffic routing, intersection cost and impacts, coordination with internal road system, impacts on surrounding property values, ROW acquisition and critical areas; phasing of implementation, and appropriate RID districting.

Because the study will help identify the best regional road network, it must be conducted on a Smokey Point area-wide basis. It should not be done on a parcel-by-parcel or owner-by-owner basis. If the City will not conduct this study, then the Planning Commission and the Smokey Point Master Plan should endorse the use of an RID for routing and design and then in a later phase, for construction. **I ask that you recommend the formation of an RID for the purpose of funding Smokey Point Master Plan area road network study and design, with the RID boundary including the benefit area of the road system within the SPMP Area.**

Second, until this evaluation study is completed all road alternatives should remain on the table for equal analysis. As with Brutus, I have never given approval for a transition from 156th to 152nd on my property west of 51st. **I oppose inclusion of any alternative that shows that transition on my property, including Figure 4 and the new alternatives proposed by staff, unless at least one alternative is included with a transition east of 51st.**

If there are technical reasons for eliminating any option, those issues should be considered as part of the comprehensive evaluation used to determine a final layout after the master plan is adopted and not before.

Therefore, I ask that at least one alternative with a transition east of 51st Street (e.g. Alternatives A, B, and/or C) be added into the Smokey Point Master Plan ---if space is an issue, put all alternatives in an appendix. If this is not accepted, then all road network alternatives should be removed from the SPMP and a roads analysis should be called for to look at all feasible alternatives.

2- Implementation and Funding

First, the Smokey Point Master Plan should state that incremental construction of the proposed road sections is allowed so that partial roadway sections can be constructed within the full, dedicated ROW to match anticipated traffic demand at the time of project construction.

Construction of the complete road section should not be required until regional traffic demand and the appropriate level of service are reached. At such a time, the additional demand shall be regional and the cost to expand the roadway section should be shared regionally.

Second I ask that the Smokey Point Master Plan include language that road construction and ROW design occur commensurate with the specific adverse impacts of a proposal in accordance with State law and Marysville Municipal Code.

Under state law, the nexus rule permits only those conditions necessary to mitigate a specific adverse impact of a proposal. The rough proportionality requirement in the Growth Management Act limits the extent of the mitigation measures, to those which are roughly proportional to the impact they are designed to mitigate. Both requirements have been incorporated into the GMA amendments and the Marysville Municipal Code and should be acknowledged in the Smokey Point Master Plan.

There was a general introduction of the Master Plan process to date by Gloria Hirashima, followed by an open forum for questions and answers. A summary of the comments raised at the Open House are noted are noted below:

Comments

1. What is the schedule of the process after this open house?
2. Were the property owners on the East side of the railroad tracks notified of the Open House?
3. How does the City plan on implementing the road improvements?
4. Would the City willing to consider a local improvement district with two areas – Smokey Point Master Plan (East) and then an area to west and over Interstate Five?
5. The representative of the major property owners mentioned that they had some proposed cross-sections of road layouts that they would like to be integrated into the Master Plan.
6. The road grid 'recommended' in the plan is of concern to the developers, as once it goes in a plan it tends to become the 'only grid' to be considered.
7. An alternative grid layout was proposed by Jim Tosti and discussed. He asked that the alternative grid be included in the plan as an option to be explored by the city.
8. How do the road improvements proposed in the Master Plan, fit into the 6 year transportation improvement plan?
9. Who is going to pay for the roads?
10. A discussion was brought forth on the bike lanes versus shared pedestrian/bike trails on the major arterials.

11. Concerns were raised about the driveway/access points, with the potential of vehicle/bicycle conflicts.
12. Concern was raised about the width of the roadways and how they seemed excessive.
13. What is the proposed speed limit on the major arterials – 35 to 40 mph.
14. Did bicyclist see on-street parallel parking as a danger?
15. The drainage chapter including Low Impact Development options is good, but the contradiction with the limited LID options in the OTAK technical memo needs to be addressed.
16. How does this plan take into the green house gas emissions concerns and reducing carbon footprints in the future?
17. Are buses and transit in general an important element of this plan?
18. The road alignments are a concern to the property owners and how they may affect their individually owned parcels.
19. How would the roads that are not directly in front of proposed development going to be funded? A local improvement district or the traffic impact fees?
20. Are the design guidelines and development guidelines consistent with the existing code?

CURRENT BUSINESS:

Smokey Point Master Plan-Final Draft Review

Ms. Hirashima recapped the handouts given at the meeting and welcomed comments from Commissioners on the material.

