Regular Meeting

November 13, 2007

Call to Order / Invocation / Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Dennis Kendall called the meeting of the Marysville City Council to order at 7:00 p.m. The invocation was given by Pastor Kurt Onken of the Messiah Lutheran Church. Mayor Kendall led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call

Also Present: Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson, Finance Director Sandy Langdon, Community Development Director Gloria Hirashima, Public Works Director Paul Roberts, Chief of Police Rick Smith, Commander Ralph Krusey, Commander Rob Lamoureux, Parks and Recreation Director Jim Ballew, City Attorney Grant Weed, Accounting Manager Denise Gritton, City Clerk Tracy Jeffries, Recording Secretary Laurie Hugdahl

Chief Administrative Officer Swenson noted that Councilmember Wright was in Washington DC and that Councilmember Nehring would be arriving late due to work responsibilities.

Motion made by Councilmember Seibert, seconded by Councilmember Vaughan, to excuse the absence of Councilmember Wright. **Motion** passed unanimously (5-0).

Committee Reports

Councilmember Seibert reported on the Public Works Committee meeting. Topics discussed included:

- Presentation on Water Comprehensive Plan

- SR 529 Bridge – proposed piling support system will not work in Ebey Slough so cost will increased
- Freight Mobility – Everett doing study to see how 529 can tie into I-5
- Revisions in sign code discussions

Presentations

A. Proclamation - World Diabetes Day.

Mayor Kendall read the proclamation declaring November 14, 2007 as World Diabetes Day in support of the UN Resolution.

B. Oath of Office.

Danielle Rusch and Belinda Paxton were sworn in as Marysville Police Officers.

Audience Participation

Edward Mohs, 1214 Beach Street, Marysville, WA, discussed his involvement since September in 40 Days for Life to express opposition to abortion and to intercede before a woman ends her pregnancy. The group seeks to have every woman receive an ultrasound and to receive respectful educational materials. He spoke in opposition to Planned Parenthood's existence in the community. He invited the public to pray with them and help them end abortion in our area.

Jeri Short, 6917 40th Street NE, Marysville, expressed her support for audio taping executive sessions. She said she was disheartened and saddened by the fact that the Council did not discuss the road going into the Sunnyside area at the joint School Board/Council meeting on October 29. She emphasized that she was opposed to the road going through her property, taking one of her children's homes and forcing them to move their dead. She pleaded with the Council to stop the road from going through their property. She stated that they had never had a workshop on this matter.

Becci Nixon, 4024 71st Avenue NE, Marysville, urged the Council to not approve Amendment 5, stating that there are other more viable options. She said that there has not been a workshop to come up with a common plan. She was extremely frustrated and felt that she has not been heard on this matter. She urged the Council to listen to the audiotapes of the Planning Commission meetings.

Edward Mohs, 1214 Beach Street, Marysville, spoke in support of Jeri Short and Becci Nixon. He urged the Council to bring people in and have community meetings to arrive at a better solution.

Councilmember Nehring arrived at 7:33 p.m.

Motion made by Councilmember Vaughan, seconded by Councilmember Nehring, to authorize the Mayor to award and sign the Facility HVAC Maintenance Services Contract to WA Botting Company. **Motion** passed unanimously (6-0).

Public Hearings

9. 2008 Budget

The hearing was opened at 7:42 p.m. Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson commented that they would be recommending that the Council take the 1% this year. Finance Director Sandy Langdon stated that economic development over the last two years has greatly improved the City's budget situation this year compared to the last few years. CAO Swenson commented that a Boeing contract that will be up mid-year may have an impact and the City's plans for mid-year spending.

Chief Administrative Officer Mary Swenson and Finance Director Sandy Langdon gave a PowerPoint presentation (as contained in Council's packet). They noted that sales tax has surpassed property taxes and this is a very conservative estimate. There was discussion about how the City had lost their banked amount when they did the levy LID lift. Staff is recommending that Council takes the 1% Regular Property Tax levy to fund Community Policing Officer.

CAO Swenson commented that the police department is anticipating large expenditures mid-year for technology expenses. This has been addressed in the Tribal Gaming Fund.

CAO Swenson discussed the near doubling of expenses in court costs and noted that this is due to the opening of the new court and new hires throughout the year. She emphasized that the court expenses needed to happen in order to function as a viable community court.

Finance Director Langdon requested holding the hearing tonight, but asked Council to hold adoption until November 26.

Public Testimony:

Mayor Kendall solicited public comment on the budget. There was none. The public hearing was closed at 8:18 p.m.

Council Discussion:

Councilmember Seibert commented that it was good to see the sales tax revenue was going up. He commended the Mayor for the balanced budget this year. He stated that he would not be in favor of the 1% property tax increase.

Councilmember Nehring was pleased to see the sales tax revenues increasing. He asked if the amounts were conservative. Finance Director Langdon explained that they were. There is no new retail growth shown in the number. Councilmember Nehring asked if there was a way to determine how much the new retail growth costs in terms of new roads, policing, etc. Finance Director Langdon and CAO Swenson explained how they could try to come up with some figures, but this would be difficult to nail down. Councilmember Nehring said he thought it was a net gain, but he was curious what the numbers would show. There was discussion about the gains in terms of time saved by residents who could now do more of their shopping close to home.

Councilmember Phillips commented that he was not thrilled with the purchase of the Blackberry's. He thinks there are other alternatives that could be considered. He also expressed concern about the way the I-Net budget was handled. Finally, he feels that he would be more comfortable with a line item budget or a form of a line item budget for each department so there are more checks and balances.

Councilmember Soriano asked for a breakdown of increased revenues for Intergovernmental and Charges for Services. Finance Director Langdon reviewed these.

Councilmember Vaughan asked if county, state or national level budgets had line item budgets. Director Langdon explained that they do not because it eliminates flexibility within the budget. Mayor Kendall discussed how this is a huge time savings. Chief Administrative Officer Swenson said that it comes down to trust in the operation of the business of running the city.

Councilmember Vaughan observed that business people do not typically use Blackberry's, but government people do. There was some discussion about the use of employee vehicles, pool vehicles and car allowances. Councilmember Vaughan discussed his trust in the Mayor, staff and the directors who have proven to be wise stewards of the City's resources. He stated that he would not be in favor of the 1% property tax increase. He commended the Council's decision to do the right thing when it was hard to do and now they are reaping the benefits for the citizens. Thanks to staff for the budget. Sandy Langdon commented that one of the main reasons that the Blackberry's are used because of the security level associated with them.

Councilmember Seibert discussed savings associated with car allowances. He discussed the time savings associated with not doing a line item budget. Regarding the costs versus benefits of economic development, he noted that infrastructure improvements are a one-time cost, but the sales tax benefits are long term. It may be difficult to show we are breaking even over five years, but over the long term he thinks that it definitely will be a benefit. Thanks to staff for the budget.

Councilmember Nehring asked about the "Infrastructure in disrepair, need for \$1 million in annual maintenance" costs. Paul Roberts discussed the Pavement Management System and the needs they are facing. They will be doing another study and will come back with new numbers on that system.

Councilmember Nehring pointed to the improvements in the Financial Planning Model compared to several years ago. Director Langdon attributed this to the sales tax increases. There was discussion about changes they have made in budgeting that have also improved the City's financial position. Councilmember Nehring thanked staff for their work on the budget.

Councilmember Rasmussen commended the conservative approach to the revenues that are coming in. She thanked the staff for their hard work on this and their aggressive approach to saving and finding money. She expressed appreciation for the business focus of the staff at the City of Marysville. She spoke in support of the 1% increase because her opinion was that if they do not take it they are actually falling behind. The opportunity to have community policing would far exceed the value of the estimated approximate \$4 per household annually. She spoke against any utility tax increases. She commended the concept of running the City like a business which is practiced by the Mayor and the staff. She spoke in support of the budget as presented.

Councilmember Seibert asked if the community policing position would be funded out of the general fund. Ms. Swenson affirmed that it would. There was discussion about the importance of community safety versus quality of life issues.

Councilmember Vaughan discussed his strong opposition to property taxes in general and his belief in the sanctity of property ownership. The reason they have been able to do a lot with regard to traffic improvements is because they have been creative with other ways of getting money into the City. He stressed the importance of continuing to hold to their position of no property tax increases.

Councilmember Soriano spoke in support of taking the 1%. He does not think it undermines the mission of the Council.

Councilmember Rasmussen pointed out that taking the 1% once every five years does not amount to a council that is eager to raise taxes. She thinks that citizens would not be opposed to this.

Councilmember Vaughan pointed to recent elections that show that people are deeply opposed to tax increases.

Councilmember Seibert concurred that citizens are not in support of increasing taxes.

Councilmember Nehring asked why Councilmember Rasmussen was opposed to utility taxes. She replied that utility taxes generally hit those among us who are least able to afford it. Councilmember Nehring said he thinks that they underestimate the voters' opinion of tax increases.

Councilmember Seibert had a question about the Planning Commission minutes. There was some discussion about the minutes. He discussed a concern about property being mentioned when it had not been purchased yet. Mary Swenson concurred and noted they would look into this.

Mayor Pro Tem Nehring asked about future consequences of leaving the existing concrete. Kevin Nielsen explained that as long as the concrete blocks are in good shape they are a good undersurface for asphalt. If they are not in good shape they can cause problems in the future.

Councilmember Seibert commented that the concrete blocks can be a limiting factor for width in the future because when you try to add to the concrete panel it is difficult to get it even. Mr. Nielsen concurred and noted that they would probably not try to add on to the sides in the future; they would most likely "rubbleize" it.

Mayor Pro Tem Nehring commented that items 16-20 are for the different boards and committees that need nominating votes. Action will be taken next week.