Chairman Muller gave a brief overview of the Open House Event that was held for the property owners and interested residents on April 15th, 2008. He invited Ms. Hirashima to recap Mr. Booth's summary sheet of questions and concerns from the Open House for the Commissioners that were not present at the event. She proceeded to go through the questions and concerns brought up at the Open House

and addressed how these concerns would be handled by the City. Ms. Hirashima solicited the Commissioners for comments.

Commissioner Foster brought up the prospective UW Campus in Marysville and was concerned that this did not seem to be discussed enough. Ms. Hirashima responded by stating that this type of use would be allowed in the existing zoning so she didn't see much reason for concern. Commissioner Foster reiterated that she did not want to see the City locked in to anything. Ms. Hirashima explained that the City Council has authority to change the Comp Plan if the need arises.

Chairman Muller addressed the road issues stating that he thought it would be nice to have a preferred alignment between the City and the property owners now, in order to avoid conflict later. Ms. Hirashima stated that the main goal is to get from 152nd crossing to 156th, and how that was accomplished was not as important as making the connection. Mr. Muller went in to his second concern, what is the process for the roads to be constructed and funded? Ms. Hirashima explained the process that would be gone through to develop an estimate and come back to the City for approval and how the Road Improvement Development delegates these costs. She said that the state statutes govern the process strictly. Mr. Muller further discussed the proposed Road Sections. Are there options for the land owners if we utilize landscape buffers between roadway and pedestrian corridor? He stated that it seems excessive to have two landscape buffers from the design perspective as well as a funding perspective. He agreed with the bicyclists concerns regarding the possibility of the area being commercial and the suggested allowed turn lane width, and thought it should be looked at again.

Commissioner Leifer was concerned about an RID in regards to the alignment of 152nd to 156th. He wanted to know if completing 51st was included in the package with the 152nd to 156th corridor. Ms. Hirashima stated that she thought it would be.

Commissioner Muller questioned Ms. Hirashima on a timeline, wanting to know how long we wait for other agencies to get involved. She responded that the agencies wanted to know the extent of the impact of the project before giving their approval.

Commissioner Foster wanted to know about the concept of moving the bike lane on 43rd out of the road and off of the wetland area. Director Hirashima stated that we still needed to know about wetlands of each particular piece of property involved. These limitations will be better understood as the project progresses.

Commissioner Andes was curious about more office space being created within the project area and if the current zoning allowed for this. Ms. Hirashima stated that the existing zoning did allow for this type of development.

Chairman Muller questioned what exactly the City was expecting from the Commission. Ms. Hirashima stated that flexibility is being allowed for changes as the Commission saw necessary.

Commissioner Leifer was concerned about the final product of roadways if the Commission did not suggest changes. He stated that based on the eventual use of the area, the needs of the roads could change dramatically.

Commissioner Foster stated that she did not want to see a strictly industrial/commercial area that closes up at a specific time of day and that she saw a need for general commercial and housing promoting activity at all times. She wanted to see a mixed use area, including residential, to avoid the area becoming a "scary part of town."

Chairman Muller stated that he is concerned about mixing light industrial and residential housing and how these can coexist. There is a way to do this, though he is not exactly sure how or where. He believes there is more immediate need for industrial and distribution in this area. Muller feels the City should provide some type of financial incentive for prospective developers to offset the costs of the proposed standards and requirements. Perhaps the commission needed to take another look at the interior roads, as they will not attract as much pedestrian traffic and the existing standards might be too much. He also voiced his concerns again about mixing light industrial and residential, pointing out the potential conflict of interests and the potential for unhappy residents and business owners.

Ms. Hirashima agreed with Mr. Muller, stating that the turn around on residential is much quicker than that of industrial, and were we to let the market dictate the development, as Commissioner Foster suggested, it would end up mostly residential based on this fact. A mostly residential corridor was not the direction that Ms. Hirashima and the City Council wanted to see in this area, therefore, Staff would not recommend supporting this type of development.

Commissioner Leifer stressed that he feels there needs to be a connection to the Centennial Trail.

Regional Detention Designs were discussed. It seemed that potential developers wanted the city to look into this avenue. Commissioner Leifer discussed the pros and cons of vault, on site, and regional detention strategies.

Chairman Muller was curious if there would be incentives for low impact designs and development. He was also concerned about on street parking.

Commissioner Leifer discussed that allowing for on street parking may open the door for inappropriate uses such as loading of trucks street side.

Director Hirashima recapped what she felt the concerns were the Commission had voiced and that she would gather more information for them.