17. Snohomish County Emergency Management Advisory Board Appointment; Mayor Dennis Kendall and Chief Rick Smith as Alternate.

18. Snohomish County Emergency Radio System (SERS) Board Appointment; Mayor Dennis Kendall and Chief Rick Smith as Alternate.

19. Snohomish Health District Board of Health Re-Appointment; Donna Wright.

20. Community Transit Board Appointment; Mayor Dennis Kendall.

24. Ordinance Number Correction

Grant Weed explained the need for a minute entry to reflect the correction to an ordinance number given last week. At the last meeting the first ordinance in the group that was adopted was given a number that had already been used and would have resulted in a duplication of numbers. Instead of renumbering all of the ordinances, just the first one will be revised from Ordinance 2708 to 2719 at the next meeting.

Staff Business

Mary Swenson discussed the University of Washington report. The panel's recommendation is the Everett station site. She discussed serious issues the City had with the report and the responses they have made. It was noted that the panel did not make the final decision and it is now up to the legislature. She noted that in the *Seattle Times* article, the President of the University of Washington Emmett was quoted as saying that this might facilitate the closing of the Bothell campus.

Councilmember Seibert commented that the *Herald's* article talked about the City's consultant and made some inappropriate and inaccurate comments. Swenson concurred and discussed this. The City believes that the Marysville site is the best site and will best serve the region.

Kevin Nielsen commented on the comparison of costs with the two sites and noted the merits of the Marysville site.

CAO Swenson announced that Providence Hospital has purchased property up in the area near where the campus is being planned. They plan to build a medical services campus. She remarked that the regional pond had been a determining factor in their decision to purchase. There was discussion about how this would be a nice complement to the University.

Kevin Nielsen informed the Council that 528 from I-5 to State will be overlaid by WSDOT in the spring.

Jeff Seibert said he had received a complaint from a business owner on Columbia and 4th about accidents from people making left-hand turns there. Kevin said this has been discussed at the Traffic Safety Committee and will be brought up at the Public Safety Committee. There has already been correspondence with this owner and they will continue to correspond with them.

Kevin Nielsen remarked that there are now double right-turn lanes off of 27th from Costco. This will be a huge improvement. There was discussion about holiday traffic in this area.

Grant Weed commented that cities can forgo the formal public works bid process if they use a small works roster for smaller projects. The City of Lynnwood has taken the lead in the small works roster, but will stop providing this service. MRSC has agreed to take on that service for cities throughout the state. Sandy Langdon said that City Clerk Tracy Jeffries has been following this and remarked that Bellevue also has a list that is very good.

Call on Councilmembers

Carmen Rasmussen said that she and Councilmember Soriano went to Human Services Council Community Alliance Partnerships Forum where Marysville received several awards. The City received the Youth Collaboration Award for the Marysville Youth Action Network and the 2007 Community Collaboration Award for the Marysville Healthy Communities program. Several youth had spoken about how the Youth Action Network has been a positive thing in their lives. Jim Ballew had spoken as a representative for the City. Jim Strickland had spoken on behalf of the Youth Action Network. Overall, it was a great evening and she was very proud to be representing the City.

Donna Wright asked when Snohomish County Cities and Towns would be selecting the new officers and people to serve on various committees. Soriano thought it was in the last meeting of the year, but indicated that he could check on that.

Jeff Vaughan had no comments.

Jeff Seibert had no comments.

John Soriano reported that Jim Strickland and Jim Ballew represented the programs very well. The activities that were represented by those groups portrayed Marysville as a very progressive city. He stated that he would check on representatives to the SCC group.

Lee Phillips wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving.

Jon Nehring wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving.

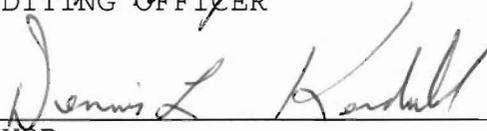

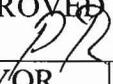

This project is associated with the proposed Interlocal Agreement between the City and Snohomish County for the City's watermain extension and the County's road rehabilitation project. Originally the County was proposing to do a total reconstruction of the road between 108th Street and 132nd Street. However, when estimates for construction costs were prepared, the Costs were higher than the County wanted to pay, so they decided to scale back their project and leave the existing concrete pavement in place and only replace the existing asphalt. By making these changes, this substantially increased the costs for construction of Marysville's water main. Marysville now would not only be responsible for trenching through the existing concrete pavement, but we would also have to pay for the cost of replacing the concrete and jeopardizing the integrity of the roadway structure. This added about another \$400,000.00 to the cost of Marysville's water main. Because of this extra cost, staff started looking at alternative alignments where the main doesn't need to be placed under the road structure.

An alignment was selected through the open fields west of 67th Avenue that would most likely lie within future road right of way. Preliminary contact was made with the property owners and they did not seem to have any objection to the water main. The next step is to obtain appraisals for the necessary easements and make offers. Staff anticipates a savings to the City of approximately \$300,000 by taking this new alignment.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Public Works Staff recommends the City Council authorize the Mayor to sign the attached Professional Services Supplemental Agreement No. 2 with Otak in an amount not to exceed \$27,983.00.

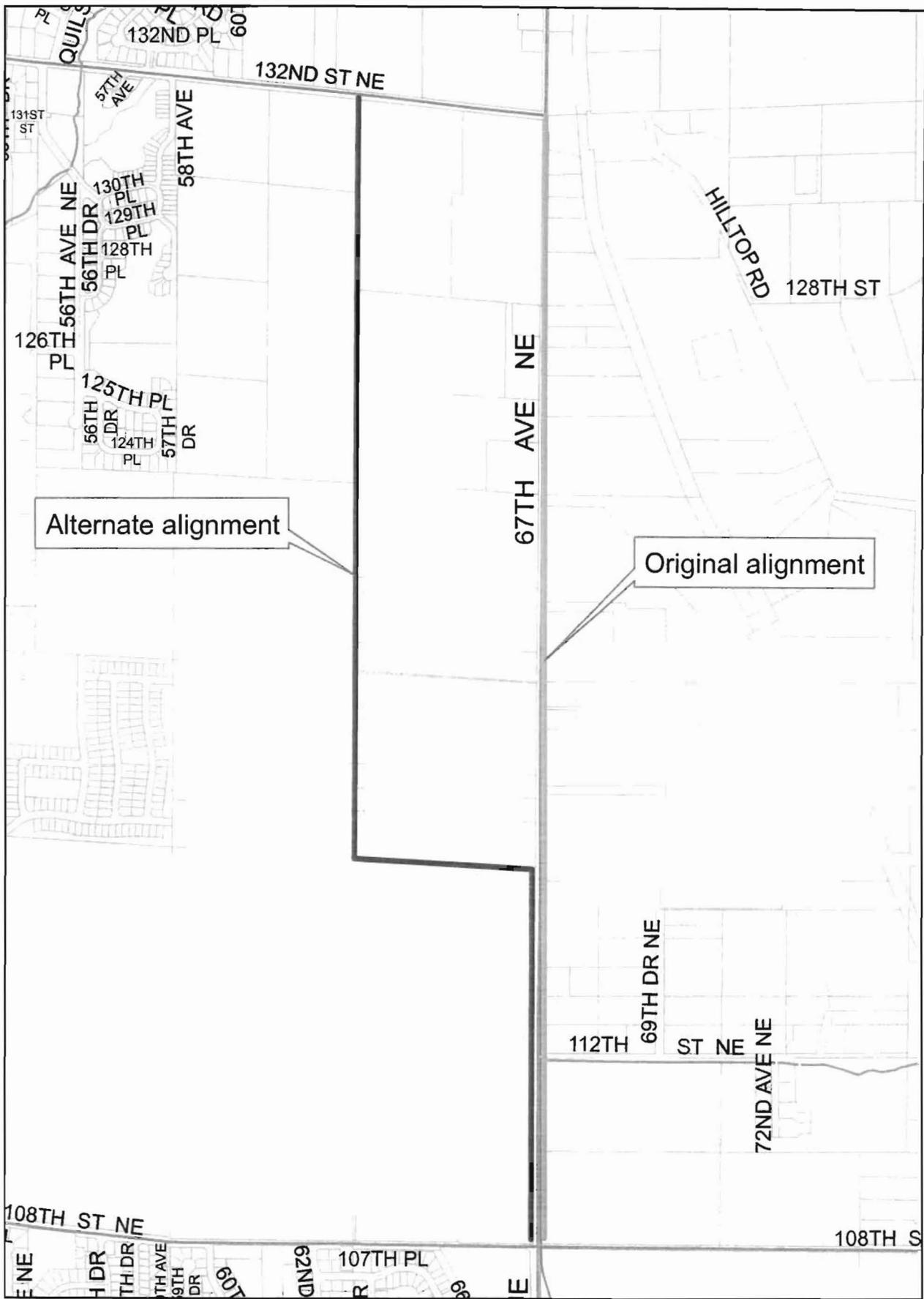

The Marysville Planning Commission (PC) completed their review and recommendations for the Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014 (CFP). The CFP is the document that communicates the City’s plan for capital construction and purchases for a six-year period, and beyond. The Marysville CFP actually considers capital construction for a period of seven years, whereby, the CFP would be adopted biennially with the Budget.

While the CFP does not cover routine maintenance, it does include construction, engineering, administration, permitting, taxes and interest. Capital improvements that are included in the CFP are generally defined as any structure, improvement, piece of equipment or other major asset, including land that has a useful life of at least ten year.

The PC held a public workshop on September 25, 2007 and a Public Hearing on October 23, 2007 to accept public comment and to review the CFP following public notice. The PC recommendation is reflected in the minutes attached hereto.