There was more discussion about how the potential UW Campus could affect the development and use of this area.

The suggestions of language change supplied to the Commission from English Hills Investments was discussed. Ms. Hirashima stated that she would not support these suggestions for change of language as they would make the plan confusing. She stated that Staff would go over the suggestions in more detail and be prepared to address them.

INFORMATION ITEMS:

1. Critical Area –Comparison of regulations and buffers
2. Density Review of Approved Projects

Ms. Hirashima summarized these items and highlighted the important points for the Commission.

The relocation of the existing streams and potential strategies of how this could be accomplished was discussed. Ms. Hirashima explained that the fisheries were concerned about how the lineal footage would be replaced if the stream were to be relocated.

ADJOURNMENT:

Motion made by Commissioner Foster to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Commissioner Andes. Motion carries unanimously, (5-0). Meeting adjourned at 8:56p.m.

NEW BUSINESS:

Smokey Point Master Plan

Director Hirashima explained that she wanted to go over the Smokey Point Master Plan and address any questions and/or concerns regarding the Plan. She introduced Michael Booth and Michael Stringham.

Mr. Booth gave a quick overview of the Smokey Point Master Plan goals. Commissioner Andes questioned the zoning and the differences between Light Industrial use and Commercial Industrial use. There was discussion regarding these differences and any chance of an inadvertent creation of a competitive situation for

potential developers. Chairman Muller voiced a concern that if the design and road standards are not required in both zones that developers may be drawn to the area with fewer standards and requirements. Ms. Hirashima explained that there seems to be a market for both types of zoning, with and without the standards. Ms. Hirashima noted that the Commission will need to decide where to implement these new design and development standards. Commissioner Leifer noted that it is difficult to implement design and road standards after the fact.

Connectivity issues were discussed in regards to the street grid system and how the existing roadways would be retrofitted to accommodate the proposed development as well as how these principal arterials would connect within different jurisdictions. Mr. Stringham elaborated on the Street Grid System and referred to the discussions that had been had with the current property owners.

Mr. Booth discussed Chapter 2 which deals with design guidelines and development guidelines. He explained that if there is a conflict within these guidelines, the City Planning Department would decide which standard should be followed. Zoning and land use in regards to wetlands, office, and light industrial use were discussed in further detail. Mr. Booth stated that projects would be subject to site specific SEPA plans. The Commission had no comments or revisions on Chapter 2.

Chapter 3 is an estimated land use design utilized in the preparation of traffic proposals. Commissioner Leifer noted his concerns about storm water management and the designation of regional drainage facilities.

Chapter 4, regarding transportation, was addressed by Mr. Stringham. He used the Recommended Street Grid exhibit to discuss the traffic and road demands as well as road functions. He briefly explained that the Principal Arterials would be 5 lanes, the recommendation for the Minor Arterials was 3 lanes, and that there would be a great deal of flexibility in the placement and size of the collector streets. Commissioner Andes questioned how the city would control the areas that are not in the city limits, noting that we cannot force other entities to comply. Mr. Stringham stated that the city is making the assumption that the need for this street grid system will be there in the future. Ms. Hirashima stated that the city will be working with Snohomish County and the City of Arlington to make sure that transitions from one jurisdiction to the next are smooth.

Transit Stations was the next item of discussion. Mr. Stringham stated that the design standards would include accommodations for the transit. He noted that extra space would be set aside in the more common/popular stops along the Principal Arterials for the stations, noting that it was a small amount of space, approximately 5'x 10-15'. Chairman Muller questioned the standards for spacing in regards to the transit shelters. Mr. Stringham responded that, at most, he expected approximately six shelters in this area.

Non-motorized facilities were discussed which included bicycle lanes and multi-use trails. Mr. Stringham stated that bicycle lanes are planned for and included in the standards for Principal Arterials, as well as multi-use trails. He stated that the multi-use trails would run parallel with the arterials for safety purposes. In answer to a question about shared bike/car lanes, Mr. Stringham responded that they are not recommended. Discussion regarding the sections of the arterials that were included in the Master Plan followed. Issues regarding standards for landscape medians and the flexibility thereof depending on the design and development were addressed. The necessity of landscape buffers on the smaller collector roads was questioned. Ms. Hirashima noted that the goal is to achieve continuity. Mr. Strigham noted that the key is flexibility when working with the developers.