GMA allows jurisdictions to amend the Comprehensive Plan *not more than once* per calendar year. The statutory exceptions, contained in GMA, to the once per year adoption of amendments to the Comprehensive Plan are either, the amendment would need to be part of the budget process, or it needs to be an emergency. Therefore, the CFP is proposed to be adopted concurrently with the 2008 Budget.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Affirm the PC’s recommendation and adopt the Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014 by individual Ordinance, concurrently with the 2008 Budget.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON, AMENDING THE MARYSVILLE GROWTH MANAGEMENT COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, ORDINANCE NO. 2569, AS AMENDED, BY ADOPTING THE MARYSVILLE CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN 2008 – 2014 AS A SUB-ELEMENT OF THE COMPREHENSIVE PLAN, CONCURRENTLY WITH AND PART OF THE ADOPTION OF THE 2008 BUDGET ORDINANCE .

WHEREAS, on April 27, 2005 the Marysville City Council enacted Ordinance No. 2569 adopting an updated Growth Management Comprehensive Plan (“Comprehensive Plan”) for the City of Marysville; and

WHEREAS, the Growth Management Act allows jurisdictions to amend comprehensive plans once a year, except in those situations enumerated in RCW 36.70A.130(2)(a), which include the amendment of the capital facilities element of a comprehensive plan that occurs concurrently with the adoption or amendment of a city budget; and

WHEREAS, adoption of the Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014 does impact the City’s annual budget and as such, the City’s 2008 Budget adopted pursuant to Ordinance No. _____ should include the CFP; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014 is the document that communicates the City’s plan for capital construction and purchases for a six-year period, and beyond, as required by the Growth Management Act; and

WHEREAS, following public notice and comment, the City issued Addendum No. 13 to the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the City of Marysville Comprehensive Plan, on September 25, 2007, which Addendum No. 13 addresses the environmental impacts of the proposed Capital Facilities Plan 2008-2013; and

WHEREAS, the Marysville Planning Commission held a public workshop on September 24, 2007, and held a public hearing on October 23, 2007 to accept public comment and to review the proposed Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 –2014; and

WHEREAS, on November 26, 2007 the Marysville City Council reviewed the Planning Commission’s recommendation relating to the adoption of the Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014 as a sub-element of the City’s Growth Management Comprehensive Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The document entitled “Marysville Capital Facilities Plan 2008 – 2014” is hereby adopted and incorporated as a sub-element of the City’s Growth Management Comprehensive Plan.

A copy of said plan shall be made available for inspection and review at the office of the City Clerk and the office of Community Development.

Section 2. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or work of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

XII. CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN

INTRODUCTION

The Washington State Growth Management Act requires that the City of Marysville develop a Comprehensive Plan that includes five mandatory planning elements, and suggests the inclusion of *optional* elements. The mandatory elements are:

- 1) *Capital facilities element*, with a six year plan for financing identified capital needs.
- 2) Land use element.
- 3) Housing element.
- 4) Utilities element.
- 5) Transportation element.

The City of Marysville's Comprehensive Plan also includes an Economic Development, Parks and Open Space, Public Services & Facilities and Environmental & Resource Management elements.

The Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) is the document that communicates the City's plan for capital construction and purchases for six-years and beyond as required by the Growth Management Act. Capital projects included in the 6-year CFP are grouped by the following departments: **Public Works** (transportation and roadway, water, sewer, storm drainage), **City Facilities** and **Parks & Open Space**. Additionally, the City of Marysville adopted the Capital Facilities Plans for the Marysville, Lake Stevens and Lakewood School Districts as referenced herein.

What are Capital Facilities, and Why Do We Need to Plan for Them?

Capital facilities are the public facilities we use on a daily basis. Presently the City of Marysville is responsible for providing facilities and services, which include police, water and sewer service, streets, parks, library, and solid waste collection. In order to be fiscally responsible, it is imperative that a realistic Capital Facilities Plan (CFP) be formulated, adopted, and reviewed to ensure the acquisition, maintenance, and construction of the capital facilities needed to sustain the residents, businesses and industries at an acceptable level of service, while protecting the health, welfare, and safety of the community as a whole.

While the CFP does not cover routine maintenance, it does include construction, engineering, administration, permitting, taxes, and interest. Capital improvements that are included in the CFP are generally defined as any structure, improvement, piece of equipment or other major asset, including land that has a useful life of at least ten years.

All of these facilities must be planned for years in advance to assure that they will be available and adequate to serve all who need or desire to utilize them. Such planning involves determining not only where the facilities will be needed, but when; and not only how much they will cost, but how they will be paid for.

Financial planning and implementation of capital facilities cannot be effectively carried out on an annual basis, since their financing requires multi-year commitments of fiscal resources. Thus the CFP becomes a long term planning and budgeting tool with a planning period of six years and beyond.

The CFP is an important link between the City's planning budgetary processes, allowing us to determine the projects that are needed to achieve the goals of the Comprehensive Plan and directly related to growth management and plan implementation. If the funding for new capital improvement falls short of the assumed levels, and phasing or other methods do not resolve the shortfall, the City will reassess the land use to bring the plan and its required funding into balance.

Concurrency and Levels-of-Service Requirements

The Growth Management Act (GMA) requires jurisdictions to have capital facilities in place and readily available when new development occurs or a service area population grows. This concept is known as *concurrency*. The GMA requires concurrency for transportation facilities and also requires all other public facilities to be "adequate." Specifically, this means that:

- 1) All public facilities needed to serve new development and/or a growing service area population must be in place at the time of initial need. If the facilities are not in place, a financial commitment must have been made to provide the facilities within six years of the time of the initial need; and
- 2) Such facilities must be of sufficient capacity to serve the service area population without decreasing service levels below locally established minimum levels, known as *levels-of-service*.

Levels-of-service are quantifiable measures of capacity, such as acres of parkland per capita, vehicle capacity of a roadway, or gallons per customer per day utilizing the city's water system.

Minimum standards are established at the local level. Factors that influence local standards are citizen, city council and planning commission recommendations, national standards, federal and state mandates, and the standards of neighboring jurisdictions.

The GMA stipulates that if a jurisdiction is unable to provide or finance capital facilities in a manner that meets concurrency and level-of-service requirements, it must either:

- (a) adopt and enforce ordinances which prohibit approval of proposed development if such development would cause levels-of-service to decline below locally established standards, or
- (b) lower established standards for levels-of-service.

Determining Where, When and How Capital Facilities Will be Built

In planning for future capital facilities, several factors have to be considered. Many are unique to the type of facility being planned. Sources of financing can only be used for certain types of projects. This capital facilities plan, therefore, is actually the product of many separate but coordinated planning documents, each focusing on a specific type of facility. Future sewer requirements are addressed via a sewer plan; parks facilities through a parks and recreation plan; storm drainage facility needs through stormwater basin plans; water facility needs through a water plan; and transportation needs through a transportation plan.

In addition, the recommendations of local citizens, the advisory boards, and the Planning Commission are considered when determining types and locations of projects. Some capital needs of the City are not specifically included in a comprehensive plan. Nonetheless, many of these projects are vital to the quality of life in Marysville. However, these projects do meet the growth management definition of capital facilities because of the nature of the improvement, its cost or useful life.

Capital Facilities Not Provided by the City

In addition to planning for public buildings, streets, parks, trails, water systems, sewer systems, and storm drainage systems, the GMA requires that jurisdictions plan for public school facilities. These facilities are planned for and provided throughout the UGA by the Marysville, Lake Stevens and Lakewood School Districts. Each county and city must also provide a process for identifying and citing "essential public facilities" within our area. Such facilities could include major regional facilities that are needed but difficult to site, such as airports, state educational facilities, solid-waste handling facilities, substance abuse and mental health facilities, group homes and others. The City of Marysville adopted Chapter 19.55 MMC, *Siting Process For Essential Public Facilities*, in order to establish procedures for siting of essential public facilities in accordance with the Washington Administrative Code (WAC) and Revised Code of Washington (RCW).

DESCRIPTION OF REVENUE SOURCES

Below is a description of the various revenue sources used to fund Capital Facilities. The City Council must appropriate all revenue sources before they are used on a capital project.

Method of Funding	Description
General Fund	General Fund appropriations are "operating" funds appropriated by the City Council from the City's General Fund. General Fund revenues mainly support general government services, security of persons and property, and parks. Sources of general fund revenue include property taxes, sales tax, fines, fees, charges for services, and investment earnings.
Secured Debt	Secured Debt provides long-term (10-30 years) financing for capital projects. Repayment of this long-term debt is usually from General Fund Revenues for G.O. and Councilmanic. Utility rates and user fees are typical sources for repaying Revenue Bonds.
LID's	Local Improvement District (LID) is a special tax assessment fund for projects that benefit a specific geographic area and a specific needed improvement. The City issues bonds for the improvements and liens/bills the benefiting properties for their portions of the assessment.
Proprietary Funds	Proprietary Funds include the following funds: Water/Sewer Utility, Surface Water Management, Solid Waste, and Golf Course Operating. Each of these proprietary funds has a dedicated source of revenue that may be appropriated by the City Council for capital projects. Sources of proprietary funds include fees, charges for services rendered, taxes, grants, impact fees, and investment earnings.
Special Revenue Funds	Special Revenue Funds, like the General Fund, derive revenue from taxes, charges for services, and other general governmental sources such as state shared revenues. Unlike the General Fund, Special Revenue Fund expenditures are limited by statute or ordinance to specific purposes. Examples are the Streets, Arterial Streets, Hotel/Motel Tax, and Tribal Gaming Funds.
Impact/Mitigation Fees	These fees are assessed to offset the costs of growth to the public facilities of the City. This is accomplished by requiring developers to pay for improvements based on the impact of their development upon the City's infrastructure and corresponding comprehensive plans. Examples of impact fees are Transportation, Parks, and Traffic mitigation fees. These fees are collected at the time building permits are issued.
REET I & II	Real Estate Excise Taxes (REET) are taxes applied to sale of real estate. The City collects an amount equal to 0.5% of the transaction. The proceeds are divided equally between REET I and REET II. These funds must be used for capital projects, which includes planning, acquisition, construction, reconstruction, repair or improvement of streets, roads, sidewalks, street and road lighting systems, traffic signals, bridges, domestic water systems, storm and sanitary sewer systems, parks, recreational facilities, fire protection facilities, trails, libraries, and administrative and judicial facilities. REET II can not be used for new construction of park, recreational, trails, law enforcement facilities, fire protection facilities, libraries, and administrative and judicial facilities.
Grants	Grants are amounts received from the federal and state government and other entities in response to a grant application from the City. Grants usually fund a specific project or type of project within a given type of facility. For example, the City regularly applies for and receives grants to fund portions of specific road projects.
Other/Miscellaneous	This designation of funding for CIP projects includes specific funds that are not specifically identified in the CIP because of their size. Revenues from these funds must meet the same tests as other fund sources for revenue adequacy.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. City of Marysville 2008-2014 Capital Facilities Plan