The Critical Areas Chapter, Chapter #5, was discussed by Mr. Booth. He explained the studies that had been conducted in the critical areas relating to Edgecomb Creek and Hayho Creek. A discussion in regards to the debate concerning relocation of Edgecomb Creek to the East or West side of the tracks and the pros and cons associated with each alternative was had. The Commission had concerns in regards to how this would be successful since there are multiple entities with jurisdiction, and multiple parties involved with several opinions of how the area should be developed and the critical areas dealt with. Ms. Hirashima explained that plans to develop strategies in coordination with all of the entities involved were beginning now to limit conflicts when it gets closer to the time to develop this area. She explained that the 8-10 agencies involved as well as the property owners had been involved with discussions and meetings to get the goals and expectations laid out and work towards an agreement.

Chapter 6 involving Utilities, existing and proposed, was addressed by Mr. Booth. He explained that the maps the Commission currently had would be improved upon as it was difficult to see the sewer and water lines.

A summary of the three tactical analysis studies conducted by Otak regarding drainage was given. The low impact drainage strategies covered in Chapter 7 were discussed as well as the regional storm drainage ponds. Mr. Booth stated that birds that would be attracted to these ponds was a concern to the FAA, therefore, the ponds were to be located as far South as possible to mitigate this potential problem. The capacity of the existing ponds and the options of handling storm water were discussed.

Mr. Booth summarized the Airport Compatibility and Safety Zones covered in Chapter 8. He briefly explained the zoning allowed within each Airport Zone.

Regarding the Design Guidelines included in Chapter 9, Chairman Muller stated that he believed these to be self explanatory. He also stated that seeing some examples of these guidelines used in existing cities would be very helpful. He wanted to set a

hearing date that allowed the Commission plenty of time to hear from the public and get ample feedback and time to examine information gathered.

ADJOURNMENT:

Motion made by Commissioner Foster to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Commissioner Muller. Motion carries unanimously, (5-0). Meeting adjourned at 9:15p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

April 22, 2008

Motion made by Commissioner Kvangnes, seconded by Commissioner Andes, to approve minutes as presented. Motion carries, (5-0).

PUBLIC HEARING:

Smokey Point Master Plan

Chairman Muller solicited comments from the attending members of the community regarding anything other than what is on the agenda. There was none. He explained that the number of people that would like to speak about the Smokey Point Master Plan (SPMP) would dictate how long each could speak. Mr. Muller then questioned if this meeting had been properly advertised in accordance with code, Community Development Director Hirashima responded that it had.

Staff Comment:

Mary Swenson introduced herself and gave some history of the project. She explained how the City came to encompass this area as part of its Urban Growth Area (UGA). She discussed the high water table of the project site and how the city had invested in retention ponds to make this area developable. Ms. Swenson stated that the City had developed a strategy on becoming competitive with the surrounding areas including Tulalip and Arlington. She described the use of the detention ponds for commercial and industrial use only, not residential. She also discussed how the development of the detention ponds influenced NASCAR in considering this area. Once the area was adopted into the UGA, it was immediately annexed.

Ms. Swenson described how the City had worked with the property owners for the past several years on the potential development of this project. She stated that she feels they have become partners with the city on this. She credited the City's success greatly to Kevin Nielson and Gloria Hirashima in getting everyone going down the same path. She stressed that this area is extremely vital to the city.

Community Development Director Gloria Hirashima gave further background on the project site. The Master Plan was developed in compliance with the Marysville Comprehensive Plan. Ms. Hirashima discussed the multiple meetings held over the last two years, arriving at the current stage of presenting the third draft plan. She then invited Michael Booth of Perteet Inc. to explain the structure of document.

Mr. Booth explained how the Comp Plan and zoning requirements were used to develop the SPMP. This master plan is intended to be an overlay of the Comp Plan. He proceeded to introduce each chapter of the document and gave an overview of what each addressed.

Ms. Hirashima addressed specific comments and recommendations received at the April 15th, 2008 Open House, as well as from various other meetings, regarding the draft. She briefly went over letters from property owners and citizens, and the responses given to each.

Commissioner Foster questioned if property owners had had a chance to review these changes made by the City based on their recommendations. Ms. Hirashima responded that she had sent the property owners copies of these documents. She then briefly went over each of the changes made to the draft based on suggestions from property owners. She recapped the language changes made as well as the included road alignment examples D, E, and G that were submitted by property owners.

Chairman Muller questioned whether there is room to change these alternatives if the need arises. Public Works Director Kevin Neilson responded that the language of the draft did indeed allow for this.