Mr. Holland stated that the plan before the commission is a draft that will be amended biennially, and is valid beyond the six years required. To date an addendum to the Marysville Comprehensive Plan FEIS has been issued and forwarded to all the required parties. The draft was also sent to Washington State Department of Community Trade & Economic Development for a 60 day review. The only thing that is lacking in the existing draft is the section for city-owned properties that are in the process of being compiled for the next round. In addition, there are a few projects that are missing both in the long range section and the for storm water where the financial data was not received in time. Draft two will include all these things. Our hope is that the CFP will be adopted with the 2008 – 2009 budget process, scheduled for November with adoption in December. Staff requests a hearing October 23, 2007 to review the final draft; as well as input from the commission on the content (formatting, information).

Commission Questions:

- Commission Voigt and Mr. Holland discussed the financial process and how it was developed.
- Chairman Muller inquired whether the commission would be meeting with the department heads. Mr. Holland stated that it could be arranged if needed.
- Chairman Muller stated that the commission may request more detail. Mr. Holland said that he would be happy to take those requests and coordinate on the commission's behalf.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Marysville has met and considered its budget for the calendar year 2008 and has held public hearings on October 23, 2007, October 25, 2007 and November 13, 2007; and

WHEREAS, the City of Marysville's actual levy amount from the previous year was \$1,268,017.00; and,

WHEREAS, the population of the City of Marysville is more than 10,000; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Marysville Do Ordain as Follows: After hearing and after duly considering all relevant evidence and testimony presented, the City Council has determined that the City of Marysville requires a EMS levy in the amount of \$1,550,000.00, which includes an increase in property tax revenue from the previous year, and amounts resulting from the addition of new construction and improvements to property and any increase in the value of state-assessed property, and amounts authorized by law as a result of any annexations that have occurred and refunds made, in order to discharge the expected expenses and obligations of the City.

Section 1: An increase in the EMS property tax levy is hereby authorized for the levy to be collected in the 2008 tax year. The dollar amount of the increase over the actual levy amount from the previous year shall be \$12,680.00 which is a percentage increase of 1% from the previous year. This increase is exclusive of additional revenue resulting from the addition of new construction and improvements to property and any increase in the value of state assessed property, and any additional amounts resulting from any annexations that have occurred and refunds made.

An Ordinance of the City of Marysville adopting a budget for the City of Marysville, Washington, for the year 2008, setting forth in summary form the totals of estimated revenues and appropriations for each separate fund and the aggregate totals of all such funds combined, and including the Pay Classification Plan and the Capital Facilities Plan.

WHEREAS, As required by law the City has conducted public hearings on the preliminary budget for 2008 on October 23rd and October 25th, and November 13th, 2007 as required by law and said budget has been filed with the City Clerk, also as required by law, NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of RCW 35A.34.120, the budget of the City of Marysville, Washington, for the year 2008, in aggregate amount of \$150,466,849.00, which is attached hereto, is hereby adopted by reference, after the public hearing on November 13, 2007 and after the preliminary budget has been filed with the City Clerk as required by law.

Section 3. In accordance with Ordinance No 2604 approved by City Council on November 28, 2005, it has been determined that the interests of the residents of the City of Marysville may best be served by the confirmation of the establishment of a two percent (2%) annual increase in water and sewer rates and fees.

Section 4. City employees who use their own vehicles on City business will receive a mileage allowance at the rate as approved by the United States Internal Revenue Service.

Section 5. The City Clerk is directed to keep on file a certified copy of the Budget hereby adopted by reference and to transmit a certified copy of said document to the Office of the Auditor of the State of Washington, Division of Municipal Corporations, and to the Association of Washington Cities.

Section 6. In accordance with MMC 2.50.030, the 2008 budget hereby reflect that City employees shall be paid in accordance with the established pay classification and grades or ranges attached hereto and contained in Appendix A of the budget document.

Section 7:. Concurrently with the adoption of this 2008 budget ordinance, the Marysville City Council is adopting the 2008-2014 Capital Facilities Plan (“CFP”), as a subelement of the City’s Comprehensive Plan. The City Council finds that the adoption of the CFP does have an effect on the City budget. The City Council further finds that the administration and implementation of the CFP does require City manpower and resources and as such, the adoption of the CFP should be considered as a part of the annual budget process, which CFP is attached hereto and contained in Appendix B of the budget document.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force January 1, 2008

The Panasonic FP-7728 photocopier has been used by the Public Works Admin Department since 1997. The functionality of the machine is failing (e.g. poor copy quality and inability to perform duplexing). We have the opportunity to replace the machine with a leased Ikon copier that is newer and more functional, to coordinate with the lease renewals for two of our existing leased copiers. The net expense to Public Works will be minimal due to decreasing “cost per copy” expenses (approximately 40% lower) for the two renewing machines, decreased lease renewal terms for our WWTP leased copier (from \$136.72 per month to an average of \$48.89 per month), and anticipated decreased usage of our Engineering copier (due to the addition of this second color copier).

In addition, the Facilities Department has deemed the other office equipment listed on the proposed Ordinance as no longer useful to the City and requests authorization to surplus or dispose thereof.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Staff recommends that Marysville City Council authorize the Mayor to sign the Resolution declaring these items to be surplus and authorizing the sale or disposal thereof.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON,
AMENDING THE CITY'S STREET CODE RELATED TO FRONTAGE
IMPROVEMENTS AND DEDICATIONS AND AMENDING CHAPTER
12.02A AND REPEALING CHAPTER 12.02 OF THE MARYSVILLE
MUNICIPAL CODE.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Marysville finds that it is necessary to amend the City's street code as set forth in Ch. 12.02A MMC, in order to fairly and equitably apply frontage improvement and dedication requirements to certain developments within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council's Public Works Committee has reviewed and recommends approval of the above-referenced amendment to the City's street code; and

WHEREAS, the City has complied with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act, Ch.43.21C RCW, (SEPA) by adopting a determination of non-significance for the adoption of the proposed revision to the City's street code;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE,
WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Ch. 12.02A MMC is hereby amended by amending MMC 12.02A.090 and MMC 12.02A.110 to read as follows:

12.02A.090 Frontage improvements required..

(1) The term "frontage improvements" as used in this section shall refer to the construction, reconstruction or repair of the following facilities along the full abutting public street frontage of property being developed:

- (a) Curbs, gutters and sidewalks;
- (b) Underground storm drainage facilities;
- (c) Patching the street from its preexisting edge to the new curb line;
- (d) Overlayment of the existing public street to its centerline;
- (e) Construction of new streets within dedicated, unopened right-of-way.

All such frontage improvements shall be constructed to city specifications.

(2) Property owners shall be required to construct frontage improvements along the full abutting public street frontage of property which is developed as provided in subsection (3) of this section; provided, that overlayment of an existing public street to its centerline shall not be required for single-family or duplex development.

(3) Frontage improvements shall be constructed as follows:

(a) Formal plats: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to recording the final plat, or may be bonded pursuant to provisions of MMC Title [20](#);

(b) Short plats: frontage improvements shall be completed for frontage abutting all lots prior to the issuance of a building permit for any lot in the short plat;

(c) Construction of a dwelling unit, business, commercial or industrial building: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy of the building;

(d) Construction of any additions, alterations or repairs to a ~~dwelling unit residential building that result in an increase in the number of dwelling units as defined in MMC 19.06.143,~~ or to a business, commercial or industrial building ~~that result in an increase in pedestrian or vehicular traffic,~~ within any 12-month period, ~~which exceed 50 percent of the assessed value of the existing building on the property:~~ frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(e) Development of a mobile home park or other project requiring a binding site plan: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(f) Any change in the occupancy classification of an existing building or structure on the property: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(4) In the case of single-family residential construction on a single lot, a property owner may satisfy the frontage improvement requirements by constructing a maximum of 200 lineal feet of frontage improvements and may be allowed by the director of community development to satisfy said requirements for more than 200 lineal feet of frontage improvements by participating in a cost-sharing program with the city, if the same is approved in the then-current budget of the city council, or by constructing the sidewalk improvement to a reduced standard as determined by the City Engineer or designee.