Ms. Hirashima stated that City Staff agreed that SPMP design guidelines should be included. She explained that she had consulted with the City Attorney and that he suggested renaming Design Guidelines to *Design Standards*, as well as adopting Chapter 19.14 as a new section in the Ordinance. She stated that the City did try to accommodate as many of the suggestions as possible.

Commissioner Comment:

Chairman Muller complimented the City on the fact that they had taken into consideration all of the suggested changes and recommendations. Commissioner Foster concurred, adding that it was nice to see that The Department of Trade and Economic Development acknowledged the City's hard work and attention to detail on this Draft Plan.

Director Hirashima addressed the Commission regarding a concern that there is not enough residential land capacity. She explained that County and City agree that there is actually a surplus of residential land capacity as required in the 20 year outlook. Ms. Hirashima pointed out that zoning shown in the handout in Figure 4-2 allows for mixed use in the project area, including residential.

Chairman Muller questioned how to get the area in the 6 year transportation plan. Director Nielson discussed the differences between taxes and traffic mitigation fees and how these affect this particular area. He also addressed Mr. Muller's question of "How do we incent people to develop here first rather than an area where there might be fewer standards to conform to".

Public Comment:

Chairman Muller solicited public comment.

Kristin Kinnamon: 5708 91st PI NE Marysville WA 98270

Ms. Kinnamon expressed that she felt differently about the public being made aware of the Open House Event as Gloria had mentioned. She stated that she could not find mention of it anywhere on the City Website. She then questioned the change reducing the Right of Way to 50 feet and what got lost in this change.

Ms. Hirashima explained that the on street parking had been eliminated. Ms. Kinnamon expressed satisfaction with this change, as the on street parking is not desirable for the biking community.

Ms. Kinnamon went on to explain that she had frequented the Smokey Point Master Plan area in the recent past, and knew the area well. She further emphasized some points she had made previously regarding size of roads and projected traffic. Was there an estimate for approximate number of employees projected for this area, she questioned the Commission. Ms. Hirashima stated that she thought it was approximately 12,000. Ms. Kinnamon encouraged staff to supply carpool parking

and bike facilities. She discussed existing Community Transit service and encouraged the City to promote use of this service. Ms. Kinnamon expressed concern that the Arlington Airport trail connection had not been addressed in draft. She felt that it should be considered and connections made. In response to the Arlington Airport Trail concern, Ms. Hirashima invited Mr. Stringham to respond.

Mr. Stringham addressed three issues he heard Ms. Kinnamon bring up. He explained that bicycle facilities were addressed in the SPMP, bike lanes would be provided. He stated that combined pedestrian and bicycle paths were also incorporated in the draft. He believed that the Centennial Trail connection was important to maintain, and that the draft did in fact address this and connections would be provided. Mr. Stringham discussed the 152nd St and 156th St. trails and the study that had been done on how to provide safe trails based on who the users would be. The conclusion was to create a separate trail.

Mr. Stringham further explained that the Street Standards require sidewalks for pedestrians, keeping them separate from the road traffic. Transit facilities are ensured to accommodate transit in the area, including long term planning. As population infiltrates, facilities can be developed as necessary. Ms. Kinnamon suggested including language referring to collector streets and how to access areas without a huge roundabout.

Bill Craft: 5013 152nd St NE Marysville WA 98270

Mr. Craft looked at the display examples of road alignment, he then stated that the road would angle down cutting through his property and this did not make him happy. Chairman Muller explained there are 4 options and the one Mr. Craft was looking at was only one of the four.

Jim Tosti: 7981 168th Ave NE Redmond WA 98052

Mr. Tosti Discussed the property he owns in the SPMP area. He explained he had worked closely with the City on this entire project. He had attended several meetings with City staff. He was very pleased to say that they (landowners) are very supportive of the SPMP document. He stated that there was one issue to discuss. Road network study is an issue. Drawings provided by the City show the transition from 156th to 152nd west of 51st. Mr. Tosti stated that he, along with the other property owners he represented, wanted to see at least one alternative East of 51st. He stated that 80% of landowners support an alternative to the East of 51st. With this inclusion, they would be behind the draft 100%. Mr. Tosti added that he would like to see a routing plan addressed immediately, noting that without it, nothing can be done. He stated that an RID process needs to be started as well as the routing study. He then supplied a letter regarding funding and implementation to the Commission and Staff. Mr. Tosti thanked the City for the collaborative effort and stated that he feels they are, in the end, partners working together toward the same goal.