(5) The director of community development or designee shall have authority to grant administrative variances from any of the requirements of this section pursuant to MMC 12.02A.120. Such variances shall be conditioned upon the property owner signing a contract providing for the construction of the frontage improvements at a future time. Said contract shall include, but not be limited to, the making of a cash deposit with the city in an amount equal to the estimate of the city engineer of the cost of said improvements, including design cost, plus an administrative overhead fee of 15 percent. No other form of payment or security shall be authorized. In the event the frontage improvements are not constructed by the property owner within five years of the grant of a variance, the cash deposit shall be forfeited to the city. If said frontage improvements are constructed by the property owner at the request of the city within five years of the grant of a variance, said cash deposit shall be refunded to the property owner less the 15 percent overhead fee. Said contract shall be subject to the approval of the city attorney and shall contain such other provisions as are necessary to effectuate the future construction of such frontage improvements. The refusal of a property owner to enter into such agreement or to post a cash amount as specified herein shall be a basis to deny a variance request and shall require the construction of such frontage improvements in accordance with subsections (1) through (4) of this section.

The council authorizes the mayor to review, execute and sign contracts for deferred construction of curbs, gutters and sidewalks pursuant to this chapter.

Any party aggrieved by a decision of the director of community development or city engineer may appeal the decision pursuant to MMC 12.02.A.120(4). (Ord. 2547 § 1, 2004; Ord. 2539 § 1, 2004; Ord. 2292 § 1, 1999).

12.02A.110 Dedication of road right-of-way– Required setbacks.

(1) It shall be required that a property owner dedicate to the city sufficient property to widen all abutting public rights-of-way to the full width as measured from the right-of-way centerline,

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so as to conform to the applicable city standards. Such dedication shall be at no cost to the city in all of the following cases:

(a) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a final plat.

(b) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a short plat.

(c) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a binding site plan for a mobile home park, condominium, planned unit development, shopping center or industrial park.

(d) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of any rezone, conditional use permit or building permit, when the city finds that the proposed development will adversely affect pedestrian or vehicular traffic and finds that such dedication is necessary to protect against, and is roughly proportional to, such adverse effects.

(2) The dimensions of required yards and the dimensions of setbacks for buildings and other structures, as specified in Chapter 19.12 MMC, shall be measured from the ultimate design width of abutting public rights-of-way according to the applicable road standard specified by the city engineer. This requirement shall apply to all development permits regardless of whether the property owner has dedicated rights-of-way to the city pursuant to subsection (1) of this section. (Ord. 2292 § 1, 1999).

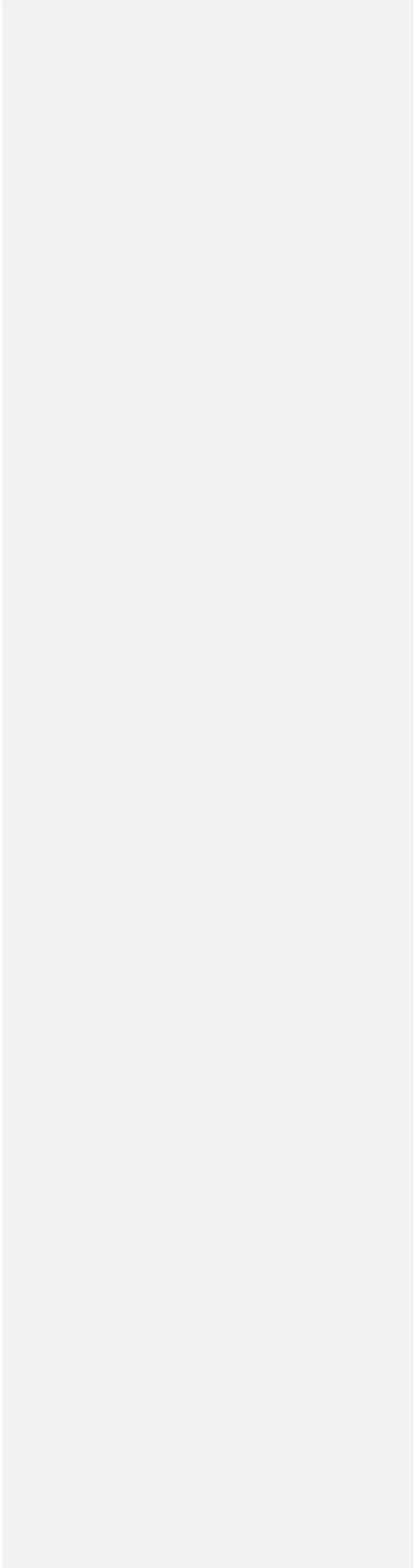

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE, WASHINGTON,
AMENDING THE CITY’S STREET CODE RELATED TO FRONTAGE
IMPROVEMENTS AND DEDICATIONS AND AMENDING CHAPTER
12.02A AND REPEALING CHAPTER 12.02 OF THE MARYSVILLE
MUNICIPAL CODE.**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Marysville finds that it is necessary to amend the City’s street code as set forth in Ch. 12.02A MMC, in order to fairly and equitably apply frontage improvement and dedication requirements to certain developments within the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council’s Public Works Committee has reviewed and recommends approval of the above-referenced amendment to the City’s street code; and

WHEREAS, the City has complied with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act, Ch.43.21C RCW, (SEPA) by adopting a determination of non-significance for the adoption of the proposed revision to the City’s street code;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARYSVILLE,
WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Ch. 12.02A MMC is hereby amended by amending MMC 12.02A.090 and MMC 12.02A.110 to read as follows:

12.02A.090 Frontage improvements required..

(1) The term “frontage improvements” as used in this section shall refer to the construction, reconstruction or repair of the following facilities along the full abutting public street frontage of property being developed:

- (a) Curbs, gutters and sidewalks;
- (b) Underground storm drainage facilities;
- (c) Patching the street from its preexisting edge to the new curb line;
- (d) Overlayment of the existing public street to its centerline;
- (e) Construction of new streets within dedicated, unopened right-of-way.

All such frontage improvements shall be constructed to city specifications.

(2) Property owners shall be required to construct frontage improvements along the full abutting public street frontage of property which is developed as provided in subsection (3) of this section; provided, that overlayment of an existing public street to its centerline shall not be required for single-family or duplex development.

(3) Frontage improvements shall be constructed as follows:

(a) Formal plats: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to recording the final plat, or may be bonded pursuant to provisions of MMC Title [20](#);

(b) Short plats: frontage improvements shall be completed for frontage abutting all lots prior to the issuance of a building permit for any lot in the short plat;

(c) Construction of a dwelling unit, business, commercial or industrial building: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy of the building;

(d) Construction of any additions, alterations or repairs to a residential building that result in an increase in the number of dwelling units as defined in MMC 19.06.143, or to a business, commercial or industrial building that result in an increase in pedestrian or vehicular traffic, within any 12-month period: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(e) Development of a mobile home park or other project requiring a binding site plan: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(f) Any change in the occupancy classification of an existing building or structure on the property: frontage improvements shall be completed prior to occupancy;

(4) In the case of single-family residential construction on a single lot, a property owner may satisfy the frontage improvement requirements by constructing a maximum of 200 lineal feet of frontage improvements and may be allowed by the director of community development to satisfy said requirements for more than 200 lineal feet of frontage improvements by participating in a cost-sharing program with the city, if the same is approved in the then-current budget of the city council, or by constructing the sidewalk improvement to a reduced standard as determined by the City Engineer or designee.

(5) The director of community development or designee shall have authority to grant administrative variances from any of the requirements of this section pursuant to MMC [12.02A.120](#). Such variances shall be conditioned upon the property owner signing a contract providing for the construction of the frontage improvements at a future time. Said contract shall include, but not be limited to, the making of a cash deposit with the city in an amount equal to the estimate of the city engineer of the cost of said improvements, including design cost, plus an administrative overhead fee of 15 percent. No other form of payment or security shall be authorized. In the event the frontage improvements are not constructed by the property owner within five years of the grant of a variance, the cash deposit shall be forfeited to the city. If said frontage improvements are constructed by the property owner at the request of the city within five years of the grant of a variance, said cash deposit shall be refunded to the property owner less the 15 percent overhead fee. Said contract shall be subject to the approval of the city attorney and shall contain such other provisions as are necessary to effectuate the future construction of such frontage improvements. The refusal of a property owner to enter into such agreement or to post a cash amount as specified herein shall be a basis to deny a variance request and shall require the construction of such frontage improvements in accordance with subsections (1) through (4) of this section.

The council authorizes the mayor to review, execute and sign contracts for deferred construction of curbs, gutters and sidewalks pursuant to this chapter.

Any party aggrieved by a decision of the director of community development or city engineer may appeal the decision pursuant to MMC [12.02.A.120](#)(4). (Ord. 2547 § 1, 2004; Ord. 2539 § 1, 2004; Ord. 2292 § 1, 1999).

12.02A.110 Dedication of road right-of-way– Required setbacks.

(1) It shall be required that a property owner dedicate to the city sufficient property to widen all abutting public rights-of-way to the full width as measured from the right-of-way centerline, so as to conform to the applicable city standards. Such dedication shall be at no cost to the city in all of the following cases:

(a) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a final plat.

(b) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a short plat.

(c) Such dedication shall be required as a condition of approval of a binding site plan for a mobile home park, condominium, planned unit development, shopping center or industrial park.

(d). Such dedication may be required as a condition of approval of any rezone, conditional use permit or building permit, when the city finds that the proposed development will adversely affect pedestrian or vehicular traffic and finds that such dedication is necessary to protect against, and is roughly proportional to, such adverse effects.

(2) The dimensions of required yards and the dimensions of setbacks for buildings and other structures, as specified in Chapter [19.12](#) MMC, shall be measured from the ultimate design width of abutting public rights-of-way according to the applicable road standard specified by the city engineer. This requirement shall apply to all development permits regardless of whether the property owner has dedicated rights-of-way to the city pursuant to subsection (1) of this section. (Ord. 2292 § 1, 1999).

Section 2. Repealer. Ch. 12.02 MMC is hereby repealed.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or work of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

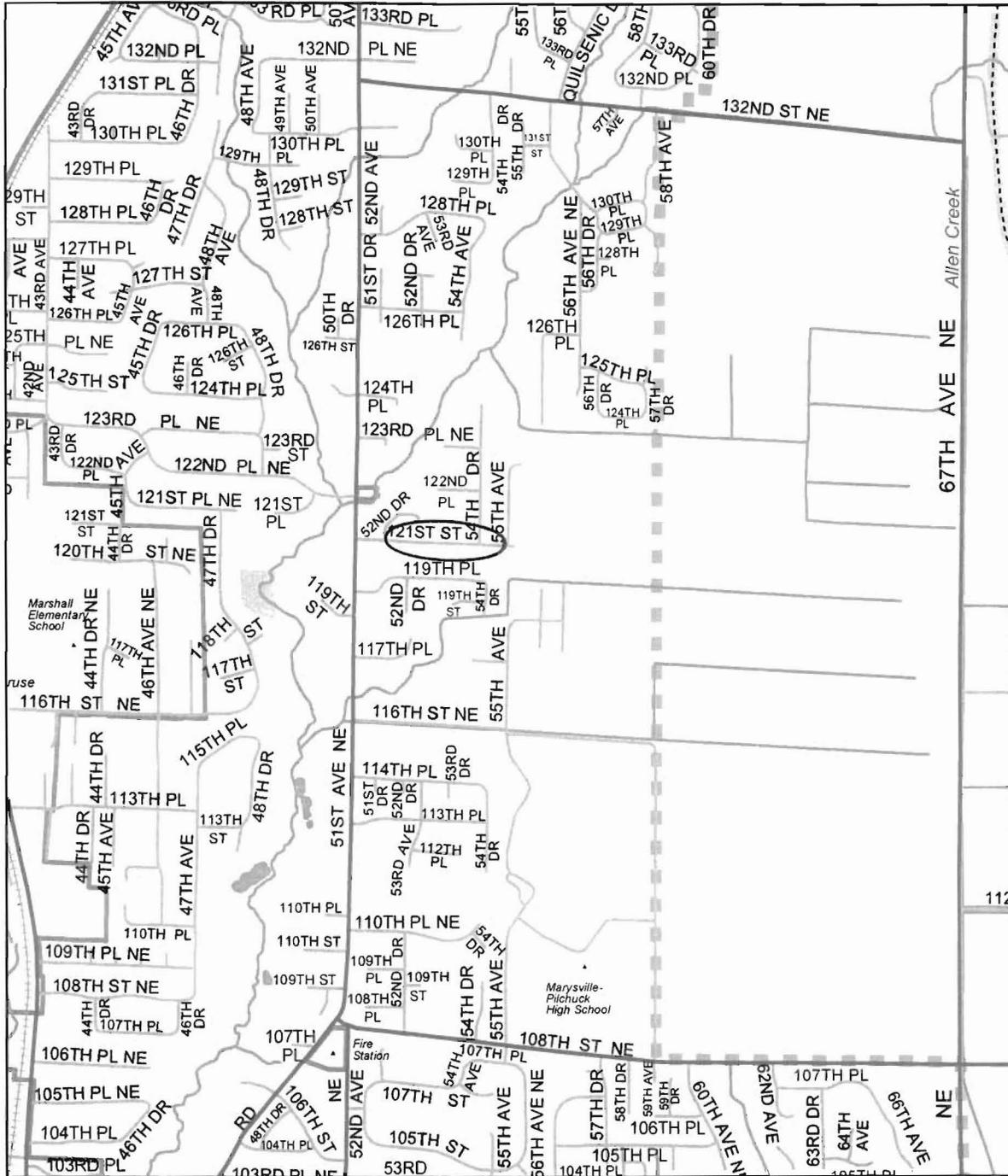

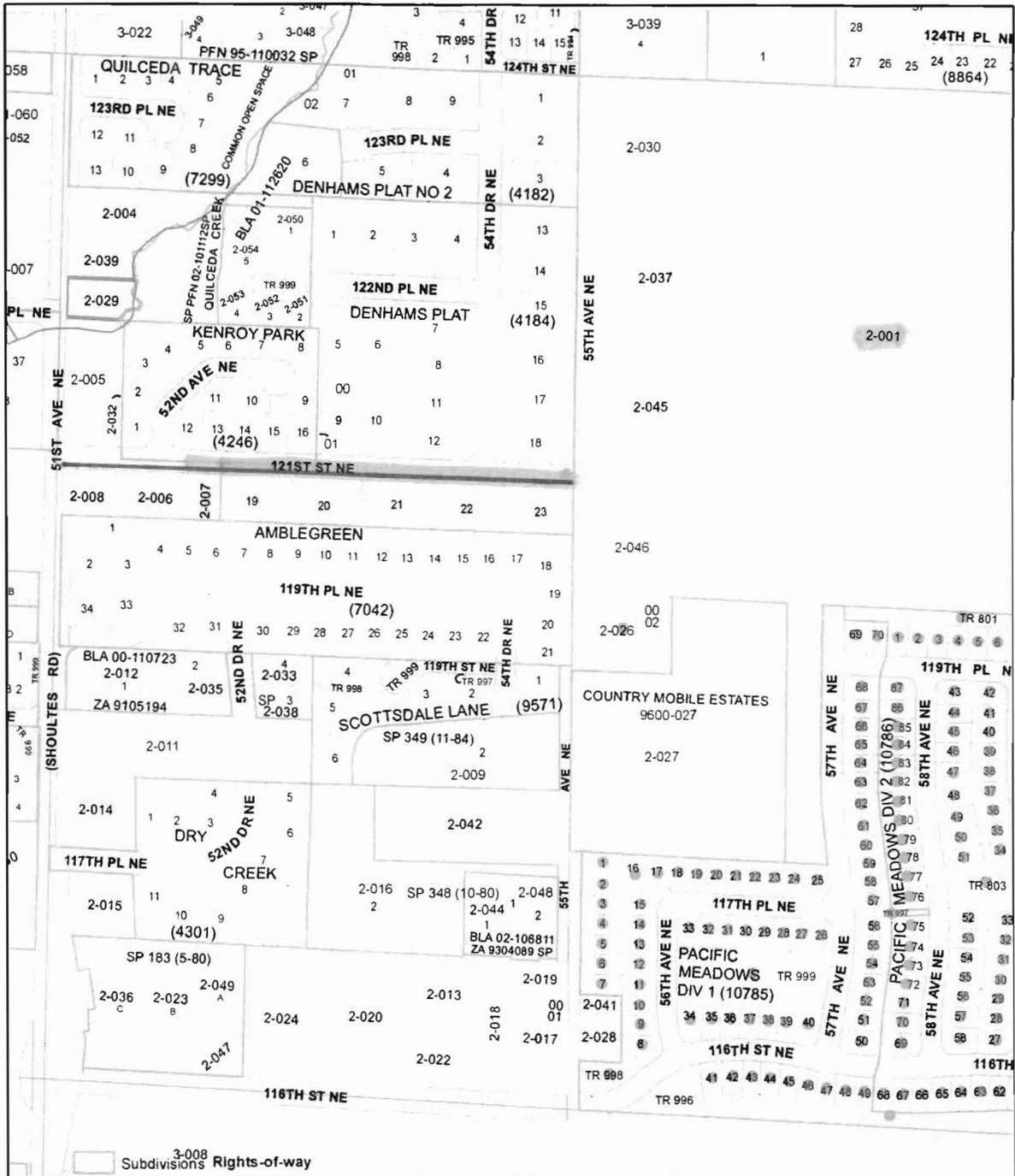
Exhibit A - Vicinity Map

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into by and between the CITY OF MARYSVILLE, a municipal corporation of the State of Washington, hereinafter referred to as "City," and

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Developer has constructed and installed a sewer (water, sewer, or storm drainage) system, including a(n) 12-inch line and appurtenances situated as follows:

Approximately 1355 LF of 12" offsite sewer main located on 121st Street NE east of 51st Avenue NE serving the Plat of Meadows at Two Cedars.

WHEREAS, the Developer has conveyed said system by Bill of Sale to the City and the City has accepted ownership and maintenance of the same under its sole jurisdiction, subject to a one-year warranty by the Developer; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to enter into a contract pursuant to Chapter 35.91 RCW providing for reimbursement to the Developer for its construction and installation costs by subsequent users of the system; NOW, THEREFORE,

IN CONSIDERATION of the covenants bargained for and given in exchange, the parties mutually agree as follows:

1. The Developer has furnished or shall furnish the City with an as-built drawing of the installation of the above-referenced system on mylar, 24" x 36" in size, together with receipted bills showing that all charges and expenses incurred in connection with the installation have been paid.
2. The Developer's costs for construction and installation of said utility lines and facilities, including engineering fees, were \$208,000.00, which have been paid in full by the Developer.
3. The real property described below (or described in the exhibit attached hereto) is benefited by the installation of said utility lines, and is subject to the lien created by this Contract:

Ten properties located in the NW Quarter of Section 10, Township 30 North, Range 5 East, W.M. Tax parcel #'s 004184-000-009-00, 004184-000-010-00, 004184-000-012-00, 004184-000-018-00, 004184-00-019-00, 004184-000-020-00, 004184-000-021-00, 004184-000-022-00, 004184-000-023-00, & 300510-002-007-00.
4. The proportionate share of the total cost of the utility lines which may be fairly attributed to serving and benefiting the above-described property, as a whole, rather than serving and benefiting the property of the Developer, is \$121,693.53.