Mr. Tosti then responded to the comments made by Ms. Kinnamon. The project site is zoned light industrial; therefore, there will be many trucks through this area every day. He stated that he was concerned about making sure bicycles and pedestrians are compatible with this type of zoning and use. A study that had been conducted in the recent past, estimated 20,000 new employees in the future. Mr. Tosti believed that this spoke to the magnitude of the importance of this project.

Chairman Muller stated that he appreciates the time and effort put in by Jim Tosti.

Bill Binford: 6513 132 Ave NE #345 Kirkland WA 98033

Mr. Binford commended the city's effort on the SPMP draft, stating that this is a very exciting time for the City. He also noted his appreciation for the chance to work with the City throughout the process. Two comments he would like to make. A transportation plan was the first issue he addressed. He expressed that he saw a need for a loop from Exit #205 to 172nd St. He wanted to reexamine the best long term solution to move traffic through this area, regardless of cost, keeping in mind environmental constraints. He agreed with Mr. Tosti that the Draft needs to show at least one alternative for the alignment of 156th straight to 151st St NE.

Second, Mr. Binford brought up the need to be competitive. He supports high quality development, roads, landscape, etc., but noted that lease rates must be competitive. Code requires 20' landscape strip, Mr. Binford does not have an objection to this, but with a 70' or 90' ROW, cost impact gets high. How can we be competitive with areas that do not require this, Mr. Binford questioned. He suggested reducing the 20' requirement to 15', or meander sidewalks into private areas. Mr. Binford admitted that this may seem like a small item in a big picture, but they need to remain competitive to be successful. Requiring landscaping inside and outside the Rights of Way gets very expensive.

With the conclusion of Mr. Binford's presentation, Chairman Muller closed public testimony and opened up discussion from the Commission regarding these comments.

Commissioner Kvangnes stated that she would like to have an alternative for routing. She questioned whether or not Mr. Tosti had requested a stakeholders meeting similar to the one he had mentioned previously. Mr. Tosti responded that he had. Ms. Swenson interjected that she was aware of this request, but that it was not recommended by staff. The Open House Event was held in lieu of this.

Commissioner Andes also liked the alternative of extending 156th, crossing the railroad at a 90 degree angle, and curving into 152nd. Mr. Andes questioned Mr. Tosti as to how many times all of the property owners involved got together before they came to the City. Mr. Tosti clarified that they had worked with the staff several times but felt that they needed an opportunity to converse with the Planning Commission. He stated that all stakeholders had shown up at the Open House, but in this particular setting, the stakeholders were unable to converse with

Commissioners. He felt that a meeting that would be open to the public and allow stakeholders to converse with the Commission would have been beneficial.

Commissioner Leifer questioned the letter from Mr. Tosti regarding RID development and funding, what did Perteet Inc. do in the study? Director Neilson responded that a study had been done including the Lakewood area. Mr. Neilson further indicated that a wetland study would have to be done before proceeding. This study is a very broad one and will be narrowed as the process begins. Legal counsel would need to be consulted before the Commission could recommend and RID plan. The Commission can, however, recommend that Staff move forward with the process.

Commissioner Leifer discussed the extension of 152nd to 156th and how would this go forward without the City's involvement. Ms. Swenson explained that the City could be involved without investing any money. She stated that the City is still at a high level of study, and, that once more studies are done, these issues can be addressed.

Chairman Muller commented that the property owners should be given a window of time within which to decide amongst themselves the most desirable route. If they cannot come to a decision, the City would step in and decide.

Commissioner Leifer thought most of the major issues had been addressed and dealt with in the current version of the draft.

Commissioner Foster concurred with Commissioner Andes about the need for alternatives within the plan.

Chairman Muller noted his concern regarding road alignment and pass through traffic. This project has been designed to be built to dead at 67th with no plan of a future extension. Ultimately, who the main customer is needs to be kept in mind. Many of the potential users of this development are trying to get from HWY 9 to I-5. The next concerns had to do with landscape corridors and signage. How does one find a sign within a 20' landscape buffer and 12' pedestrian pathway? Mr. Muller wanted to see a signage standard developed within landscape corridors and incorporated into the plan making it easy for the users to find their way. Ms. Hirashima responded that sign location is flexible based on tree location etc.

Commissioner Leifer remarked that the building design standards would seem to be unnecessary if there is a 20' landscape buffer in addition to the Right of Way. Director Hirashima stated that language could be included to reduce this landscape buffer requirement.

Chairman Muller questioned flexibility in the corridors. How do we deal with intersections of different widths?

Mr. Booth responded that there is continuity between different ROW's allowing for easy transitions. He further discussed the alignment of 152nd and 156th. He stated that it is a 1300' redirection, taking 30 seconds to traverse by car. Ms. Swenson commented that it is the City's responsibility, since we border I-5, to move people. She continued to discuss the East West connectors needed. For instance, if I-5 shuts down, as it does on occasion, the need to get around causes severe gridlock in the city in its current state.

Mr. Nielson commented that he feels the West side connection option of 152nd would work best.

Mr. Muller would like a point in time to be designated for when the routing and alignment issue would be resolved. He also wanted to see consolidation of landscape corridors and the signage concern addressed. Chairman Muller recommend acceptance of the SPMP draft with revisions discussed in this evenings meeting. He suggested that if the alignment of 152nd to 156th is not resolved within 2 years, the issue would come back to city for recommendation. He wanted to make sure that the language allows for flexibility. Also, the draft should allow for reduction to 15' of landscape buffer if streetscape is required, and a provision for signage to be provided.

Motion made by Chairman Muller to approve the Smokey Point Master Plan Draft with revisions, seconded by Commissioner Leifer to forward the SPMP to City Council as amended. Motion carries, (5-0).

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON, AMENDING THE CITY'S COMPREHENSIVE PLAN BY ADOPTING THE INITIAL SUBAREA PLAN FOR THE SMOKEY POINT AREA AND AMENDING THE CITY'S DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS BY ADOPTING CHAPTER 19.14A MMC.

WHEREAS, the City of Marysville has proposed under RCW 36.70A.130(2)(a)(ii) to amend its comprehensive plan by the initial adoption of a subarea plan for the Smokey Point area; and

WHEREAS, any amendment or revision to a comprehensive land use plan must conform to RCW 36.70A.130; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marysville has met the spirit and intent of RCW 36.70A.130 by (1) providing for a public participation program set forth in Section 1 below, by (2) reviewing and identifying needed revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and development regulations, as described in Section 3 below, and by (3) adopting a subarea plan for the Smokey Point area as set forth in the attached Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, in taking the actions set forth in this Ordinance, the City of Marysville has made a good faith effort to comply with the recommendations of CTED and has submitted to CTED the proposed needed revisions to the City's Comprehensive Plan and development regulations as required by RCW 36.70A.106; and

WHEREAS, in taking the actions set forth in this Ordinance, the City of Marysville has complied with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act, Ch.43.21C RCW, (SEPA) by issuing Addendum 14 to the Final EIS for the City's Comprehensive Plan and Development Regulations; and

WHEREAS, the City received numerous comments on the revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and development regulations from citizens, property owners, legal counsel, consultants, environmental groups, developer organizations, and government entities, which comments the City has duly considered in adopting the needed revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and development regulations set forth in the subarea plan for the Smokey Point area; and

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WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held workshops on the draft subarea plan on March 25, April 8, and April 22, 2008 and a public hearing on May 6, 2008; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a public meeting on June 9, 2008, at which further public input was allowed on the subject of the proposed subarea plan recommended by the Planning Commission; and

WHEREAS, before adopting the needed revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and development regulations set forth in the subarea plan for the Smokey Point area, the City Council has considered the public testimony, the report of staff and the Planning Commission;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Public Participation Program.

The City of Marysville has established and implemented a public participation program for reviewing the proposed adoption of the subarea plan for the Smokey Point area and the proposed revisions to the City's development regulations. The public participation program consisted of the meetings and hearings set forth above and in the attached Exhibit B. The program has provided for broad dissemination of proposals and alternatives, opportunity for written comments, public meetings after effective notice, provision for open discussion, communication programs, information services, and consideration of and response to public comments. Notice of the public meetings and hearings was given by:

- (a) mailing notices to property owners and residents;
- (b) publishing notices in newspapers of general circulation in the City and region;
- (c) notifying public and private groups with known interest in a certain proposal or type of proposal being considered;
- (d) posting notices at City buildings and the post office; and
- (e) making copies of the proposals and alternatives available for purchase or for review at the public library, City website, and City Hall.

Section 2. Review and Identification of Needed Revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and Development Regulations.

The City of Marysville has conducted a thorough review of the City's Comprehensive Plan and development regulations to identify revisions needed in the subarea plan to ensure compliance with the GMA and ensure internal consistency with policies and designations of the

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comprehensive plan. This review has been conducted by the City's Planning Commission, staff, and citizens and has utilized the public participation program set forth in Section 1 above. Based on this review, the City has identified needed revisions to the Comprehensive Plan and development regulations as set forth in the subarea plan for the Smokey Point area, which is set forth in the attached Exhibit A.