5. For a period not to exceed fifteen (15) years from the date of this agreement, the City agrees to require the owners of the above-described real estate who hereafter connect to the above-described utility system to pay a fair pro rata share of the cost referred to in paragraph 4 above. This fair pro-rata share shall be determined from the length of the street frontage of the property to be served, which is known as the "front footage charge." This, however, does not include any other capital improvement charges levied by the City, whether it be by square footage of the area served, and/or a flat fee. No property extending beyond the terminus of the above-described system, as of the date said system has been accepted by the City, shall be served by said system unless there is an extension from said terminus which is constructed and financed in accordance with state and local laws and ordinances.

6. The fair pro-rata share is hereby established to be \$77.07 per lineal foot of frontage.

7. No person, firm or corporation shall be granted a permit or be authorized by the City to connect to or use the above-described utility system during said fifteen-year period without first meeting the following conditions:

- a. If the property is not within the City limits, the owner thereof must sign an annexation covenant as required by City ordinance.
- b. Payment of all applicable connection charges, fees and assessments regularly imposed by City ordinance.
- c. Payment of the recovery charge referred to in this Contract.
- d. Compliance with all requirements for utility connections which are regularly imposed by City ordinance.

8. The City shall deduct a fee of \$50.00 for each utility connection, said fee to be kept by the City to cover the cost of administering this Contract. The City shall then disburse the remaining balance which is collected for each connection to the Developer within thirty (30) days of receipt thereof. If the Developer shall hereafter assign its rights herein, the City shall be provided with a signed copy of such assignment by the Developer. The Developer hereby waives any claim which it or its successors or assigns may have if the City negligently fails to collect a reimbursement charge from a property owner connecting to the utility system.

9. At the end of the fifteen-year period, which shall commence upon the recording of this agreement, this agreement shall terminate in and of itself, notwithstanding that the full amount provided for herein may not have been recovered. Connection charges subsequent to the termination of this agreement shall be governed by ordinance of the City of Marysville, and all such charges shall be paid to the City for its use and benefit.

10. The provisions of this Contract shall not be construed as establishing the City as a public utility in the areas not already connected to the utility system; nor shall this Contract be construed as establishing express or implied rights for any property owner to connect to the City's utility system without first qualifying for such connection by compliance with all applicable City codes and ordinances.

11. The Developer agrees to hold the City harmless from any and all liability resulting from errors in the legal descriptions contained herein, and the City is relieved of all responsibility under this agreement for collecting on parcels not properly included in the legal descriptions set forth in Section 3 of this contract.

12. This Contract shall be recorded in the records of the Snohomish County Auditor, and it shall be binding upon the parties, their heirs, successors and assigns. The Developer agrees to reimburse the City for the recording fee and for all legal fees and other costs associated with the execution and recordation of the agreement.

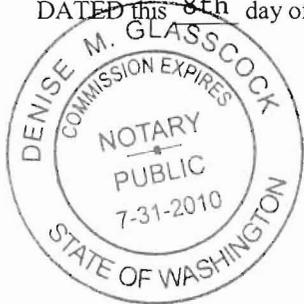

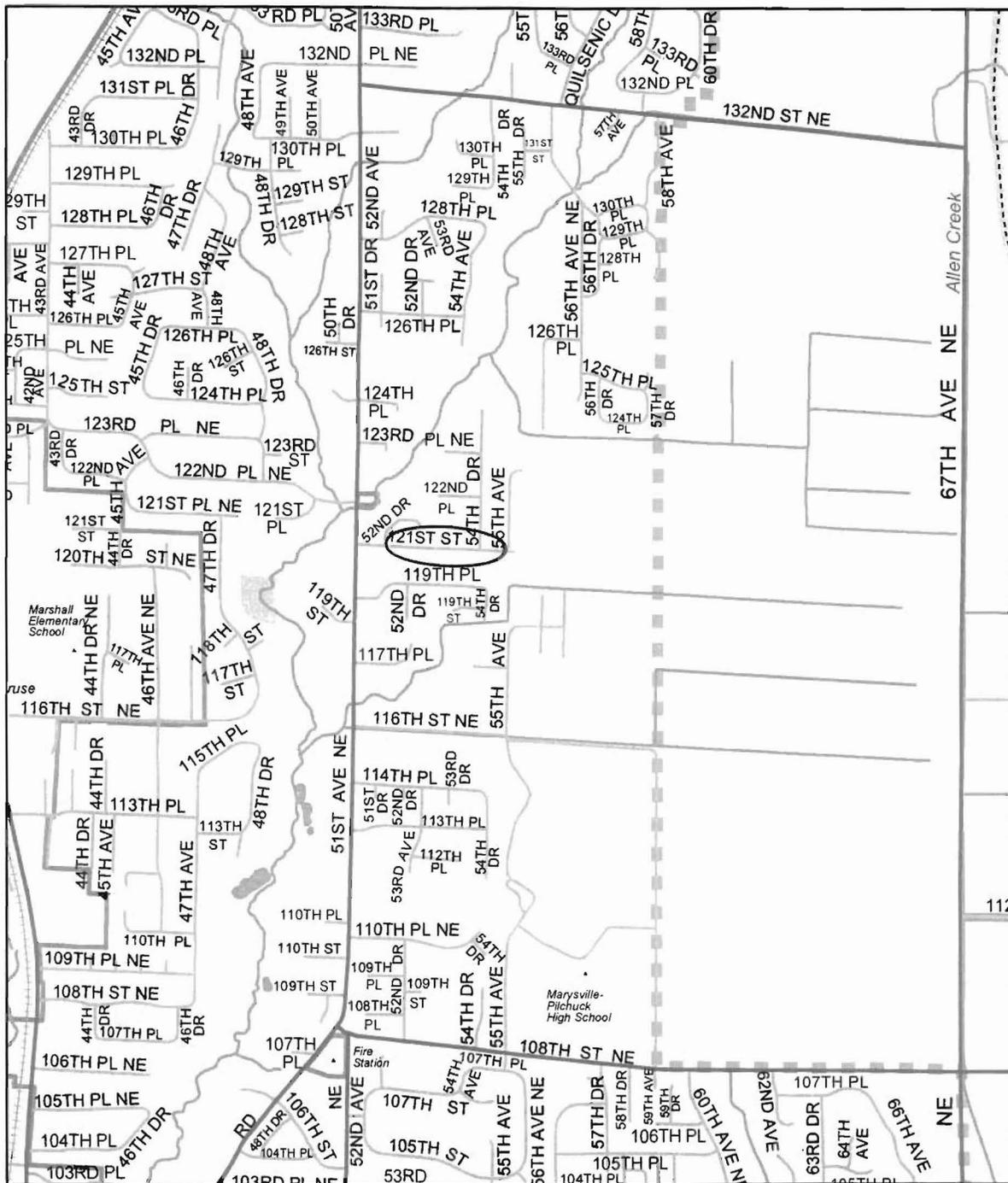

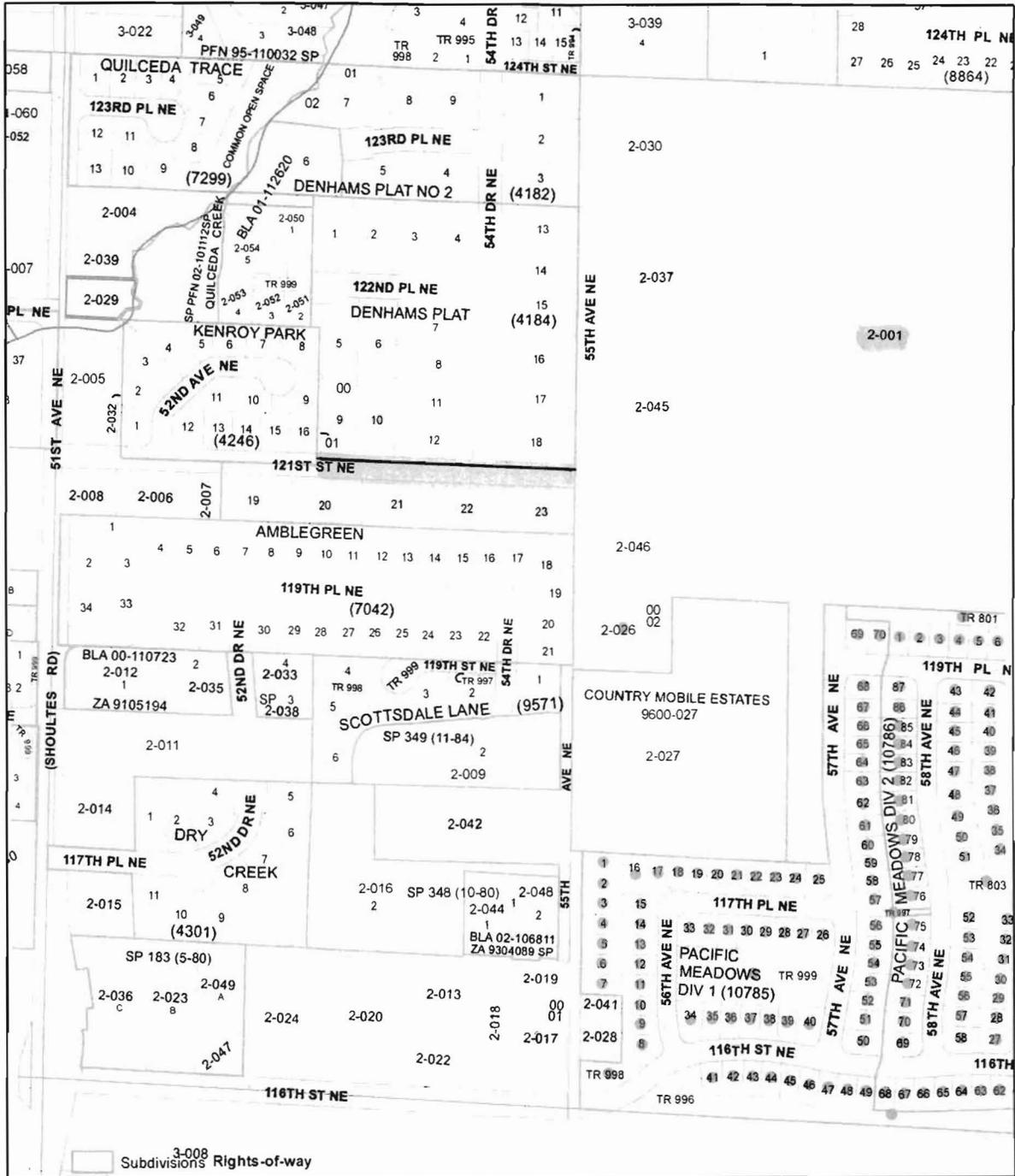

No property extending beyond the terminus of the above-described system, as of the date said system has been accepted by the City, shall be served by said system unless there is an extension from said terminus which is constructed and financed in accordance with state and local laws and ordinances.