Section 3. Approval of Planning Commission's Recommendation and Adoption of Findings and Conclusions.

The City Council hereby approves the Planning Commission's recommendation with minor revisions as set forth in the attached Exhibit A and adopts the Findings and Conclusions set forth in the attached Exhibit B.

Section 4. Adoption of Subarea Plan Amending the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan.

The City Council hereby amends the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan by adopting the subarea plan for the Smokey Point area, which is entitled the "Smokey Point Master Plan, May 2008", is attached hereto as Exhibit A, and is incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 5. Title 19 of the Marysville Municipal Code is hereby amended by adopting Chapter 19.14 A MMC to read as follows:

Chapter 19.14A
DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS –
DESIGN REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SMOKEY POINT MASTER PLAN AREA

Sections:

- [19.14A.010](#) Purpose.
- [19.14A.020](#) Applicability and interpretations.

19.14A.010 Purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to apply the Design Guidelines in the Smokey Point Master Plan, as adopted by Ordinance No. _____, as legally required standards for all new construction in the Smokey Point Master Plan Area (MPA). It is also the purpose of this chapter to:

- (1) Encourage the realization and creation of a desirable and aesthetic environment in the Smokey Point MPA;
- (2) Encourage and promote development which features amenities and excellence in site planning, streetscape, building design and contribution to community charm;
- (3) Encourage creative approaches to the use of land and related physical developments;
- (4) Minimize incompatible and unsightly surroundings and visual blight which prevent orderly community development;

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(5) Allow a mixture of complementary land uses that may include housing, retail, offices, and commercial services, to create economic and social vitality and to encourage the linking of vehicle trips;

(6) Develop commercial and mixed use areas that are safe, comfortable and attractive to pedestrians;

(7) Reinforce streets as public places that encourage pedestrian and bicycle travel;

(8) Reduce opportunities for crimes against persons and property;

(9) Minimize land use conflicts and adverse impacts;

(10) Provide roadway and pedestrian connections between residential and commercial areas;

(11) Provide public places and open space networks to create gateways, gathering places, and recreational opportunities that enhance the natural and built environment.

19.14A.020 Applicability and interpretations.

(1) Applicability.

(a) The Design Guidelines set forth in the Smokey Point Master Plan, as adopted by Ordinance No. _____, shall apply to all new construction in the Smokey Point MPA.

(b) The Design Guidelines shall be legally required standards, which shall be applied by the city to all development approvals and permits in the Smokey Point MPA

(c) The following activities shall be exempt from these standards:

(i) Construction activities which do not require a building permit;

(ii) Interior remodels of existing structures;

(iii) Modifications or additions to existing multifamily, commercial, industrial, office and public properties when the modification or addition:

(A) Constitutes less than 10 percent of the existing horizontal square footage of the use or structure; and

(B) Constitutes less than 10 percent of the existing building's exterior facade.

(d) These standards are intended to supplement the zoning standards in the Marysville Municipal Code. Where these standards and the zoning ordinance standards conflict, the city shall determine which regulation applies based on which is more in the public interest and more consistent with the comprehensive plan.

(2) Interpreting and Applying the Design Standards.

(a) These standards capture the community visions and values as reflected in the comprehensive plan's neighborhood planning areas. The city's community development director (hereinafter referred to as director) retains full authority to determine whether a proposal meets these standards.

(b) Within these standards, certain words are used to indicate the relative importance and priority the city places upon a particular standard.

(i) The words "shall," "must," and "is/are required", or words with their equivalent meaning, mean that the development proposal must comply with the standard unless the director finds that:

(A) The standard is not applicable in the particular instance; or

(B) The development proposal meets the intent of the standards in some other manner.

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- (ii) The word “should”, or words with its equivalent meaning, mean that the development proposal will comply with the standard unless the director finds that:
- (A) The standard is not applicable in the particular instance;
 - (B) The development proposal meets the intent of the standards in some other manner; or
 - (C) There is convincing evidence that applying the standard would not be in the public interest.
- (iii) The words “is/are encouraged,” “can,” “consider,” “help,” and “allow”, or words with their equivalent meaning, mean that the action or characteristic is allowed and will usually be viewed as a positive element in the city’s review.
- (c) The project proponent may submit proposals that he/she feels meet the intent of the standards but not necessarily the specifics of one or more standards. In this case, the director will determine if the intent of the standard has been met.

Section 6. Severability.

If any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance.

Section 7. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect five days after its publication by summary.