6. The fair pro-rata share is hereby established to be \$22.13 per lineal foot of frontage.

7. No person, firm or corporation shall be granted a permit or be authorized by the City to connect to or use the above-described utility system during said fifteen-year period without first meeting the following conditions:

- a. If the property is not within the City limits, the owner thereof must sign an annexation covenant as required by City ordinance.
- b. Payment of all applicable connection charges, fees and assessments regularly imposed by City ordinance.
- c. Payment of the recovery charge referred to in this Contract.
- d. Compliance with all requirements for utility connections which are regularly imposed by City ordinance.

8. The City shall deduct a fee of \$50.00 for each utility connection, said fee to be kept by the City to cover the cost of administering this Contract. The City shall then disburse the remaining balance which is collected for each connection to the Developer within thirty (30) days of receipt thereof. If the Developer shall hereafter assign its rights herein, the City shall be provided with a signed copy of such assignment by the Developer. The Developer hereby waives any claim which it or its successors or assigns may have if the City negligently fails to collect a reimbursement charge from a property owner connecting to the utility system.

9. At the end of the fifteen-year period, which shall commence upon the recording of this agreement, this agreement shall terminate in and of itself, notwithstanding that the full amount provided for herein may not have been recovered. Connection charges subsequent to the termination of this agreement shall be governed by ordinance of the City of Marysville, and all such charges shall be paid to the City for its use and benefit.

10. The provisions of this Contract shall not be construed as establishing the City as a public utility in the areas not already connected to the utility system; nor shall this Contract be construed as establishing express or implied rights for any property owner to connect to the City's utility system without first qualifying for such connection by compliance with all applicable City codes and ordinances.

11. The Developer agrees to hold the City harmless from any and all liability resulting from errors in the legal descriptions contained herein, and the City is relieved of all responsibility under this agreement for collecting on parcels not properly included in the legal descriptions set forth in Section 3 of this contract.

12. This Contract shall be recorded in the records of the Snohomish County Auditor, and it shall be binding upon the parties, their heirs, successors and assigns. The Developer agrees to reimburse the City for the recording fee and for all legal fees and other costs associated with the execution and recordation of the agreement.

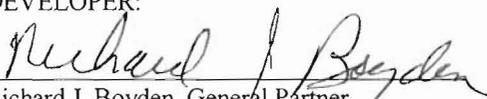

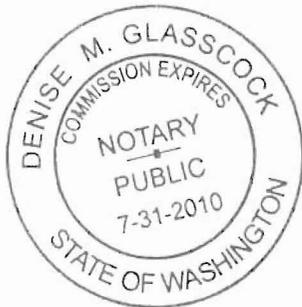

Are libraries included in the initiative that is on the ballot to make school and fire department levies a simple majority? Library Trustees are appointed rather than elected and that is the justification for not including libraries in this election issue.

The Sno-Isle board is a directing board not an advising board. For example they supervise the director, deal with budget issues etc... Background of board members is reviewed just as an employee would be. The relevant county council approves the candidate. Alanna's background is political science and business administration. She has run some campaigns for the school district and has done school committee work. Alanna is a Stanwood resident.

Reports:

Librarian: Maggie Buckholz

The city has soda blasted and acid washed the concrete. It has improved though it is not as good as we had hoped. Parks has been trimming trees around the building to get branches away from the building. They are trying to improve security around the building by eliminating dark hiding places. We are targeted to have the remainder of crumbling curbs replaced soon.

We have had a recent rash of car break-ins. We had a break-in four days in a row after one very lucrative hit. Maggie is discussing security cameras again with the city and Sno-Isle.

Negotiating with the city in trying to replace tables and chairs in the large meeting room. They are heavy for the librarians and there are not enough tables for some groups. This is the third year in a row that this has been on the city budget. Mike Shepard said this would be higher priority on this year's budget.

Our new janitors are doing a really great job and have been cleaning the carpets at no additional cost. Their small equipment is not up to the task in some areas.

Up Coming Programs include:

Next week is officially “Friends of the Library Week” A Proclamation will be read at the Friends meeting next week. Maggie will be the hostess and the League of Women’s Voters will present the program.

Sat Nov 10 - in conjunction with Veteran’s Day, Author Henry Friedman, holocaust survivor will speak and sign books. Earlier in the day we will show a related movie, “Live is Beautiful” - Our licensing agreement prohibits advertising of this movie by it’s title.

Oct 20th 6:00 p.m.

Foundation sponsors “Adventure Awaits” a fundraising event to be held at the Snohomish Library. A fun evening, no admission but donations will be requested. Stokely Towles will present a program of humorous library stories from this library system.

October 18th in partnership with KCTS world War II Veterans from Snohomish and Island counties are invited to record their stories. Terry Beck 651-7016 is the contact person for this event. It is possible that some of these stories will be podcast from the website, transcribed to print and/or submitted to the Library of Congress

Teen programming includes a field trip to meet Author, Scott Westerfield at the Edmonds library. He is the author of the “Uglies” series.

A new craft program “the altered book” will be Oct 13th. The teen advisory group continues to meet. Catharsis is still going. Oct 27th will be a drop in tabletop board games night. Recently a teen movie night was held.

North Region Manager: Valerie Stevens

Strategic planning continues. Focus groups are being held with staff, library users, ethnic communities, and non-library users. There is a customer satisfaction survey on the web-site. This plan will be used to guide library decisions for the next five years.

Several libraries are re-carpeting. That is a significant disruption and some libraries are closed for this process. Information Technology staff has to take out computers and phones. Then furniture has to be moved and in some cases bookstacks get moved. Stanwood will be carpeted with carpet squares so bookstacks will remain in place. Carpet in the Arlington staff work areas is being replaced. Stanwood library is in the process of many improvements in the physical facility. Repainting, recarpeting, rearranging, new shelving for media, and roofing are all part of the ongoing plan. Jack Archibald has

donated two stain glass windows that separate the circulation desk from work area.

Podcast - Pat Timko and Edith Ferrar have recorded a number of children's books. They don't have any visual links, but there are links to the catalog for the featured items. A new book will be added on Fridays.

Camano Island branch library board is focused on their need to develop a way to continue the library after the three year experimental period is over. That library are trying a new leased book program. Books can be sent back when demand lessens. There has not been a decrease in business at the Stanwood library. The library seems to be attracting new library users to the Camano Island library and to the Stanwood Library as congestion lessens at the Stanwood Facility.

Friends of the Library: no report

Old Business:

Gellerson Furniture Update: We got the bid at 3:30 today for benches, chairs. Bid came in at \$29,000. We have \$37,000 to spend. We have some items still to consider that we were unsure we would be able to afford, for example new chairs for the children's area.

It was moved that the purchase be approved using Gellerson funds pending committee (furniture sub-committee) approval. Motion was approved.

The locked display cabinet might be removed. It is seldom used.

Gellerson Art Project: We have a link on the Sno-Isle web-page. The Marysville page has a link. Margot has a press release for local papers. Maggie has heard from 30 different artists. We have contacted about 30 emails of individual artists and organizations. An Oak Harbor artists offered a donation.

New Business:

Sno-Isle Board of Trustees Update and Discussion: Trustees are trying to reach out to boards to increase understanding. We hope to develop and event for boards that will include training and entertainment.

Training: Report on Intellectual Freedom/ Banned Books Week.

The annual banned book display tends to engender comments. Some people avoid the library when that display is up. It opens conversation and helps us think about intellectual freedom and libraries role in promoting freedom of speech.

Concerns are raised that people respond to various forms of art (literature, music, drama) in ways that harm others. A reported interview with Marilyn Manson asked him to respond to young people who say they are inspired to act violently by his music. His reply was, "I wouldn't say anything to them: I would listen to them." Art does not cause people to take action. People take action on their own.

Many of the objections to the banned books are based on a desire to protect vulnerable people. Some think the community consensus should be the line between what is provided in the library and what is not. Some don't like to think of their tax dollars being used to purchase books that offend them.

We do have limitations on our resources that necessitate limitations on our purchases. Selections are made using intellectual freedom guidelines. Before things get challenged these guidelines are in place. The First Amendment is the guideline. The First Amendment does not limit the right to free speech based on age or the respect of the community. Basic constitutional principles do not disappear when speech takes a new form in the use of new technologies.

Maggie provided a press statement on banned book week and a list of most challenged books for 2006.

Libraries have more open hours than any other public institution in the United States. Libraries are neutral ground for opposing opinions. We try to expand our collections to balance opposing ideas. The Sno-Isle Library system represents 630,000 people in two counties. The collection tries to represent many points of view. It is recognized that not every item in the collection is appropriate for every library patron. Reference librarians will be happy to help patrons determine if a choice is appropriate for them and their families with the use of reviews. Maggie will consider moving a movie review guide near the movies in the library.
